EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Christina Taylor, Chief Executive Officer of the Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, and Deirdre Sullivan, President and CEO of the United Way of Larimer County, are presenting their findings from the attached final report, "Dedicated Larimer County Funding for Early Childhood."

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Earlier this year, Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, in partnership with United Way of Larimer County, convened a Steering Committee of community leaders to shape and inform a strategic viability assessment project to determine whether and when to pursue a ballot measure to raise dedicated, local public funding for early childhood programs in Larimer County.

The Committee completed a thorough due diligence process with guidance and support from a professional consulting team with extensive experience in early childhood policy and state and local ballot measures in Colorado.

Based on this due diligence process, it is the recommendation of this group that the Larimer County Board of County Commissioners refer a county-wide sales & use tax increase question to voters at the November 2021 election for the purpose of supporting working parents, children, and early care and education programs in Larimer County." - Executive Summary from page 2 of the Final Report.

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EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Earlier this year, Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, in partnership with United Way of Larimer County, convened a Steering Committee of community leaders to shape and inform a strategic viability assessment project to determine whether and when to pursue a ballot measure to raise dedicated, local public funding for early childhood programs in Larimer County.

The Committee completed a thorough due diligence process with guidance and support from a professional consulting team with extensive experience in early childhood policy and state and local ballot measures in Colorado.

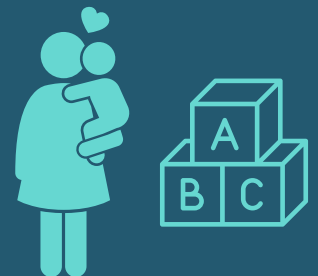
Based on this due diligence process, **it is the recommendation of this group that the Larimer County Board of County Commissioners refer a county-wide sales & use tax increase question to voters at the November 2021 election for the purpose of supporting working parents, children, and early care and education programs in Larimer County.**

Specifically, 14 of 17 members of the Steering Committee voted to support:

- A question on the November 2021 ballot
- To increase the **county-wide sales and use tax by 0.25%** (25 cents on a \$100 purchase), which will **generate an estimated \$17M / year in revenue**
- The measure should specify that revenue generated by this tax may be used for four purposes:
 - **Subsidize the cost of child care and preschool programs for families with children from birth to age 5**
 - **Invest in the early childhood system to expand capacity and improve quality**
 - **Conduct thorough evaluation to measure the impact of the program**
 - **Pay for administration of the program with a reasonable cap in place**

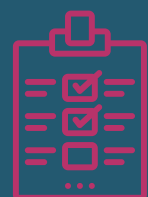

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY (CONT.)

- **The measure should include a 20 year sunset provision**
- The County should partner with Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, a community-based non-profit organization with expertise in early childhood and trusted relationships across the county, to administer, manage and advise on the distribution of funds
- **These funds should be audited regularly and subject to typical transparency and accountability measures**
- Of the three members of the Steering Committee who did not endorse this recommendation:
 - Two supported the concept of public investment in early childhood, as well as the details of this specific recommendation, but did not support asking voters for additional taxes in 2021, and instead favored waiting until 2022.
 - One dissenting member supported the idea of a local tax for early childhood, but opposed the details of this recommendation, citing that \$17M per year in dedicated revenue was insufficient to meet demand and, as such, this member could not support a partial solution.

Context for Work

Larimer County is facing a crisis in early childhood care and education. Based on 2019 estimates, licensed capacity for child care is only 25% of projected demand for infants and toddlers, and only 64% for preschool age children. The ECE workforce crisis has intensified during the pandemic. Some providers have closed, while others are struggling to meet expenses while many parents are caring for their children while working from home.

This challenge is not new and recognition of it as a major barrier to the economic and social success of our community is widely held. The Talent 2.0 Regional Workforce Strategy report released in 2017, identified lack of access to child care as one of three key barriers to workforce recruitment and retention in Larimer County. And, as such, the Larimer County Board of County Commissioners made expanding access to quality child care a key priority of the County's 2019 – 2023 strategic plan -- Goal 2, objective 3: *"By 2023 Larimer County, with public and private partners, will increase quality child care capacity by 50% by identifying and implementing investment strategies in the areas of workforce, infrastructure and funding that result in long-term systems change."*

Currently, the early childhood system in Larimer County is funded by a patchwork of state and federal public funding sources, as well as private philanthropic investments and fee-for-service revenue paid by families. Many communities, across Colorado and the country, with a similar funding mix have sought and secured dedicated local public funding to address capacity shortages, make services more affordable for families and to improve quality. Understanding the successful precedent of these local public funding initiatives, Early Childhood Council of Larimer County and United Way of Larimer County teamed up to explore the viability of such an initiative in Larimer County.

TIMELINE

January 2021

- Interviewed and retained the consulting team to design and execute this work

- Developed and refined various scenarios for generating and allocating local tax revenue
- Conducted qualitative public opinion research via In-Depth Interviews with 13 “grasstops” community leaders from across the County
- Conducted qualitative public opinion research via online QualBoard discussion with 28 likely November 2021 voters from Larimer County

May 2021

- Continued to refine scenarios for generating and allocating local tax revenue
- Conducted quantitative public opinion research via poll of 402 likely November 2021 voters from Larimer County

June 2021

- Held the last of five meetings with the Steering Committee to determine recommendations

POLICY PROPOSAL DEVELOPMENT

Case Studies

To inform this process, we studied **five other communities that successfully passed taxes for early childhood** to learn about both the nature and structure of their tax-funded program and the strategy that lead to their success. Specifically, we developed and examined case studies regarding voter-approved, publicly-funded early childhood programs in:

- Denver, CO
- Kent County, MI
- Multnomah County, OR
- San Miguel County, CO
- Summit County, CO

Additionally, we analyzed the results of **eight tax initiatives, considered by Larimer County voters between 2014 and 2020.**

The purpose of this exercise was to learn more about voter responses to tax questions in Larimer County.

Determining Demand & Need

To inform this work, we compiled, analyzed, and presented to the Steering Committee a comprehensive set of data, including:

- Demographic information of families with young children in Larimer County
- Child poverty rate and distribution in Larimer County
- Number and distribution of licensed child care and preschool providers in Larimer County
- Estimated need vs licensed capacity for child care and preschool in Larimer County based on the number of children with all parents in the workforce
- Cost of child care and preschool in Larimer County and percent of family income spent on child care based on Larimer County median income
- Current subsidized funding for early care and education in Larimer County – federal, state, and local sources; public and private

POLICY PROPOSAL DEVELOPMENT (CONT.)

Based on this data, the Committee came to the following conclusions:

- There is a **significant gap between demand for and availability of licensed child care and preschool in Larimer County**: It is estimated that Larimer County needs at least another 3,572 spaces for children from birth to 24 months and another 4,069 spaces for those ages 2 to 5 to close the gap between the number of children with all parents working and the number of licensed slots.
- **Child care is a significant cost burden to working families in Larimer County.**
- **Current funding sources – public and private – are insufficient** to help the community address both availability and affordability of child care and preschool.
- **A sustainable, scalable, high-quality program requires a new, dedicated public funding stream.**

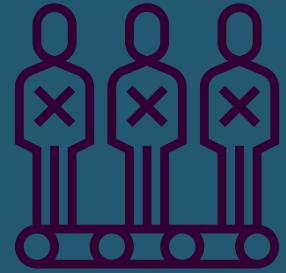
Tax Options

The Steering Committee reviewed data and information, including:

- sales and use taxes
- property taxes
- marijuana taxes

It was determined early in the project that a county tax on marijuana would not generate sufficient revenue to make a meaningful impact on the problem. **The Committee fully investigated both sales and use and property taxes at various levels, considering both policy implications and political viability of each.**

Our public opinion research (methodology described below) showed that a property tax increase, of any amount, was not politically viable. However, public opinion research does show solid voter support for a sales and use tax increase at both the 0.15 percent and 0.25 percent tax increase levels.

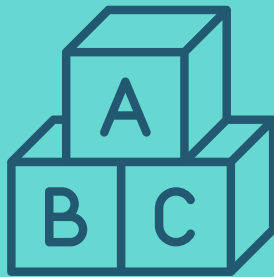

REVENUE ALLOCATION

While the Steering Committee is not recommending a specific revenue allocation formula or specific percentages to the program areas, the group did engage in modeling to understand what approximately \$17M / year would mean to Larimer County both in terms of reducing the cost burden of early learning to working families and in expanding capacity and improving quality of early learning in the county. The Steering Committee considered a variety of scenarios and options. **Through this process, the majority of the Committee came to believe that ~\$17M / year of dedicated local funding would make a meaningful impact on the goals of reducing the affordability burden, expanding capacity and improving quality and, as such, was worth pursuing.**

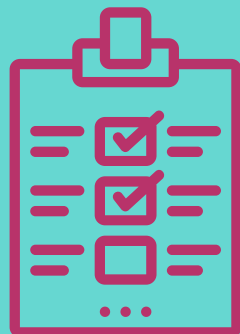
Ultimately, the Committee believes that the County, with guidance and administration support from the Early Childhood Council of Larimer County, should have flexibility to administer the funds within the 4 broad priority categories:

REVENUE ALLOCATION (CONT.)

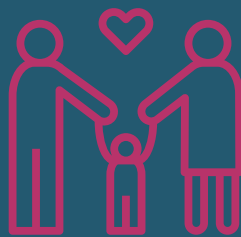
The rationale for this flexibility is to ensure that local dollars can:

- Leverage and maximize federal, state and private funding, which is likely to change over time
- Meet changing community need and demand
- Address localized priorities in differing parts of the county
- Support innovation and respond to best practices for the benefit of children, families and early care and education providers

While the Committee did not want to specifically direct or restrict the use of funds beyond the four program funding priorities, here are a few over-arching principles that the committee came to agreement about in the course of the modeling:



Local funding should support children birth to age five and not focus exclusively on any specific age group.



Families of all incomes should be eligible to receive tuition credit support, however most funds should support families at the lowest income levels; the Committee generally supported the concept of a sliding scale model for child care and preschool subsidies.



