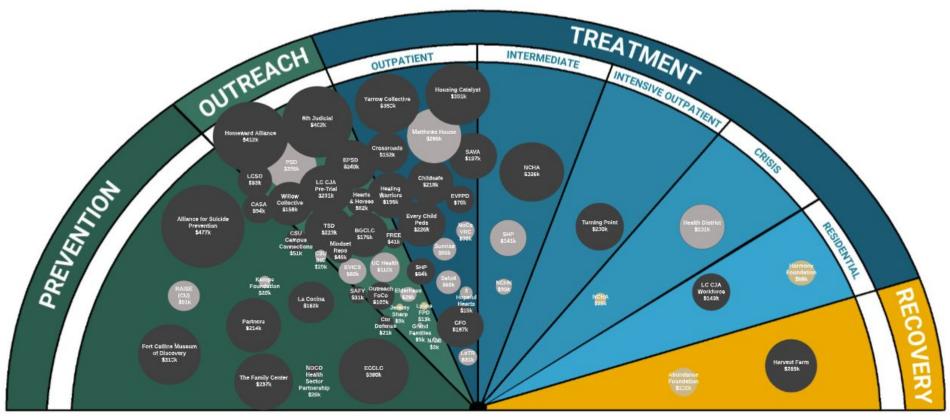

#### **BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION**

The Government Finance Officer's Association's best practice standards recommends governmental entities to formally adopt financial policies. The design criteria for financial policies should include:

- 1. Policies must exist in written form.
- 2. Policies should be expressed in a manner that is understandable to the intended audiences.
- 3. Policies should be made available to all stakeholders, and be published in more than one medium with multiple means of access.
- 4. Policies should address all relevant issues and risks for that specific policy in a concise fashion.

Best practice standards also include that the financial policies are most successful when they are reviewed after being enacted and consider public comment on the policies prior to being formally adopted. The finance committee has been working on financial policies since September of 2022. The policies in the packet have been approved by the committee and recommended for approval by the Board. The first review of the Financial Policies will be January of 2024, with full analysis of adherence to the policies. The Government Finance Officer's Association has recognized financial policies as an essential part of public financial management.

# FINANCIAL POLICIES

2023

#### **BALANCED BUDGET**

The Town of Wellington defines a balanced budget as one in which expenditures do not exceed available resources. Available resources are defined as annual projected revenues and beginning fund balances. Ongoing operational expenses must be funded by ongoing sources of revenue. As a matter of policy, the Town of Wellington does not use one-time revenues, such as impact fees or grants, to fund ongoing operations.

#### **FINANCIAL POLICIES**

The over-riding financial goal of the Town of Wellington is to keep intact Wellington's fiscal stability. There are a number of components, principles, procedures, and sub-policies used to achieve this goal, but the main focus is still on this one basic goal- fiscal stability

#### Components of Fiscal Stability

The Town of Wellington's definition of fiscal stability has several interrelated components:

- Cash Solvency The ability to pay for current municipal operations.
- Budgetary Solvency The ability to annually balance the budget.
- Long Term Solvency The ability to pay for future municipal operations.
- Service Level Solvency The ability to provide municipal services.
- Flexibility The ability to react and respond to changes in the economy and new service challenges without measurable financial stress.

# **Principles and Procedures**

- 1. The Town shall conform to generally-accepted accounting procedures (GAAP) as applied to governmental units in the United States of America. The Town shall also conform to standards of the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) and Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA).
- 2. A balanced budget will be prepared annually by the Town Administrator and Director of Finance and will be presented to the Finance Committee and then Town Board for consideration.
- 3. The Director of Finance will present the Town Board with a monthly financial report of both revenues and expenditures for all of the Town's funds.
- 4. The Director of Finance shall annually prepare a Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The report shall be audited by an independent certified public accountant. The audit shall be conducted in accordance with state statutes establishing the local government audit laws.
- 5. A five-year capital improvement plan shall be updated each year prior to submission of the budget.