Capacity and quality investments should be made to support both:

Workforce / Human Capital - e.g. salary supplements, continuing education, professional development, and training

Physical Capital - e.g. buildings, outdoor spaces, curriculum and materials for existing and new child care and preschool providers

PUBLIC OPINION RESEARCH

We undertook a three-part public opinion research study to better understand the attitudes and opinions of both “grasstops” community leaders and voters and to ultimately determine the political viability of this proposal.

- **In-depth interviews:** Consultants completed **13 interviews with community leaders from all parts of Larimer County** between April 22 and May 4, 2021; the purpose was to get a sense of community priorities and understanding of how early care and education was perceived by community leaders who help set the agenda for the county.
- **Qualboard:** Strategies 360 hosted a **three-day online discussion board with 28 likely 2021 voters** in Larimer County between April 26 and 28, 2021; purpose was to speak to a persuadable group of voters, not a representative one, to get a sense of support and test messaging.
- **Survey:** Strategies 360 conducted a **county-wide poll of 402 likely November 2021 voters** between April 30 and May 5, 2022; purpose was to test viability of proposal, including specific components, and effectiveness of messaging. With these parameters, results will be accurate to within a +/- 4.9% margin of error at the 95% confidence level.



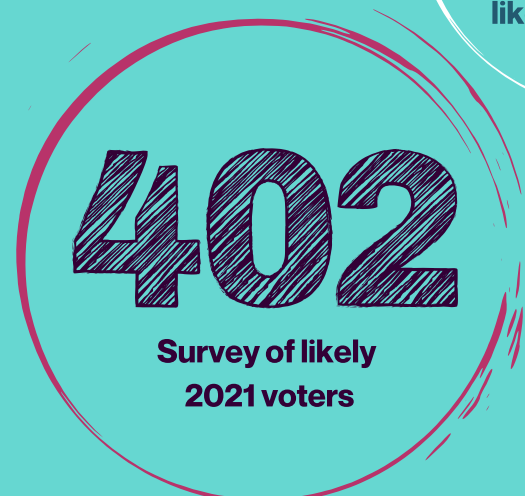

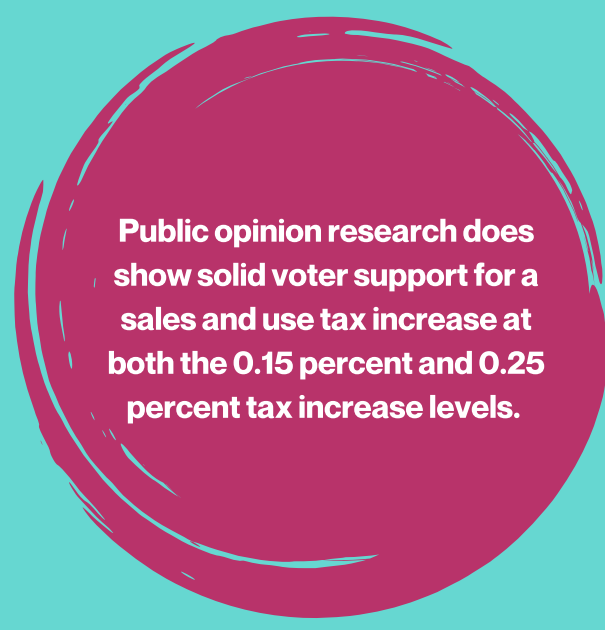

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Magellan Strategies are pleased to present the results of an online survey of 737 residents in the Town of Wellington, Colorado. The interviews were conducted from June 15th to 30th, 2021. This survey has a margin of error of +/- 3.47% at the 95 percent confidence interval. The survey data was weighted to be representative of the adult gender demographics in the Town of Wellington.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Magellan Strategies provides quantitative and qualitative opinion research services to governments, policy groups, and special districts. For the past 15 years, Magellan Strategies has helped governments in Colorado measure and understand resident and voter opinion on a variety of issues. Magellan Strategies conducted this survey at no cost to the Town of Wellington. The Board of Trustees approved the survey questions at the May 18, 2021 Board meeting. 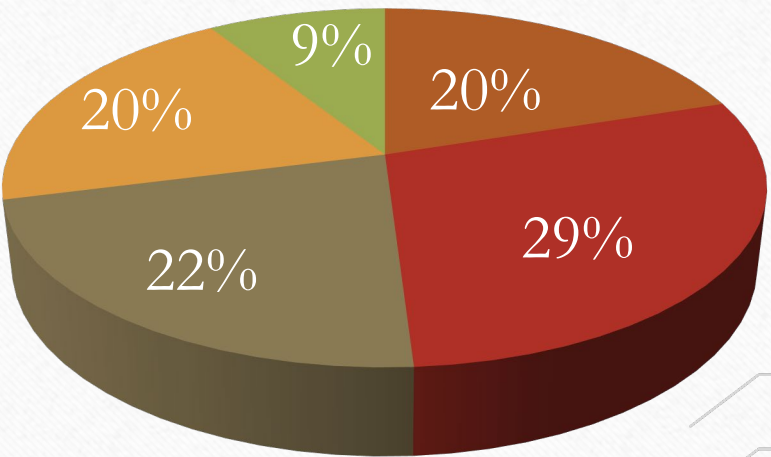
Survey Methodology

- Magellan Strategies are pleased to present the results of an online community of 737 adult residents in Wellington, Colorado.
- The interviews were conducted from June 15th-June 30th, 2021. Survey data collection utilized MMS Text messaging and the Town's website and social media accounts.
- The overall survey responses have a margin of error of 3.47% at the 95% confidence interval. Population subgroups will have a higher margin of error than the overall sample.
- The survey results were weighted on gender to be representative of the demographics of the adult population of Wellington.

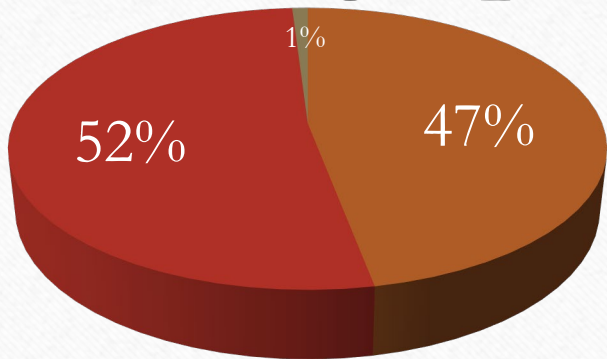

Survey Demographics

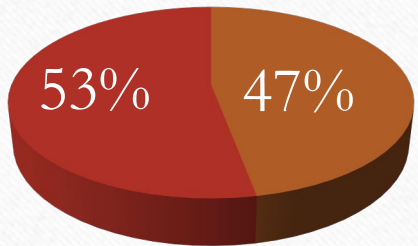
How long have you lived in Wellington?