#### **INVESTMENT POLICIES**

Colorado Statutes specify investment instruments meeting defined rating and risk criteria in which local government entities may invest. Permissible investments include:

- Obligations of the United States and certain U.S. government agency securities.
- Certain international agency securities.
- General obligation and revenue bonds of U.S. local government entities.
- Banker's acceptances of certain banks.
- Commercial paper.
- Local government investment pools.
- Written repurchase agreements collateralized by certain authorized securities.
- Certain money market funds.
- Guaranteed investment contracts.

The majority of the Town of Wellington's investment lies in local government investment pools, which reinvest in U.S government obligations and collateralized repurchase agreements.

#### **EXPENDITURE POLICIES**

Annual budget priorities are established by the Town Board through their Strategic Plan. Usually, the considerations taking precedence include: Debt Payments, Police Services, Water / Sewer / Drainage Services, Street Maintenance, and PROST (Parks, Recreation, Open Spaces, & Trails).

In addition, the Town observes the following restrictive provisions on all expenditures:

- Budget Expenditures are limited to projected revenues and fund surpluses. This ensures both Cash and Budgetary Solvency.
- Ongoing operating costs shall be funded by ongoing revenue sources. This protects the Town
  when one-time or unpredictable revenues are reduced or removed, thus ensuring Cash, Long
  Term, and Service Level Solvency.
- Capital projects, vehicles, and new equipment shall initially be funded through the Capital Improvement Fund or capital funds appropriately designated as such in another fund. This ensures Cash Solvency.
- Recurring operation and maintenance costs will be funded through the General Fund or
  Operations and Maintenance funds appropriately designated as such in another fund. This
  ensures both Long Term and Service Level Solvency.
- The Town Board shall set total appropriations at the fund level. Any additional appropriations or adjustments between funds shall be approved by budget amendments, ensuring Budgetary Solvency.
- Department Heads are responsible for managing Departmental budgets with the total appropriated budget, ensuring Cash, Budgetary, and Service Level Solvency.

#### **DEBT POLICY**

The Town borrows money and issues short-term notes, general obligation bonds, revenue bonds, special or local improvement bonds, or any securities not in contravention of the Code of the Town of Wellington. The Town borrows money and issues the following securities to evidence such indebtedness:

Short-term notes

Special or Local Improvement District Bonds

**General Obligation Securities** 

A sound debt policy ensures the components of Service Level Solvency and Flexibility. It is a high priority for the Town of Wellington to maintain good communications with bond rating companies and to earn good bond ratings. The Town has developed the following policies to ensure that debt is soundly financed:

- The Town shall maintain an underlying bond rating (without the issuance of bond insurance) of no less than "A-" from Standard & Poor's Rating Services or "A1" from Moody's Investors Services Inc. Bond insurance may be attached to any bond issue to enhance the bond rating over the underlying rating;
- Revenue sources to be used to finance debt are conservatively estimated.

In addition, the Town observes the following restrictive provisions in all issues of bonds by the municipality:

- The interest rate shall not exceed the market rate, with the most favorable bond pricing being obtained through either competitive bids or negotiated placement.
- All bonds issued by the Town shall contain a provision for redemption prior to maturity.
- Annual budgets include debt service payments and reserve requirements for all debt currently
  outstanding for all proposed debt issues. Debt service shall be limited to 10-15% of operating
  expenditures exclusive of capital improvements and debt service expenditures.

#### **FINANCIAL PLANNING POLICY**

Sound Financial Planning Policy most directly ensures Long Term, Budgetary, and Service Level Solvency, as well as Flexibility.

The Town adheres to the following guidelines related to Financial Planning:

- A three-year financial plan shall be developed annually to react to economic changes and to accommodate for regulatory and legislative mandates.
- Revenues shall be conservatively estimated, and expenditures shall be budgeted at or below 100% to ensure budgetary solvency.
- The Town shall accept new requirements for services only when adequate funding is available.
- Enterprise Funds shall be self-sustaining. They shall be charged for indirect administrative services performed by other Town departments. Operational revenue shall be sufficient to

- fund capital costs and replacement.
- Prior to undertaking a capital project, all future ongoing operational and maintenance costs associated with the capital project shall be identified and included as part of the policy discussion.
- The Town shall inventory and assess the condition of all major capital assets. This information will be used to plan for the ongoing financial commitments required for major repairs or replacement to be funded through the Capital Improvement Fund or Capital funds appropriately designated as such in another fund.