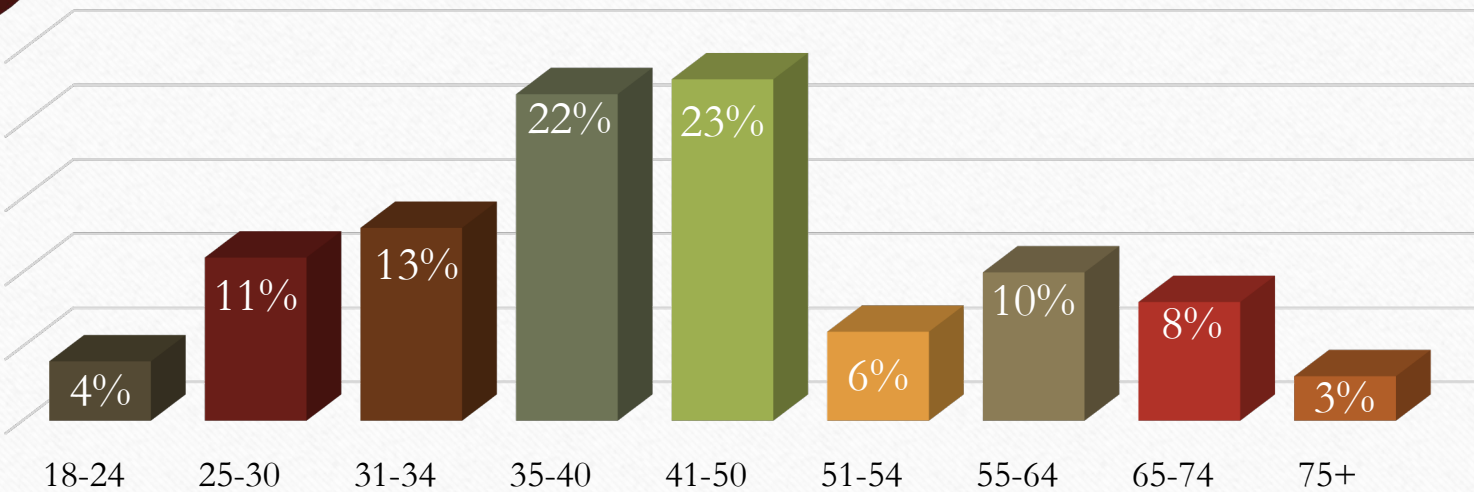

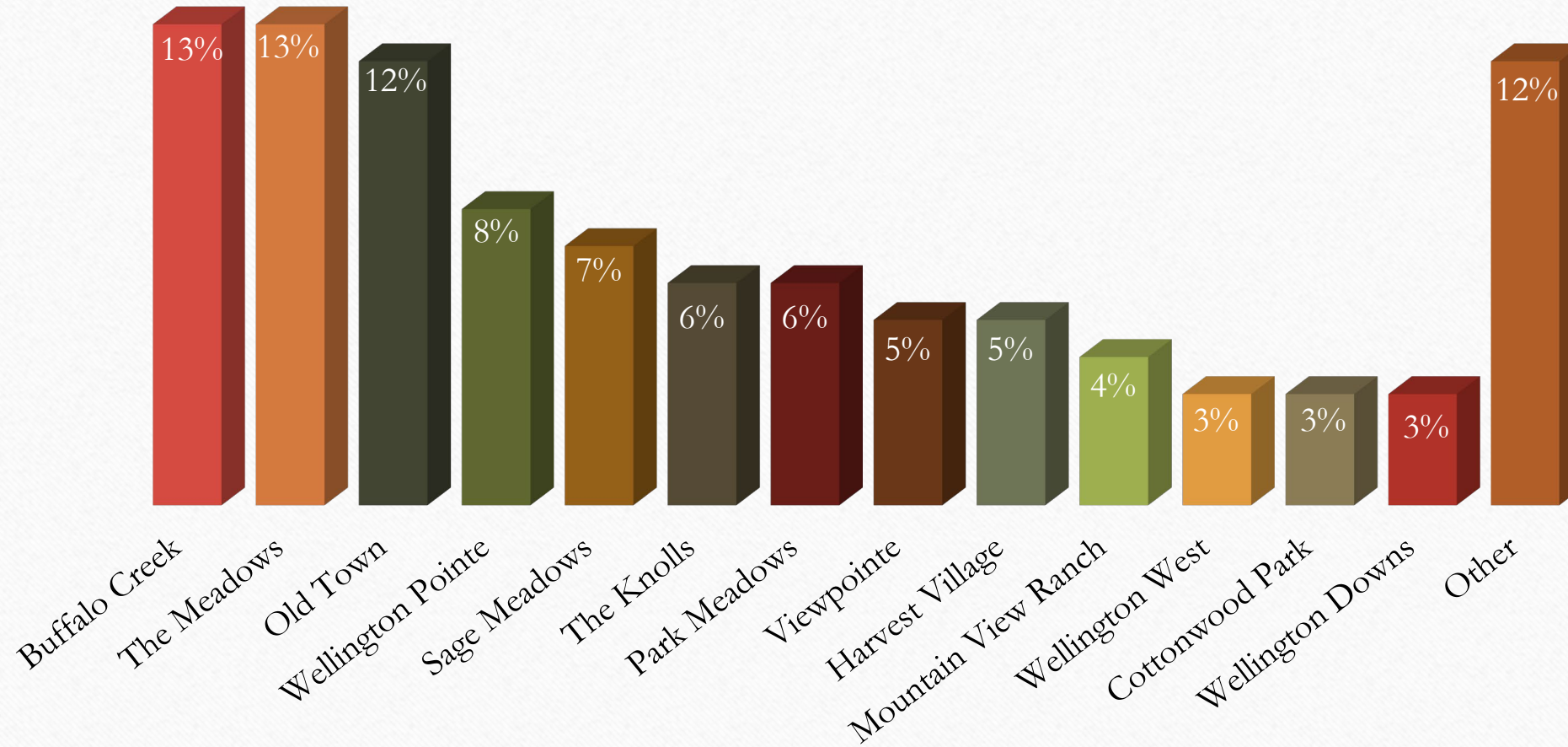

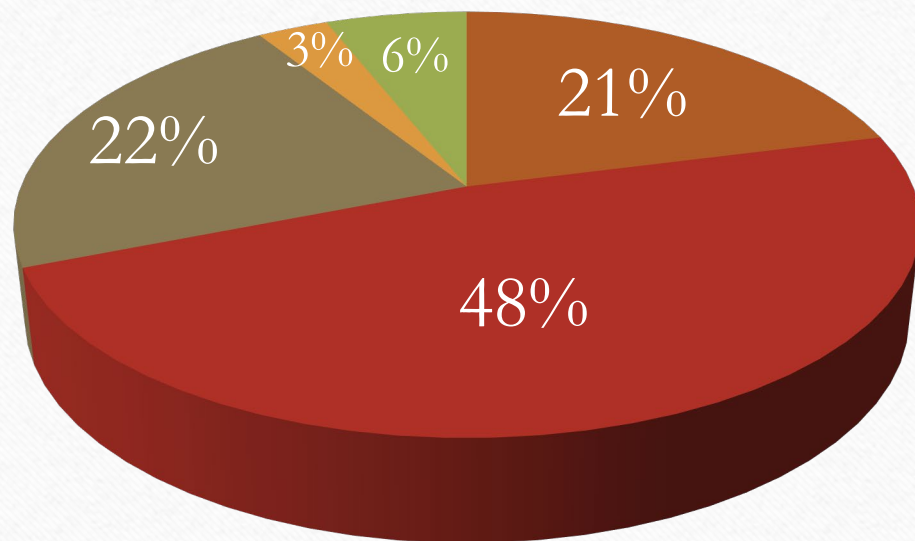

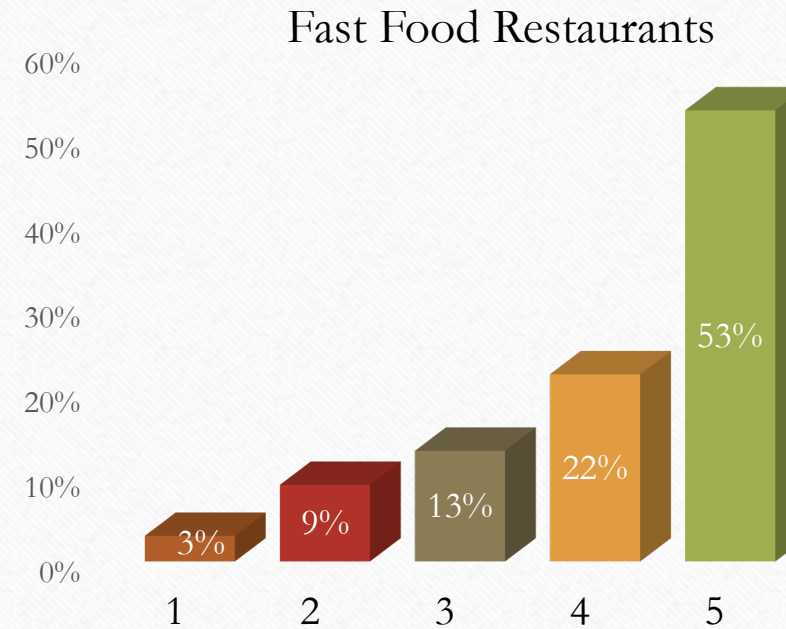
Commercial Business Preferences

Are you currently doing anything to limit your indoor and outdoor water use?

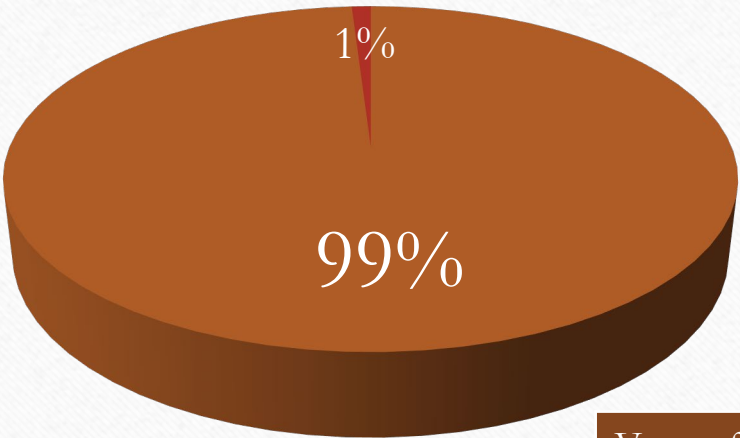

How would you rate the speed of population growth over the past two years in Wellington?

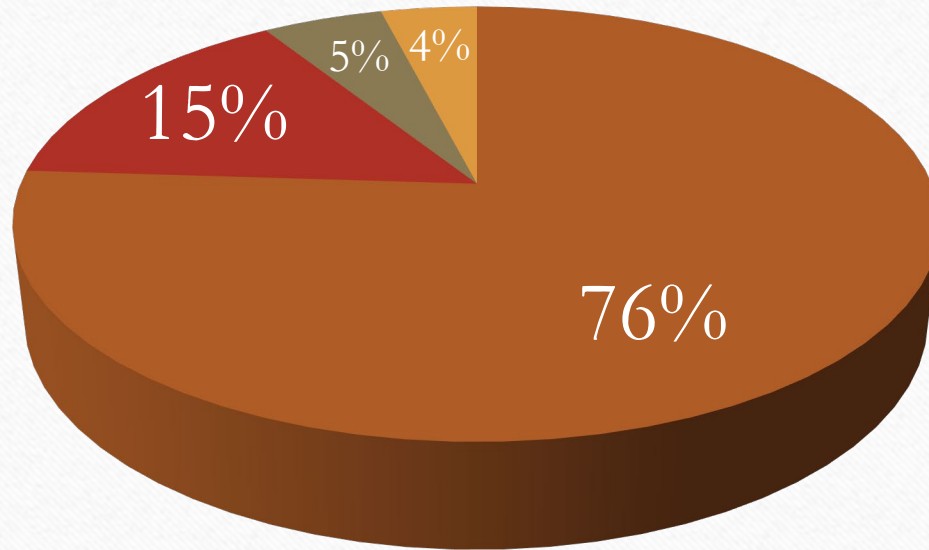

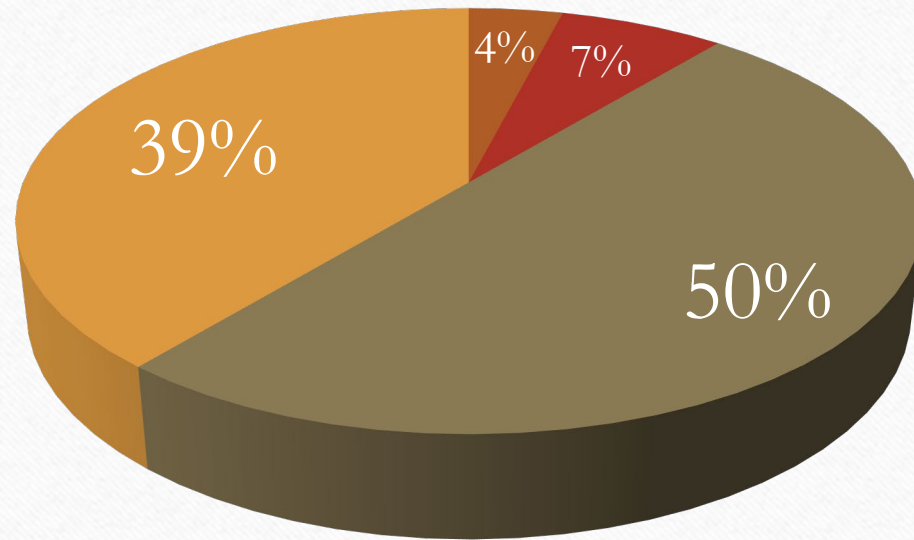

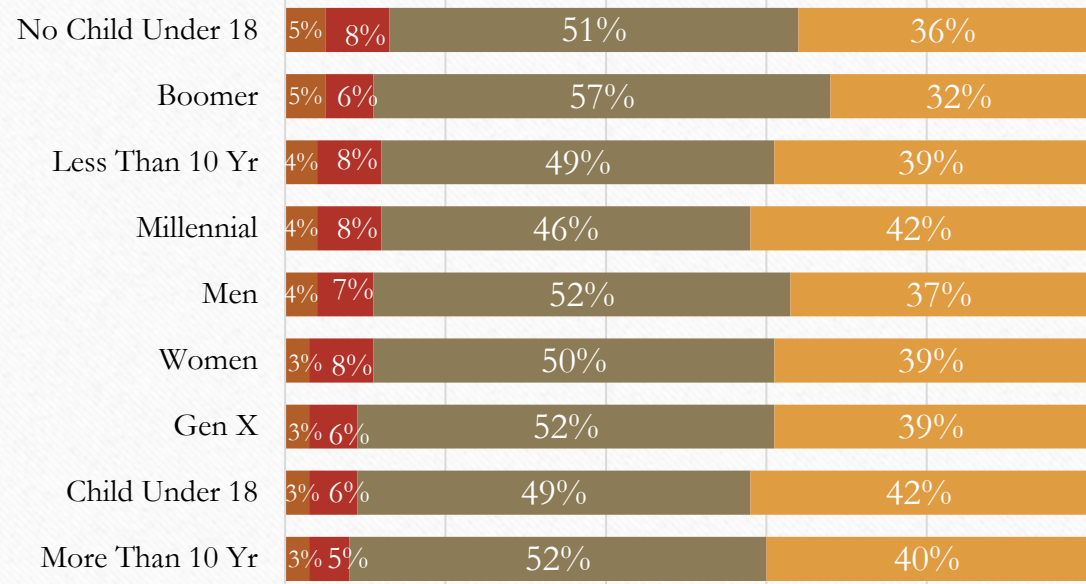

Final Thoughts and Observations

- A majority of residents rate Wellington as a good or excellent place to live (71%) and raise a family (69%). These are strong benchmarks as the Town moves forward.
- As with many communities along Colorado's Front Range, population growth is clearly a contentious issue in Wellington.



Final Thoughts and Observations

- Many of the current issues that residents mentioned can be explained by how they rate the speed of growth over the past two years in Wellington:
 - 78% of respondents said population growth has happened too fast (including 48% who said much too fast).
 - At the same time, 76% of respondents said retail growth has happened too slow (including 38% who said much too slow).



Final Thoughts and Observations

- The frustration with the speed of population growth is seen most clearly in the verbatim responses as residents were asked about their top issue facing the Town.
- A significant number of responses mentioned the increase in water rates, which they directly attributed to population growth. In addition to water rates, the taste and odor of water is a concern for residents.



Final Thoughts and Observations

- There is also clearly a desire for the Town to “catch up” to the population growth by attracting more businesses and restaurants.
- Balancing these competing concerns will be the challenge for the Town moving forward.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The Board of Trustees created the Strategic Plan to guide Town Staff in the projects and topics they hope to address in the next 2 years. This document has allowed staff to prioritize projects and resources throughout the year and ensure that the Town is following an efficient and successful path. Town Staff provided the first update to the Board of Trustees in April to ensure projects and internal work done by staff was aligning with goals set forth by the Strategic Plan. This is the second update reflecting the work done since April 2021.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Strategic Plan outlines 4 Focus Areas: Growth and Development, Infrastructure, Community Engagement, and Organizational Strength.

Focus Area: Growth and Development
Goal 1: Balanced and resilient revenues

- American Rescue Plan Act Money
 - Wellington will be receiving \$2.6 million dollars as a result of the Federal American Rescue Plan Act.
 - The Town has received the first \$1.3 million and another \$1.3 will be coming next year.
 - The use of these funds will be determined by the Board of Trustees pending the final language of permissible uses.
- Fee Schedule Review
 - Staff is currently reviewing all Town fees to determine necessary changes to meet regional market standards.
 - This will come before the board for approval towards the end of the year.

Goal 2: Identify, attract and retain commercial development and businesses

- New Businesses in Town
 - BBQ Love Shack / Old Colorado Brewing Co.
 - Rust
 - Dollar General
 - Human Bean
- Grants Supporting Businesses
 - Town has applied for several grants to support businesses in the town.
 - First is the Revitalizing Main Street Grant awarded for a total of \$149,999
 - Promotes Downtown and Pedestrian Safety
 - Waiting to hear award on downtown improvement grant -Up to \$2 million

- Currently writing the Open for Business Grant for submission
 - This would help with energy efficiency and facade improvements for businesses.
- Staff working with local commercial lenders to promote resources for local businesses.
 - Colorado Local Lending Company
- Main Street Market
 - The Town would like to celebrate the amount of vendors participating every week and the crowds that have come to support the businesses around Town as a result.

Goal 3: Comprehensive Plan - alignment and execution

- Comprehensive plan was adopted by the Planning Commission on August 2, 2021.
 - Land Use Code update will follow in alignment with the Comprehensive Plan.

Goal 4: Develop partnerships for long-term funding strategies

- Highlighted partnerships for this update:
 - Wellington Main Streets:
 - There has been significant collaboration in the search, writing, and execution of grants to support Wellington businesses and infrastructure around the town.
 - Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT):
 - The Town has been working alongside CDOT to promote funding opportunities for improvements to Town infrastructure.
 - North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC):
 - Collaboration is occurring regarding the future of the Water Treatment Plant expansion site and the lease agreements among NPIC and the Town. This partnership is vital to the future of water in Wellington.
 - Northern Water Conservancy District:
 - Northern Water has agreed to support the Town's newly created water conservation program.
 - They have agreed to purchase 100 showerheads and handhelds to help pilot a showerhead exchange program to help residents save water indoors.
 - They will be providing outdoor irrigation audits for residences and HOAs interested in the town. This would allow professional irrigation specialists to come and help residents understand where their irrigation systems are wasting water and the best practices to ensure efficient watering.
 - Finally, they will be performing a technical irrigation audit on Centennial Park to determine the best water saving practices for the Town's irrigation systems as well.
 - Regional partners regarding water
 - Town staff has been working with regional water partners across Northern Colorado to determine possible redundant water supplies and ways to partner for the best interest of our communities.
 - Metro DPA Program
 - The Board of Trustees approved the offering of the Metro DPA program in Wellington on July 13, 2021.
 - This program is a self-funded homeownership and down payment assistance program available to Front Range communities.
 - B Dams

- There continues to be regional collaboration among the participants regarding the B Dams project.
- Larimer County
 - The Town continues to work with Larimer County regarding future election processes and procedures. More to discuss tonight with IGA presentation.

Focus Area: Infrastructure

Goal 1: Ensure adequate current and future water resources, treatment and delivery

- Town is continuing conversations with regional water partners to determine redundant water supplies and possible future partnerships.
- Water Conservation program:
 - Town staff is working with Logan Simpson to update the Town's Landscape and Irrigation standards to align with more efficient outdoor watering practices and drought resistant landscapes.
 - Northern Water Conservancy District has agreed to partner on several projects, including a showerhead exchange project, residential irrigation audits, Town property irrigation audits, and training for Town Staff.
 - CSU Extension held an outdoor irrigation program on July 29 to promote best practices for efficient watering outdoors. This can be rewatched on the Town YouTube Page.
 - Town staff will be holding a Youth Water Conservation Program at the Wellington Public Library including a demonstration of the water treatment plant process.
 - Town staff will also be teaching water conservation classes for residents who have applied for the Hardship Utility Grant.
 - Finally, Town staff continues to replace old residential water meters with automatic meters. The goal of these replacements will be an Advanced Metering system in the future that will help residents with water consumption self-education and leak detection opportunities.
 - All of these programs and projects align with the Town's 2018 adopted Municipal Water Efficiency Plan.

Goal 2: Plan and develop purposeful community and Town facilities

- New Town Hall
 - Town staff is narrowing down 3 alternative sites for the future Town Hall.
 - Infusion architects has conducted a site analysis for Library Park as requested by the Board of Trustees at the January 19 2021 Work Session.
 - They will conduct site analyses for the other 3 alternative sites as well.
 - The \$25,000 DOLA Site Selection grant will expire on September 30, 2021.
 - Town staff will bring a presentation to the Board in September regarding the 4 potential site options.

Goal 3: Create opportunities for transportation and storm water management improvements

- As mentioned above, the Town and the Main Street's program have been working together on several grant opportunities that would improve infrastructure in the downtown corridor.
- Stormwater Master Plan:
 - The Town has hired Icon Engineering for the Stormwater Master Plan and the kickoff meeting has just occurred.

Focus Area: Community Engagement

Goal 1: Build awareness about the Town of Wellington services and programs

- The Town has increased social media presence.
 - April to August, the Facebook reach was up 6% and Instagram was up 36.9%.
 - Yearly, Twitter engagement has been up 384.6%.
- The Town recognizes that not all community members have access to social media.
 - Since the beginning of the year, Town staff has provided printed handbills, banners, water bill stuffers, and advertised at community events in attempt to reach more residents.
- Collaboration among North Forty News and Poudre School District will allow Town news to reach more residents in a timely manner.
- Monthly Newsletter
 - The monthly newsletter was created in December 2020 and is published the first Wednesday of every month.
 - In April 2021, there were 217 subscribers. This has now grown to 485 subscribers.
 - The Town has a 52% open rate which is much higher than the 28.2% government average.
- Promotion of the Hardship Utility Grant approved by the Board of Trustees began on August 4 and will continue throughout the year.
- Community engagement during the Comprehensive Plan process was extensive.
 - This outreach included online engagement, stakeholder meetings, Town Halls, small group/1 on 1 meetings with residents, etc.