#### **REVENUE POLICY**

A sound revenue policy affects all of the components of fiscal stability. Ongoing provision of services cannot be achieved without sufficient funding.

- User fees for all operations shall be reviewed annually to ensure rates defray operating costs and are market competitive.
- Utility rates shall be reviewed annually and adjusted, if necessary, to reflect inflation, construction goals, maintain bond covenants, and avoid major periodic increases.
- The cost of utility contractual services over which the Town has no control shall be passed through to rate payers in a manner consistent with Town Board direction.
- Excess fund balances may be used to off-set rate increases when possible and fiscally responsible.
- The Town shall maximize state and federal grants, loan interest programs, and other intergovernmental sources for capital needs.
- The Town shall maintain a diversified revenue system to protect it from short-run fluctuations in any one revenue source.

#### **BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION**

The Town is in the process of considering updates to the Official Zoning Map of the Town. The Town's Official Zoning Map is the legal document that identifies which zoning district standards are applicable to properties within the Town limits. Updates to the Official Zoning Map are needed to align with updates made to the Town's Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Codes.

The Planning Commission adopted the Wellington Comprehensive Plan on August 2, 2021. The Comprehensive Plan provides the long-range vision and recommendations for the growth and development of the Town and is the basis for zoning, subdivision regulations, and other land use codes.

The Town Board of Trustees, following recommendations from the Planning Commission, passed Ordinance No. 07-2022 adopting updates to the Town's Land Use Code to bring the codes and development standards into alignment with the recommendations of the Comprehensive Plan and to bring codes into compliance with changes to regulatory requirements, emerging technologies, changes in development practices, water conservation and more.

Public hearings are required by the Planning Commission and the Board of Trustees before making any amendments to the Official Zoning Map. The Board of Trustees has the authority to adopt an ordinance making amendments to the Official Zoning Map following receipt of the Planning Commission recommendation and conducting a public hearing.

The Planning Commission has made a recommendation to amend the Official Zoning Map as presented on the attached draft zoning map. The current zoning map is also attached for reference. Additional supporting information that was evaluated or created in the process of reviewing the zoning map is also attached for reference.

The Public Hearing for the Official Zoning Map consideration is presented as a separate agenda item from the official action the Board may take. A second and corresponding agenda item will immediately follow the public hearing and includes a draft ordinance that the Board may consider for adoption if the Board desires to adopt amendments to the Zoning Map.

The Planning Commission conducted a series of work sessions and public meetings and public hearings between May 2022 and March 2023 to consider possible updates to the Official Zoning Map. On December 5, 2022, the Planning Commission voted to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to adopt amendments to the zoning map.

The Planning Commission recommendations from the December 5, 2022 meeting reflect changes including the following:



- Properties currently zoned TR Transitional Zone District are proposed to have different zoning district designations as a result of eliminating the TR Transitional Zone District in the updated Land Use Code. Properties currently zoned TR Transitional have new proposed zoning district classifications based on the suitability of existing uses and compatibility of surrounding zoning districts. A goal and desire for consistency of adjacent zoning and along commercial corridors was a discussion topic for the Planning Commission.
- A newly created R-4 Downtown Neighborhoods zone district was created after significant public input during the Comprehensive Plan update and Land Use Code update processes. Residential properties generally between Washington Ave. and Kennedy Ave. and First St. to Sixth St. that are currently zoned R-2 Single-Family Residential are proposed to be changed to the newly created R-4 Downtown Neighborhoods zone district.
- Residential Properties along Harrison Ave. and McKinley Ave. that are currently zoned TR Transitional are proposed to be zoned the newly created R-4 Downtown Neighborhoods zone
  district. The R-4 Downtown Neighborhoods zoning was established specifically based on comments
  and feedback during the Comprehensive Plan update process and Land Use Code updates to reflect
  desires to preserve the historic residential characteristics of the downtown.
- A limited number of properties along Harrison Ave. and McKinley Ave. that are already commercial or non-residential uses are proposed to be zoned C-2 Downtown Core Commercial.
- Updates to the titles of some zoning districts (for example: C-3 Highway Commercial is now titled C-3 Mixed-Use Commercial).
- Properties previously identified as R-4 Residential Multi-family District on the current zoning map are now identified as R-3 Residential Medium Density (Uses of the district previously titled R-4 are most compatible with the district now titled R-3).
- A limited number of properties were also identified that have existing zoning districts that are not generally consistent with other existing uses or zone districts in the same neighborhood. These properties are typically commercial-zoned properties and are proposed to be changed to a different commercial zone district for consistency with adjacent properties and corridors.
- At the December 5, 2022 Planning Commission public hearing, two property owners on Sixth Street attended and requested their properties with existing residential dwellings be considered for R-4 zoning instead of the C-1 zoning that the Commission had originally considered. The Commission agreed that the R-4 zoning requested was appropriate and those changes are reflected on the draft Zoning Map (keynote "A"). The Planning Commission also suggested that the third residential property also in this same block could be considered for R-4 instead of the C-1 for consistency. The property owner was contacted by Town staff and the owner requested the R-4 residential zoning designation. The R-4 requested is reflected on the draft zoning map.
- Also at the December 5, 2022 Planning Commission public hearing, the owner of a property on Harrison Ave. and Second St. requested his property (previously Transitional zoning) retain a commercial zoning designation. The Planning Commission had originally considered the properties along Harrison for R-4 zoning and upon the request of the owner, agreed the requested C-2 Downtown Commercial zoning was appropriate. That change is also reflected on the draft zoning map (keynote "B").

The Board of Trustees was provided an update presentation of the Planning Commission's draft zoning map considerations December 13, 2022. The Board requested and conducted a work session to consider the draft zoning map January 24, 2022.



Subsequent to the Board's work session, the Planning Commission raised questions about how the P - Public zoning districts were assigned to properties throughout town. The Commission agreed that additional research and consideration on the topic was needed and directed staff to prepare additional research.

- On February 6, 2023, the Planning Commission met in a work session and evaluated the intent of the P
   – Public Zoning District as described in the Land Use Code as well as existing definitions in the code that relate to the purpose and application of the P Public District (attached for reference).
- Staff also presented an inventory of the properties that are or may be considered for the P Public Zoning District and identified criteria relating to ownership, use, current zoning, and draft zoning recommendations. Properties identified were assigned a number to correspond between the table and the maps (Map A" shows properties currently identified as P Public, and "Map B" shows properties that are not zoned P Public but which may have similar considerations for open space, drainage, or other characteristics). The numbers for each of the properties correspond to the included tables with the property inventory (A1, B2, etc.).
- The property inventory also includes columns identifying each property for if it is intended to be accessible to the public for public use, and if the property meets the definition of "Park" as defined in the Land Use Code (areas open to the general public and reserved for recreational, education or scenic purposes). The last column in the table identifies the zoning district designation that the Planning Commission identified at the February 6, 2023 work session as being the most appropriate zoning for each property.
- Based on the discussion and considerations, the Planning Commission recommended changing some properties that are currently zoned P Public District to be zoned the same as the zoning of the adjacent subdivision (example, a drainage facility not accessible to the public that is located adjacent to R-2 was recommended to be zoned R-2). Properties that were previously considered for P Public District zoning and are now recommended to be a new zoning district are identified with keynote "C".
- It was also identified at the February 6, 2023 work session that there were some properties that were shown on the draft map as being owned by the Town that did not reflect the accurate parcel ownership. The draft zoning map was corrected to show the correct parcel ownership and one of the properties was recommended to be zoned A Agriculture to be consistent with the adjacent parcels owned by the same owner (keynote "D").

The attached Draft Zoning Map includes all of the recommendations made by the Planning Commission at the December 5, 2022 public hearing, and also includes updates discussed by the Planning Commission at the February 6, 2023 work session and recommended by the Planning Commission at the March 6, 2023 regular Planning Commission meeting.