Goal 2: Improve access to local government

- Translation services
 - The Town website now has the software available to translate information to allow for better access to all residents.
 - There has been an increase in graphics and social media posts that are translated as well.
- Town staff is working on building a "reports" page on the Town website in preparation for the increased information and details regarding the water and wastewater treatment plant projects.
 - The goal is to promote accessibility for these projects.

Focus Area: Organizational Strength

Goal 1: Provide regular training programs for all employees and develop cross-training plans.

- All staff completed a cybersecurity training provided by the Department of Defense.
- Staff attended a Worker's Compensation training.

Goal 2: Update Personnel Policy

- Town staff is currently updating personnel policies to align with strategic plan goals.

Mayor Hamman asked if there were any amendments to the agenda to which there was none.

4. Conflict of Interest

Mayor Hamman asked if there were any conflicts of interest to which there was none.

B. COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION

1. Public Comment

Mayor Hamman opened the meeting for public comment to which there was none.

2. Presentation

a. Larimer County Sheriff's Office Mental Health Responder Introduction

Sergeant Rairdon with the Larimer County Sheriff's Office introduced Libby Nelson with the Mental Health Co-Responder Program. This summer, Ms. Nelson was added to Berthoud and Wellington to assist with the mental health aspects that arise with calls.

Ms. Nelson informed the Board that she is a licensed professional counselor and licensed addictions counselor through the State of Colorado and has been working with the Sheriff's Office for 2 ½ years.

Mayor Hamman inquired as to how individuals get in touch with Ms. Nelson.

Ms. Nelson stated she is dispatched the same way the deputies are dispatched. Summit Stone has a wide variety of resources and they can respond without law enforcement.

b. Larimer County Sheriff's Office Annual Report

Sergeant Rairdon with the Larimer County Sheriff's Office gave an overview of the Annual Report that was included with packet material. One of the biggest challenges that the Sheriff's Office faced in 2020 was the pandemic. When the schools shut down, the school resource officers were pulled into the community for added patrol. Also, the Sheriff's Office rolled out body cameras in June of 2020.

- Officer initiated activity accounts for approximately 65% of the activity that is done by deputies.
- The number of abandoned vehicles have increased in 2019 and 2020.
- Directed patrols were up from the SRO officer working patrol.
- Fireworks complaints are also up.
- Scams are way up.
- Sex offenses are up (most are violations from family members)
- March, April and May were the busiest months of 2020.
- Monday, Tuesday and Wednesdays are the busiest days.
- Most calls come in between 2:00 pm and 10:00 pm.

Trustee Whitehouse inquired as to what the municipal violations would be.

Sergeant Rairdon stated they would be things like weeds, water violations and yard junk.

Trustee Macdonald inquired as to the community events that the Sheriff's Office has been involved in.

Sergeant Rairdon stated there was not a lot of events in 2020 that the Sheriff's Office is usually involved with although the Drug Takeback Day still happened. The Sheriff's Office was involved in the Easter Egg Hunt as well as the 4th of July event. The Sheriff's Office also likes to get in the community and promote crime prevention to the residents, including the senior and youth populations.

c. Wellington Main Streets Program - Quarter 2 Report

Kallie Cooper, Executive Director Wellington Main Streets Program gave an overview of the Quarter 2 Report that was included in packet material.

– 8:30 pm and online at <https://wellingtonmainstreet.org/shop-wellington-fundraiser>

- The #ShopWellington fundraiser has currently raised \$12,700 towards a 50/50 match grant program that will assist local businesses with the purchase of new exterior signs and awnings. Each project can be awarded up to \$1,000.
- Following the public engagement survey, a grant application was drafted and the program will be launched this fall.

- Main Street Market
 - The Main Street Program is hosting a farmer's/craft market in downtown Wellington on Thursday evenings, July – August in Centennial Park from 5:30 – 8:30 pm.
 - The Main Street Market will feature fresh fruit and vegetables each week and a wide variety of local handmade artisan items and cottage industry products.

- Well-O-Rama Music Festival

 - To date \$11,500 in sponsorships has been raised.

Other:

- Shop Wellington Community Gift Card Program
 - The Wellington Area Chamber of Commerce and Wellington Main Street Program have partnered with Yiftee to provide a brand-new Shop Wellington community gift card program.
 - It is an eGift Card that can be used wherever you might use a gift card, but instead of national brands, it works in local shops and restaurants in the area.
 - They are currently reaching out to our local businesses to register to participate with the goal of making the gift cards available to the public on September 1st, 2021.
- Revitalizing Main Street Grant
 - The Town of Wellington was awarded the Revitalizing Main Street Opportunity 2 Grant for \$149,999 on June 15th.
 - The Wellington Main Street Program will be directing DOLA Mini-grant funds in the amount of \$10,000 as well as funds raised at this year's Well-O-Rama Music Festival towards the project.
 - They presented the grant project to the Board of Trustees on July 13th and have made the PowerPoint information available online.
- Main Street: Open for Business Façade and Energy Efficiency Grant
 - The 'Main Street: Open for Business' grant is open for applications and will close August 23rd.

- Each community is eligible for up to \$1 million in funding with each individual project ranging from \$10,000 - \$150,000 to address façade improvements and energy efficiency upgrades such as HVAC systems, windows, and roofing.
- 16 businesses responded that they were interested in participating in the program.
- Property owners will be required to collect estimates/bids for the work they want completed prior to the Town and Main Street Program applying for the funding.
- Patti Garcia and Kallie Cooper met with a Fort Collins Local Lending Company to discuss providing low-interest loans to businesses that are interested in the grant program but need assistance with the 20% match requirement.
- **Funding**
 - Financial Statements for the Wellington Main Street Program are available upon request
 - The 2021 Wellington Brewfest raised over \$14,000 towards the Wellington Main Street Program that will be directed towards the Exterior Sign and Awning Grant Program as well as the Byron White Memorial Project at the Wellington Public Library.

Trustee Kinney inquired if the match funds for the façade and energy efficiency grants can come from other sources.

Ms. Cooper stated they can come from other sources; currently the match dollars are coming from the businesses.

Trustee Kinney inquired if the Town would like to contribute to those match dollars to encourage more businesses to engage in the program.

Ms. Garcia stated the Town can take a look at what is available and bring something back to the next meeting.

Ms. Cooper stated the façade and energy efficiency grants have a very fast turnaround and would need to be completed by June of 2022.

Trustee Macdonald inquired as to what some of the energy efficiency projects are that have been submitted.

Ms. Cooper stated one downtown business has a freezer on the outside of the structure so in the heat of the summer, it costs them a significant amount to keep that running so they are looking to enclose that area. Other businesses have mentioned new windows, new roofing and pointing brick.

D. ACTION ITEMS

1. Resolution No. 22-2021 - A Resolution Approving the Utility Hardship Program

Ms. Tippetts informed the Board that the Utility Hardship Program was originally presented to the Board at the July 20th work session and staff is requesting \$12,000 from the general fund be used to support the program. The program is used to fill a gap for unexpected hardships and is not intended to be a long-term financial solution. There are several utility assistance programs through the County and the State that are available and those are based on income qualifications. This program was developed to help those that may not meet the income requirements of the County and State programs that may have had some other hardship arise that would reduce their income for a short period of time. A hardship is not being defined for this program although there will need to be documentation shown to substantiate the hardship.

Originally, home based businesses were not allowed to receive the hardship funds although that has been changed since the work session to allow home based businesses to apply for the program.

Other qualifications include:

- Town of Wellington utility customer
- No utility violations
- Sign up for a water education class provided by the Town of Wellington
- Account will need to be kept current to qualify for upcoming years

The other questions on the application include yes or no answers and staff will be reviewing those applications. The yearly maximum for a resident will be \$300.

Trustee Gaiter inquired as to where the funds will be drawn from.

Ms. Tippetts stated it will come from the general fund and a separate line item will be created for this program.

Trustee Gaiter commented that he would like to make sure the water class is facts about water.

Mayor Hamman opened the meeting for public comment to which there was none.

Trustee Kinney moved to approve Resolution 22-2021; Trustee Gaiter seconded the motion. Roll call on the vote resulted as follows:

2. Ordinance No. 08-2021 - An Ordinance Approving a Conditional Use Large Child Care Home on Lot 39, Block 1, Park Meadows Replat, Town of Wellington

Ms. Winne informed the Board that this is a public hearing for a conditional use grant for a large child care home at Lot 39, Block 1, Replat of Park Meadows or otherwise known as 4205 White Deer Lane, Wellington, CO.

The Planning Commission held a public hearing on the application on July 13, 2021 and Wellington Fire District's Chief Green recommended adding a condition for an annual fire and life safety inspection. There was also a community member that had questions regarding the State's licensure requirements. The Planning Commission did forward a recommendation of approval with four conditions.

Little Tykes is a childcare center located at 4205 White Deer Lane, Wellington, CO. State regulations have a large childcare license for in home providers that allows up to 12 children and

when there are 9-12 children, 2 adults must supervise. The applicant currently operates childcare as a home occupation at the location and the municipal code allows childcare as a home occupation. Childcare centers, including large childcare homes, require conditional use approval when located within a residential district. The current application is seeking the conditional use approval to continue their large childcare in their home.

The review criteria outlined in the municipal code in section 16-7-30 have all been met and staff does not have any concerns regarding the application.

Conditional Use approved by Planning Commission on July 13, 2021, with following conditions:

- The conditional use approval terminates upon abandonment of the use for a period of twelve (12) months, a change in ownership; or a change in use; and
- Maintenance of a State of Colorado childcare license;
- Re-application for conditional use approval is required if a new user is licensed at the location but re-application is not necessary if a new adult assistant under current license is added;
- An annual fire and life safety inspection is completed with Wellington Fire Protection District.

Staff recommends approval of Ordinance 08-2021.

Trustee Jerome inquired as to how HB 21-1222 regarding the regulation of family childcare homes that takes effect on September 7, 2021 will affect the conditional use grants currently in place.

Ms. Winne stated the Town is still in the process of figuring out the language and law of that bill and what that does mean for the conditional uses; there are currently 4 in Wellington.