Public notices were provided to affected property owners and residents of the Town for both the Planning Commission public hearing and the Board of Trustees public hearing. Town staff has notified affected property owners of the proposed Zoning Map updates in the following ways:

- Notice of public hearing was published in the Fort Collins Coloradoan (public notice attached).
- 816 individually addressed letters were sent to owners of properties (example letters attached). Some letters were returned as undeliverable.
- The draft zoning map has been available on the Town's website with updates reflecting the different considerations that changed throughout the process (keynotes identify the changes).



• Town staff has been receiving correspondence and phone calls from property owners and responding to questions about the process, the recommendations and discussing individual property needs.

As a result of notices and conversations with individual property owners, Town staff became aware of two individual property requests subsequent to the Planning Commission's recommendations. These requests were not able to be evaluated by the Planning Commission, and therefore are not reflected on the draft zoning map. The properties and circumstances are identified below for reference. The Board of Trustees may make recommendations for updating the map to address these property requests prior to taking action on the zoning map amendments.

- 3143 E County Road 64 (Cannonball Storage) The owner of this property spoke at a Board of Trustees public forum and also contacted Town staff. The property is currently zoned TR Transitional and is recommended by the Planning Commission to be zoned C-1 Community Commercial. The owner has requested consideration for the property to be zoned C-3 Mixed-use Commercial. Town staff also researched this property and the storage units and office was previously granted Conditional Use approval establishing the storage and office uses. Because A Conditional Use runs with the land, the Conditional Use approval protects the existing uses on the site. If the owner desires to change the uses or re-develop the site in the future, an application for a rezone or a different conditional use can be submitted for consideration. The Board may also consider changing the zoning of this property with the Zoning Map amendments.
- 3530 Garfield Ave. (northwest corner of Garfield Ave. and W First Street) The property (1/4 acre triangle parcel south of keynote "D"), is currently zoned C-1 Community Commercial and was recommended by the Planning Commission to be zoned A Agriculture to be consistent with the adjacent property owned by the same owner (keynote "D"). The property owner contacted Town staff after receiving notice in the mail. The owner identified that although much of the property he owns should be zoned A Agriculture, the parcel at 3530 Garfield Ave. has been used for commercial purposes in the past (sign shop, etc.) and the owner desires to keep the existing C-1 Community Commercial zoning to preserve the option of selling/leasing the property for commercial purposes. The Board of Trustees can consider if the existing C-1 Community Commercial should be updated on the zoning map to honor this request. There is adjacent C-1 Community Commercial along Garfield Ave. and would seem to be reasonably compatible with the neighborhood if the Board desires to make this change.

Based upon the recommendation of the Planning Commission, the above staff report and attached supporting materials, the Planning Commission and Town staff recommend adoption of amendments to the Official Zoning Map. The Board of Trustees should hear and weigh any additional testimony provided at the March 28, 2023 public hearing.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Conduct a public hearing to consider amendments to the Official Zoning Map of the Town.

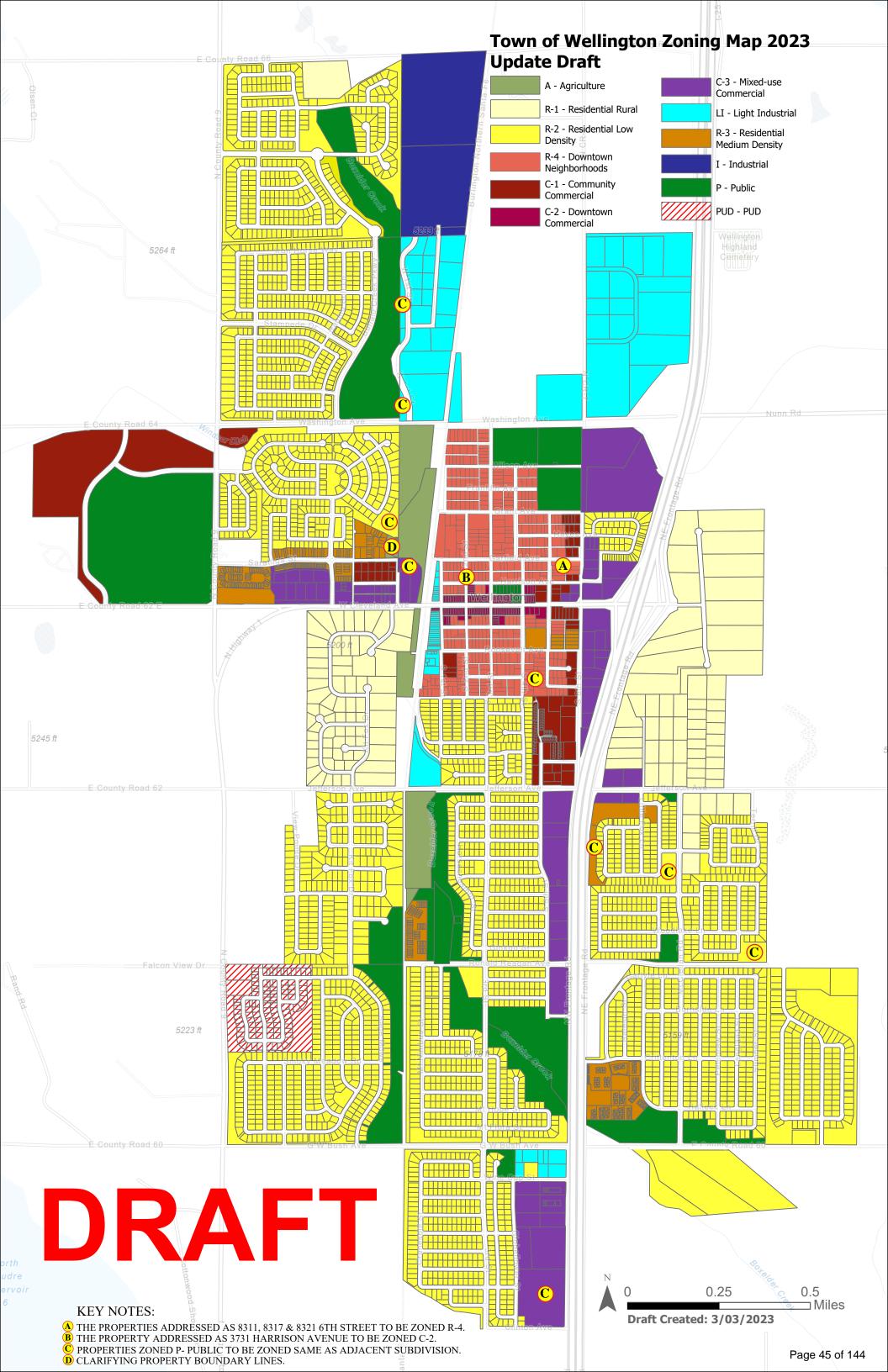

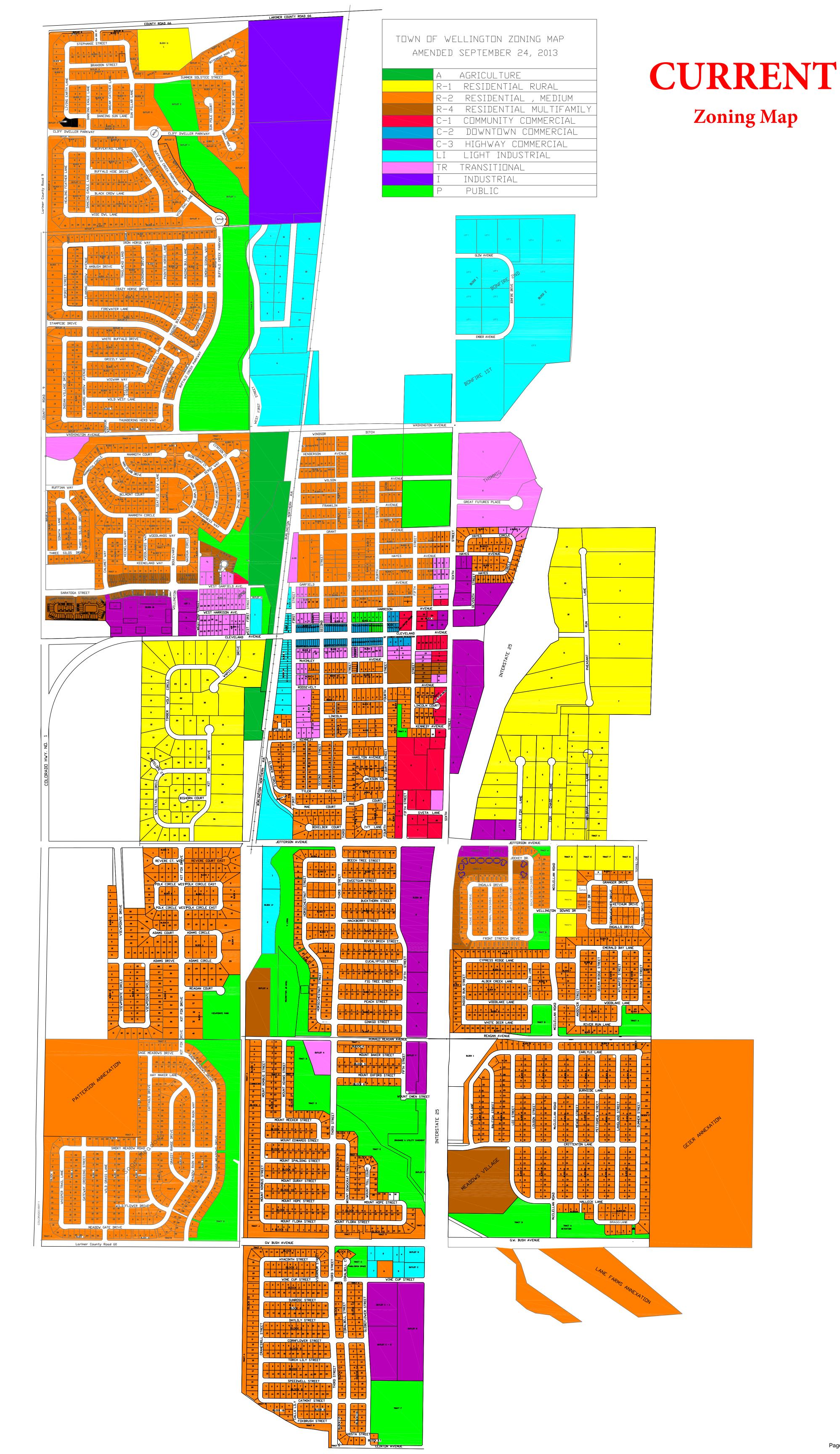

## 3.01.4 Zoning District Map.

The boundaries and classifications of districts established are as depicted on the adopted Zoning District Map bearing the most recent date of publication which has been signed by the Chair of the Planning Commission and the Mayor.

- A. Interpretation of boundary lines. If uncertainty exists, district boundaries shall be on section lines; lot lines; the center lines of highways, streets, alleys, railroad rights-of-way, rivers, streams, or such lines extended; or municipal corporation lines; Where a lot is divided by a zoning district boundary line either zone requirements may be extended within the lot for a distance of not more than twenty-five (25) feet as approved by the Planning Director.
- B. Amendment upon zoning or modification. Upon approval of any ordinance annexing and establishing zoning or modifying existing zoning for any property, the Town shall amend the prior existing Zone District Map to include the annexed area with the proper zoning classification or show the amended classification, as the case may be. Such updated, Zone District Map shall contain, in table form, the date and number of the ordinance amending it, the date the map was amended to

- reflect each amendment and the initials of the person who checked and approved the change to the map.
- C. Cost for amending zoning. Any person who proposes zoning for property being annexed or proposes modifying existing zoning shall bear the entire cost of amending the Zone District Map, including all notification costs. The Town shall provide applicants with a copy of the current fee schedule and fee agreement form.
- D. *Public inspection; storage of original*. The Zoning District Map shall be available and on display at the office of the Town Clerk during normal business hours.