Mr. Sapienza stated there is a lot that still needs to be figured out moving forward although the short answer is that yes, these conditional uses will be preempted by State law. The Town will work with Wellington Fire Protection District in how to work in conjunction to ensure these are safe moving forward.

Trustee Jerome commented that he believed there was a provision pertaining to the fire protection districts health and safety check and that DHS will be coordinating them.

Ms. Sapienza stated DHS will be working with the fire protection districts to create a statewide standard for fire and safety standards.

Trustee Gaiter inquired if it is a State requirement that the facility have a fire and life safety inspection.

Ms. Winne stated that was a recommendation of Chief Green.

Trustee Kinney commented that previously, the Wellington Fire Protection District required a yearly license to operate a childcare facility and based on the new law, the new law will not require that in order to receive a license. In the Planning Commission's best judgement, it is requested through the conditional use grant to complete a yearly inspection.

Trustee Macdonald commented that prior to this law being passed, it was a requirement for the childcare license holder to have a fire and life safety inspection done by the local fire jurisdiction. Prior to this law being passed, there was an annual inspection and operating permit. The Fire District saw this legislation coming and has been working with the Planning Department so in moving forward, these inspections are to address a concern and not collect a profit. The inspection looks at things like smoke detectors and basement window wells. This is not an opportunity to be

invasive or regulatory, this is an opportunity to ensure the safety of children.

The applicant, Mr. Magana informed the Board that the inspection has already been done and the Fire Protection District was very cooperative and there was no charge for the inspection. There were recommendations made from that inspection and when the Fire Protection District came back to review the recommended changes, there was a fee for that. The State does require a monthly log on how long it takes to get all the children out of the house.

Trustee Gaiter inquired of the additional inspection condition concerns the applicant.

Mr. Magana stated it did not as they are in compliance and he keeps his children there was well. The cost is another cost for operation.

Trustee Kinney commented that there shouldn't be a cost for the inspection moving forward.

Trustee Macdonald commented that moving forward, there will not be a fee charged for in-home childcare licensing inspections.

Mayor Hamman opened the meeting for public comment to which there was none.

Trustee Kinney moved to approve Ordinance 08-20201; Trustee Macdonald seconded the motion. Roll call on the vote resulted as follows:

3. Resolution 21-2021 - A Resolution Appointing a Campaign Finance Complaint Hearing Officer
Mr. Sapienza informed the Board that on July 13, 2021 the Board passed an ordinance to create a campaign finance complaint process due to the Colorado Secretary of State's Office no longer hears those complaints from municipal elections. At that meeting, it was requested that the Town look at appointing a complaint hearing officer to conduct those hearings. After a conversation with the municipal judge, Resolution 21-2021 was drafted which appoints the current municipal judge as the campaign finance complaint hearing officer.

Mayor Hamman opened the meeting for public comment to which there was none.

Trustee Whitehouse moved to approve Resolution 21-2021; Trustee Gaiter seconded the motion. Roll call on the vote resulted as follows:

1. Wellington Main Streets Program - Special Event Permit Application

Ms. Eucker informed the Board that Wellington Main Streets Program (WMSP) has submitted an application for a Special Event Permit to serve malt, vinous and spirituous liquor on August 7, 2021 during Well-O-Rama Music Festival and Games. WMSP has submitted all documentation for the permit including the application, premise map and permission for use of the premise, non-profit status with the Colorado Secretary of State and the special event questionnaire.

The Well-O-Rama event will take place on August 7, 2021 from 3:00 - 7:00 p.m. and it is anticipated that 500-800 individuals will attend the event. Alcohol will be provided from Soul Squared Brewing, Sparge Brewing, Cantina Liquor and Old Colorado Brewing. Alcohol will be served by TIPS certified employees of the breweries as well as TIPS certified volunteers from Overland Sertoma. The food trucks scheduled to be onsite are The Cakery, Matador Food Truck and Lavish Dogs. Individuals that will be served alcohol will have ID's checked and will be provided a wristband. Security for the event will be provided by Overland Sertoma with eight officers over a four-hour period.

Trustee Kinney commented that she will be recusing herself from the vote due to her involvement in the event.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In order to reserve the Town's ability to participate in the November 2021 coordinated election, the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder requires formal notice pursuant to state statute and execution of an intergovernmental agreement (IGA). The IGA outlines the duties of the entities involved. Also, a cost estimate is attached to the IGA which is based on various other entities that may also coordinate their election with Larimer County.

The Town of Wellington will designate Krystal Eucker, Town Clerk as it's Designated Election Official to act as the primary liaison between the Town and Larimer County.

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE PARTICIPATION OF THE TOWN IN THE NOVEMBER 2021 COORDINATED ELECTION AND APPROVING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON AND LARIMER COUNTY FOR COORDINATED ELECTION SERVICES FOR THE NOVEMBER 2021 ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington has determined that participating in a coordinated election managed through the office of the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder will allow the town's 2021 election to be performed in a cost-effective manner that will reduce confusion to residents; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Wellington has notified the County Clerk and Recorder for Larimer County that the Town may be referring a ballot question and an initiated ordinance for voter approval on the official ballot for the November 2, 2021 election; and

WHEREAS, the Larimer County Election Official has presented the *Intergovernmental Agreement for 2021 Coordinate Election (IGA)* containing the requirements for Town participation in the November 2, 2021 election.

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Board of Trustees for the Town of Wellington, Colorado, as follows:

1. The Board of Trustees hereby authorizes participation in the Larimer County coordinated election to be held on November 2, 2021 and authorizes the Town Clerk to submit formal notice to the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder pursuant to C.R.S. 1-7-116(5).
2. The Board of Trustees hereby approves the terms and conditions of the attached Intergovernmental Agreement for 2021 Coordinated Election between the Town of Wellington and the County of Larimer.
3. The Mayor of the Town of Wellington is hereby authorized to execute the IGA on behalf of the Town.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR 2021 COORDINATED ELECTION

This Intergovernmental Agreement ("Agreement") is entered into by and between the Larimer County Clerk and Recorder ("County Clerk") and the **Town of Wellington** ("Entity"). Agreement is made effective upon the signature of Entity and County Clerk.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, County Clerk and Entity are authorized to conduct elections as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, County Clerk will conduct Election as a "Mail Ballot Election," as such term is defined in the Uniform Election Code of 1992, C.R.S. Title 1, as amended ("Code") and the current Colorado Secretary of State Election Rules, as amended ("Rules"); and

WHEREAS, Entity has certain ballot race(s), ballot question(s) and/or ballot issue(s) to present to its eligible electors and desires to coordinate with County Clerk; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. §1-7-116(2), as amended, County Clerk and Entity shall enter into an agreement for the administration of their respective duties concerning the conduct of the Coordinated Election to be held on November 2, 2021, ("Election"), and said agreement must be executed no less than 70 days prior to the Election which is August 24, 2021.

NOW, THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the promises herein contained, the sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, County Clerk and Entity agree as follows:

ARTICLE I PURPOSE AND GENERAL MATTERS

A. Goal.

The purpose of Agreement is to set forth the respective tasks in order to conduct Election and to allocate the cost thereof.

B. Coordinated Election Official.

County Clerk shall act as the Coordinated Election Official ("CEO") in accordance with Code and Rules and shall conduct Election for Entity.

County Clerk designates Doreen Bellfy, whose telephone number is 970.498.7941, cell is 970.237.0096, email is dbellfy@larimer.org, and fax is 970.498.7847, to act as the primary liaison ("Contact Officer") between County Clerk and Entity. Contact Officer shall act under the authority of County Clerk and shall have primary responsibility for the coordination of Election with Entity.

C. Designated Election Official.

Entity designates _____ as its Designated Election Official ("DEO"), whose phone is _____, cell is _____, email is _____ and fax is _____, to act as the primary liaison between Entity and Contact Officer. DEO shall have primary responsibility for Election procedures to be handled by Entity. DEO shall act in accordance with Code and Rules. DEO shall be readily available and accessible during regular business hours, and at other times when notified by Contact Officer in advance, for the purposes of consultation and decision-making on behalf of Entity. In addition, DEO is responsible for receiving and timely responding to inquiries made by its voters or others interested in Entity's election.

D. Jurisdictional Limitation.

Entity encompasses territory within Larimer County, Colorado. Agreement shall be construed to apply only to that area of Entity situated within Larimer County.

E. Term.

The term of Agreement shall be through December 31, 2021 and shall apply only to Election.

**ARTICLE II
DUTIES OF COUNTY CLERK**

A. Voter Registration.

Supervise, administer and provide necessary facilities and forms for all regular voter registration sites.

B. Ballot Preparation.

1. Lay out the text of the ballot in a format that complies with Code and Rules. **In accordance with Colorado Secretary of State Rule 4.5(b), County Clerk requires that each ballot question and ballot issue be not more than 250 words. Additional costs incurred for ballot language length exceeding 250 words are referenced in Article IV(A)(6).**
2. Assign the letter and/or number of Entity's ballot question(s) or ballot issue(s) which will appear on the ballot and provide this assignment to Entity.

3. Provide ballot printing layouts and text for Entity's review and signature. If Entity fails to provide approval by the required deadline, the content is to be considered approved.
4. Certify the ballot content to the printer(s).
5. Contract for ballots.

C. Voter Lists.

Upon request of Entity, create and certify a list of registered voters containing the names and addresses of each elector registered to vote in Entity.

D. Property Owners.

Only applicable to Elections conducted under titles where owning property in the political subdivision is a requirement for voting in the election.

1. Provide mail ballot packets to all eligible property owners who are registered to vote at the eligible property address.
2. Mail affidavits to all property owners within Entity as stipulated in the "Duties of Entity", Article III(G). Each eligible elector who resides outside Entity, but is registered to vote in the State of Colorado, must complete, sign and return the affidavit to County Clerk. Those electors that reside on the property will not be required to complete the affidavit.

3. Provide mail ballot packets to all eligible property owners who do not reside on the property but are registered electors of the State of Colorado, upon receipt and verification of a signed affidavit.

E. Election Judges.

Appoint and compensate a sufficient number of election judges to conduct Election.

F. Mail Ballot.

1. Mail ballot packets to every active registered elector and conduct Election in accordance with C.R.S. Title 1, Article 7.5.
2. Establish drop boxes in accordance with C.R.S. §1-5-102.9(5)(a) for the purposes of allowing electors to drop-off their completed mail ballots.

G. Voter Service and Polling Center (“VSPC”) sites.

1. Establish VSPC sites in accordance with C.R.S. §1-5-102.9, coordinate the location and operation of the VSPC sites, and conduct all accessibility site surveys.
2. Obtain and provide all ballots, forms, equipment and supplies necessary for mail and accessible voting.
3. Obtain and provide all ballots, forms, equipment and supplies necessary to verify and issue ballots to property owners who are registered to vote in the State of Colorado but who do not reside in Entity. *Only applicable to Elections conducted under titles where owning property in the political subdivision is a requirement for voting in Election.*
4. Provide all necessary Election personnel to conduct Election.

H. Voting Jurisdiction.

Pursuant to C.R.S. §1-5-303 and subject to Entity providing the information referenced in Article III(C)(1), County Clerk shall provide an Address Library Report from the Statewide Colorado Voter Registration and Election database (“Address Library Report”) no later than August 9, 2021, which will list the street addresses located in both Entity and Larimer County according to the statewide voter registration system. In order to create Address Library Report, County Clerk must first receive from Entity the information referenced in Article III(C)(1).

I. Election Day Preparation.

1. Provide, no later than twenty days before Election, notice by publication of a mail ballot election. Such notice shall satisfy the publication requirement for all entities participating in Election pursuant to C.R.S. §1-5-205(1.4).
2. Prepare and conduct pre-election logic and accuracy testing in accordance with C.R.S. §1-7-509 and Rules.
3. Provide necessary electronic voting equipment together with personnel and related computer equipment for pre-election logic and accuracy testing and Election Day needs.
4. Prepare and conduct a risk-limiting audit in accordance with C.R.S. §1-7-515 and Rules.

J. TABOR Notice.

1. Coordinate the printing and labeling of the TABOR notice and mail it to all registered voters within Entity not less than thirty days prior to Election in compliance with Article X, Section 20 of the Colorado Constitution and any applicable Code and Rules.
2. Charge Entity for all expenses associated with printing, labeling and mailing (postage) for the TABOR notice. Said expenses shall be prorated among all Entities participating in the TABOR notice. Such proration shall be based, in part, upon the number of addresses where one or more active registered voters of Entity reside.
3. Determine the least cost method for mailing the TABOR notice and address the TABOR notice to "All Registered Voters" at each address in Larimer County where one or more active registered voters of Entity reside.
4. Nothing herein shall preclude County Clerk from sending the TABOR notice of Entity to persons in addition to the electors of Entity, if such sending arises from County Clerk's efforts to mail the TABOR notice at the least cost.

K. Counting Ballots.

1. Conduct and oversee the ballot counting process and report the results by entity.
2. Establish backup procedures and backup sites for ballot counting should counting equipment and/or building facilities fail. In such event, counting procedures will be moved to a predetermined site.

L. Certifying Results.

1. Appoint, instruct and oversee the Board of Canvassers.
2. Certify the results of Entity's Election within the time required by law and provide Entity with a copy of all Election statements and certificates required under Code and Rule.
3. Conduct a recount (if called for) in accordance with Code and Rule.

M. Recordkeeping.

1. Retain all Election records as required by C.R.S. § 1-7-802.
2. Keep an accurate account of all Election costs.

N. No Expansion of Duties.

Nothing contained in Agreement is intended to expand the duties of County Clerk beyond those set forth in Code or Rules.

ARTICLE III DUTIES OF ENTITY

A. Authority.

Provide County Clerk with a copy of the ordinance or resolution stating that Entity will participate in Election in accordance with the terms and conditions of Agreement. The ordinance or resolution shall further authorize the presiding officer of Entity or other designated person to execute Agreement.

B. Call and Notice.

Publish all notices relative to Election which Entity is required to provide pursuant to Code, Rules, Entity's Charter and any other statute, rule or regulation.

C. Voting Jurisdiction – Certifying Entity Address Boundaries.

1. If Entity is not already identified by a tax authority code in the County Assessor's records, Entity must:
 - Provide County Clerk with a legal description, map and listing of street addresses located within Entity in Larimer County, no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 2, 2021.
 - This information must be provided to County Clerk in Microsoft Excel and must include "high/low" street address ranges for both "odd/even" sides of each street.
 - Certify the accuracy of such information.
2. If Entity has annexed any properties into Entity since January 1, 2021, Entity must:
 - Provide County Clerk with a legal description, map and listing of street addresses for all properties annexed into Entity in Larimer County, no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 2, 2021.
 - This information must be provided to County Clerk in Microsoft Excel and must include "high/low" street address ranges for both "odd/even" sides of each street.
 - Certify the accuracy of such information.
3. Review all information in Address Library Report referenced in Article II(H) and ensure that Address Library Report is an accurate representation of the streets contained within Entity's legal boundaries.
4. Indicate on Address Library Report Sign-Off Form ("Sign-Off Form") whether any changes are needed, or whether Address Library Report is complete and accurate.
 - If Entity requests any changes to Address Library Report on Sign-Off Form, County Clerk will make the requested changes and return the amended Address Library Report to Entity along with a second Sign-Off Form, no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 20, 2021.
5. Entity must return the final certified Sign-Off Form to County Clerk, no later than 5:00 p.m. on August 24, 2021.

D. Petitions, Preparation and Verification.

Perform all responsibilities required to certify any candidate, initiative petition, question or issue to the ballot.

E. Ballot Preparation.

1. Determine whether a ballot race, ballot question, or ballot issue is properly placed before the voters.
2. Prepare a list of candidates and the ballot title and text for each ballot question and ballot issue. **County Clerk requires that each ballot question and ballot issue be not more than 250 words in accordance with Colorado Secretary of State Rule 4.5(b). Additional costs incurred for ballot language length exceeding 250 words are referenced in Article IV(A)(6).**

Each ballot issue or ballot question submitted shall be followed by the words "yes/for" and "no/against".

3. Provide a certified copy of the ballot content [race(s), question(s) and issue(s)] to County Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on September 3, 2021, pursuant to C.R.S. § 1-5-203(3)(a). Entity must provide certified ballot content as an email attachment to elections@co.larimer.co.us.

The ballot content must be certified exactly in the order in which it is to be printed on the ballot pages and sample ballots in the following format:

File Format: Microsoft Word (.doc or .docx)

Font Type: Arial

Font Size: 8 point

Justification: Left

All Margins: 0.5 inches

The certified list of ballot race(s), ballot question(s) and/or ballot issue(s) submitted by Entity shall be final.

4. Proofread and approve Entity's ballot content for printing immediately upon receipt from County Clerk. Entity must provide an email address and designate a person to be available for proofing and approving ballot content for printing.

Due to time constraints, Entity must provide contact information for someone who is available from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. from September 3, 2021 until September 13, 2021, or until final approval of printing of ballots has been reached. County Clerk agrees to keep all contact personnel informed of ballot printing status. Entity has designated _____, whose phone is _____, cell is _____, email is _____ and fax is _____.

Once approval has been received, County Clerk will not make any changes to the ballot content. If Entity fails to provide approval by the required deadline, the content will be considered approved.

5. Ensure that Entity's certified candidates file all Campaign and Political Finance forms required by the Colorado Secretary of State Rules Concerning Campaign and Political Finance online at <http://tracer.sos.colorado.gov>.

6. Provide (or ensure that Entity's certified candidates provide) an audio pronunciation of all candidates' names as they have been certified to County Clerk, no later than 5:00 p.m. on September 3, 2021. See Exhibit B for details.

7. Defend and resolve at Entity's sole expense all challenges relative to the ballot race(s), ballot question(s) and/or ballot issue(s) as certified to County Clerk for inclusion in Election.

F. Election Participation.

If requested by County Clerk, provide person(s) to participate and assist in Election process. The person(s) provided by Entity must be registered to vote in Larimer County.

G. Property Owners.

Only applicable to Elections conducted under titles where owning property in the political subdivision is a requirement for voting in Election.

1. Notify and provide information and materials to property owners regarding the location(s) which an eligible elector may vote at any VSPC site.
2. Obtain a list of Entity's property owners from the County Assessor's office in accordance with C.R.S. §1-5-304. Property owners listed in the County Assessor's property records may not be eligible electors of Entity. Entity must review and verify the eligibility of property owners to receive ballots regarding Entity's Ballot Issue(s).

Entity must provide an initial list of eligible electors who are registered to vote in Colorado and own property within Entity to County Clerk, no later than September 23, 2021, and must provide a final list of eligible electors who are registered to vote in Colorado and own property within Entity to County Clerk, no later than October 13, 2021. The list must be in Excel (.xls/.xlsx) format and must include the following columns:

Owner Name
Property Address
Property Parcel Number
Mailing Address
Mailing City
Mailing State
Mailing Zip

Each property owner must be listed as a separate entry. Exclude property owners who are already registered to vote within Entity.

Exclude Trusts, LLC, Corporations and Entities if ineligible to vote – *consult legal counsel.*

H. TABOR Notice.

1. Prepare the language for the TABOR notice [for any ballot issue(s) that require a TABOR notice] in compliance with Article X, Section 20 of the Colorado Constitution and any pertinent Code and Rules.

Entity shall be solely responsible for timely providing to County Clerk a complete TABOR notice. County Clerk shall in no way be responsible for Entity's compliance with TABOR or the accuracy or sufficiency of any TABOR notice.

2. Receive written comments relating to ballot issue(s) and summarize such comments, as required by TABOR.
3. Certify and submit all TABOR notice content, including pro and con summaries and fiscal information, to County Clerk no later than 5:00 p.m. on September 20, 2021, pursuant to C.R.S. §1-7-904. Such notice shall be provided to County Clerk as an email attachment to elections@co.larimer.co.us in the following format:

File Format: Microsoft Word (.doc/docx)

Font Type: Arial

Font Size: 8 point

Justification: Left

All Margins: 0.5 inches

Entity shall be solely responsible for the preparation, accuracy and contents of its TABOR notice(s). The certified TABOR notice, including all text, summary of comments and fiscal information shall be final. County Clerk may correct any spelling, grammar or formatting errors identified in Entity's certified TABOR notice, so long as those corrections do not change or otherwise impact the meaning of Entity's TABOR notice content.

4. Proofread and approve Entity's TABOR notice content for printing. Due to time constraints, Entity must provide an email address and designate a person to be available for proofing and approving TABOR notice content for printing from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. from September 20, 2021 until September 24, 2021, or until final approval of the TABOR notice has been reached. County Clerk agrees to keep all contact personnel informed of TABOR notice printing status. Entity has designated _____, whose phone is _____, cell is _____, email is _____ and fax is _____.

Once approval has been received, County Clerk will not make any changes to the TABOR notice content. If Entity fails to provide approval by the required deadline, the content will be considered approved.

5. Mail the TABOR notice to each address of one or more active registered electors who own property but who do not reside within Entity in accordance with C.R.S. §1-7-906(2).

I. Cancellation of Election by Entity.

If Entity resolves not to participate in Election, Entity must immediately deliver to Contact Officer written notice that it is withdrawing one or more ballot questions or ballot issues; provided, however that Entity may not cancel after the 25th day prior to Election, October 8, 2021, pursuant to C.R.S. §1-5-208(2).

Entity must reimburse County Clerk for the actual expenses incurred in preparing for Election. If cancellation occurs after the certification deadline, full election costs may be incurred. Entity must publish all notices relative to Election which Entity is required to provide pursuant to Code, Rules, Entity's Charter and any other statute, rule or regulation.

ARTICLE IV COSTS

A. Election Costs.

The minimum fee for election services is \$650.00.

1. Entity's proportional share of costs shall be based on County expenditures relative to Election and the **number of eligible electors per Entity**, in accordance with C.R.S. §1-7-116(2)(b). Costs include, but are not limited to:

- Supplies
- Printing
- Postage
- Legal notices
- Temporary labor
- Other expenses attributable to County Clerk's administration of Election for Entity

Entity shall be charged its **prorated** share of Election costs for any software programs used to count voted ballots as well as pre-election and post-election maintenance and on-site technical support.

2. Entity affirms that it has sufficient funds available in its approved budget to pay its prorated Election expenses.
3. If it is determined that counting must be moved to an established backup site, Entity shall be charged its prorated share.
4. The cost of any recount(s) will be charged to Entity, or if more than one Entity is involved in the recount, the cost will be prorated among the Entities participating in the recount.
5. Upon receipt of the invoice, pay to County Clerk within thirty days costs in an amount determined in accordance with the formula set forth on Exhibit A Cost Estimate. At the time of the mailing of Agreement, a preliminary Exhibit A Cost Estimate will be provided in three parts:
 - A1 (without State of Colorado or Larimer County participation)
 - A2 (without Larimer County participation)
 - A3 (with State of Colorado and Larimer County participation)

A final Exhibit A Cost Estimate will be provided once all Entities have been certified to the ballot.

6. **Entity shall pay any additional or unique election costs resulting from Entity delays and/or special preparations or cancellations relating to Entity's participation in Election. Special preparations can include, but are not limited to: Ranked Choice Voting, ballot addendums, affidavits, ballot language length exceeding 250 words or multiple page ballot.**

B. TABOR Costs.

The minimum fee for TABOR services is \$350.00.

Entity shall pay a prorated amount for the costs to coordinate, label and print the TABOR notice, and for the mailing of such notice. Such proration to be based, in part, on addresses where one or more active registered electors of Entity reside.

C. Invoice.

County Clerk shall submit to Entity an invoice for all costs incurred under Agreement and Entity shall remit to County Clerk the total due upon receipt. Any amount not paid within 30 days after receipt will be subject to an interest charge at the lesser of 1 ½% per month or the highest rate permitted under law.

**ARTICLE V
MISCELLANEOUS**

A. Entire Agreement.

Agreement and its Exhibits constitute the entire agreement between County Clerk and Entity as to the subject matter hereof and supersede all prior or current agreements, proposals, negotiations, understandings, representations and all other communications, both oral and written.

B. Liability and Immunity.

County Clerk and Entity agree to be responsible for its own wrongful or negligent acts and omissions, and those of its officers, agents and employees, to the extent required by law, subject to and without waiving the notice requirements, immunities, rights, benefits, defenses, limitations, and protections available under the Colorado Governmental Immunity Act as currently written or hereafter amended.

In the event a court of competent jurisdiction finds Election for Entity was void or otherwise fatally defective as a result of the sole breach or failure of County Clerk to perform in accordance with Agreement or laws applicable to Election, Entity shall be entitled to recover expenses or losses caused by such breach or failure up to the maximum amount paid by Entity to County Clerk under this Agreement. County Clerk shall in no event be liable for any expenses, damages or losses in excess of the amounts paid under Agreement. This remedy shall be the sole and exclusive remedy for the breach available to Entity.

C. Conflict of Agreement with Law, Impairment.

Should any provision of Agreement be determined by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or otherwise null and void, it is the intent of County Clerk and Entity hereto that the remaining provisions of Agreement shall be of full force and effect.

D. Time of Essence.

Time is of the essence in the performance of Agreement. The time requirements of Code and Rules shall apply to completion of required tasks.

E. No Third Party Beneficiaries.

Enforcement of the terms and conditions of Agreement and all rights of action relating to such enforcement shall be strictly reserved to County Clerk and Entity, and nothing contained herein shall give or allow any such claim or right of action by any other person or Entity.

F. Governing Law; Jurisdiction & Venue.

Agreement, the interpretation thereof, and the rights of County Clerk and Entity under it will be governed by, and construed in accordance with, the laws of the State of Colorado. The courts of the State of Colorado shall have sole and exclusive jurisdiction of any disputes or litigation arising under

Agreement. Venue for any and all legal actions arising shall lie in the District Court in and for the County of Larimer, State of Colorado.

G. Headings.

The section headings in Agreement are for reference only and shall not affect the interpretation or meaning of any provision of Agreement.

H. Severability.

If any provision of Agreement is declared by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void or unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed to be severable, and all other provisions of Agreement shall remain fully enforceable, and Agreement shall be interpreted in all respects as if such provision were omitted.

I. Amendments/Modifications.

Amendments or strikethroughs to this Agreement are not allowed without written consent of both parties.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The sales tax split of 1% between streets and parks will sunset December 31, 2021. The ordinance being considered would place the a question on the November ballot to ask the Wellington voters if they would like to continue that practice.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town of Wellington had a sales tax rate of 2% until 1998 when the voters approved an additional 1% for construction and reconstruction of Wellington streets. In 2011 the voters approved that between January 1, 2012 through December 31, 2021 that the 1% could also be for parks, trails and open spaces. Based on the 2011 ballot language, the split ends (sunsets) on December 31, 2021. The revenue from this split has been included in the 5 year capital improvement plan for both streets and parks.

The 1% revenue brought in the following over the past couple of years:

- 2019 - \$619,086 (100% to Park fund)
- 2020 - \$801,940 (\$400,970 to Park fund and \$400,970 to Street fund)
- 2021 – YTD \$515,014 (\$257,507 to Park fund and \$257,507 to Street fund)

Expenses for the same funds are as follows:

- 2019 – Parks - \$1,286,466; Streets - \$1,406,525
- 2020 – Parks - \$1,367,265; Streets - \$1,395,813
- 2021 – YTD Parks budget - \$2,195,164; Streets - \$3,134,236

As a reminder, the Town secured a \$2.4M bond for parks – a 10-year note with an annual payment of \$269k. The balance at the end of 2021 will be \$779,879.

The 1% sales tax designated for street construction and reconstruction does not have a sunset and will continue regardless of the outcome of the ballot question. The question is to determine if the split to the parks fund would continue to 2031.

Staff has reached out to the Larimer County Clerk & Recorder Elections team to see if there would be an additional expense if Wellington added another question in addition to the marijuana questions already proposed. We have understood that there would be no additional cost to participate in the coordinated election.

If the Board of Trustees approves putting this question on the November 2021 ballot, staff will work to create



educational materials to help citizens understand that this is not an additional tax but a split of sales tax that is already being collected.

ORDINANCE NO. 09-2021

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR A SPECIAL ELECTION BY THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, REFERRING THE QUESTION OF WHETHER A ONE PERCENT (1%) SALES AND USE TAX PREVIOUSLY APPROVED BY THE VOTERS FOR THE CONSTRUCTION AND RECONSTRUCTION OF WELLINGTON STREETS MAY ALSO BE USED TO PAY COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH DEVELOPMENT AND MAINTENANCE OF WELLINGTON PARKS, TRAILS AND OPEN SPACES.

WHEREAS, in 1998 the Wellington Board of Trustees identified the need to remedy the poor condition of Wellington's streets as a high priority; and,

WHEREAS, in 1998 the Town of Wellington had limited financial resources available for development and maintenance of its streets; and,

WHEREAS, the Wellington Board of Trustees approved placing on the ballot the question of whether an additional one percent (1%) sales and use tax increase to a total sales and use tax amount of three percent (3%) should be imposed on sales and uses within the Town of Wellington; and,

WHEREAS, the electorate in 1998 approved the increase of the Wellington sales and use tax rate to a total of three (3%), with one percent (1%) of such amount allocated to the construction and reconstruction of Wellington streets; and,

WHEREAS, in 2011, the voters of the Town of Wellington approved a ballot measure to allow the use of the 1% sales tax dedicated to streets to additionally be used for parks, trails, and open spaces; and,

WHEREAS, the 2011 ballot measure expires on December 31, 2021, at which time the 1% sales tax will again be dedicated solely to streets and not parks, trails, and open spaces; and,

WHEREAS, the Wellington Board of Trustees does not wish to increase taxes imposed by the Town but recognizes the continued need to address development and maintenance of parks, trails and open spaces within the Town.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

1. The following question shall be referred to the voters of Wellington at the November 2, 2021 Larimer County Coordinated Election ballot for voter consideration:

May the 1% Sales and Use Tax previously approved by the electors of the Town of Wellington for the construction and reconstruction of Wellington streets be used at the discretion of the Wellington Town Board of Trustees, for the continued purpose of development and maintenance of Wellington Parks, Trails and Open Spaces

within the Town for the periods between January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2031?