#### 3.02 Residential Zone Districts

## 3.02.1 A – Agricultural District.

- A. *Intent.* The Agricultural District is an ultra low-density district intended for the pursuit of farm activities or for a transitional status. This zone is characterized by the growing of crops and related functions as well as large lot, rural, single-family detached residential dwellings and agritourism.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the A District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the A District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

## 3.02.2 R-1 – Residential Rural Density District.

- A. *Intent.* The Residential Rural Density District is a very low-density residential district intended to provide for large-lot, detached single-family development in areas more characteristically rural and on the outskirts of the planning area that are supported by neighborhood amenities and public facilities.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the R-1 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the R-1 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.02.3 R-2 – Residential Low Density District.

- A. *Intent.* The Residential Low Density District is intended primarily for detached and limited attached single-family uses on individual lots that are supported by neighborhood amenities and public facilities, with up to four attached units allowed per building. This zone is characterized by tree-lined local streets, an interconnected pedestrian circulation system, and proximity to schools and parks.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the R-2 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the R-2 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.02.4 R-3 – Residential Medium Density District.

- A. *Intent.* The Residential Medium Density District is intended for a mix of small lot single-family detached dwellings, single-family attached dwellings, and multi-family dwellings intended to provide a walkable environment supported by motorized and non-motorized transportation options, parks, and public gathering spaces that are ideal for people in all stages of life. Multi-family buildings are generally encouraged near viable business centers in order to facilitate appropriate densities. Street and open space designs in these areas shall be used to create compatibility among frontages, which encourage pedestrian interaction and discourage high automobile speeds.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the R-3 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the R-3 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.

## 3.02.5 R-4 – Downtown Neighborhood District.

- A. *Intent.* The Downtown Neighborhood District is intended for the older neighborhoods adjacent to the downtown core that have smaller, more constrained lots than newer developments and specific architectural characteristics. These neighborhoods are intended to support a variety of housing types including detached and attached single family dwellings that complement the area's character as well as small-scale service establishments, that add vibrancy to the overall Downtown area. These areas are intended to be supported by a traditional, highly connected gridded street system with detached sidewalks, and that incorporate pocket parks and public gathering spaces.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the R-4 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the R-4 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.
- D. *Design Standards*. The following design standards shall apply to all new and infill development in the Downtown Neighborhood Zone District.
  - Residential buildings shall include a front porch on each ground floor unit to ensure new
    construction blends with the existing neighborhood character. Porches shall be a minimum of
    six feet deep with a minimum overall dimension of forty-eight square feet and may encroach into
    the required front setback by up to six feet.



- 2. New and infill buildings shall include characteristics of the traditional architectural styles of the Downtown Neighborhood Area identified as Craftsman, Victorian and Farmhouse. Such features could include:
  - a. Gabled and cross-gabled rooflines;
  - b. Porches running the full length of the front façade
  - c. Rear loaded or detached garages that allow the front façade of the house to be the primary focus
  - d. Steeply-pitched rooflines, curlicue trims, ornate windows, and asymmetrical designs (Victorian);
  - e. Low-pitched rooflines with overhanging eaves, exposed rafters, and heavy, tapered columns (Craftsman); or
  - f. Simple design focusing on wood elements, board on batten siding and hand hewn timbers with a traditionally white color palette (Farmhouse).



#### 3.02.6 MH – Manufactured Home Park District.

- A. *Intent.* This is a high-density residential district on a parcel of land under single ownership or control on which two (2) or more manufactured homes are occupied as residences.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the MH District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.

#### C. Application procedure

- Standard process for a new mobile home park shall follow the standard rezone and Major Subdivision processes per Sections 2.07 and 2.17 of this Land Use Code.
- 2. Redevelopment of an existing site with required infrastructure in place would need to follow the site plan application process per Section 2.12 of this Land Use Code.

#### D. Building design standards.

- 1. The manufactured home must be partially or entirely manufactured in a factory.
- 2. The manufactured home must be not less than twenty-four (24) feet in width and thirty-six (36) feet in length.
- 3. The manufactured home must be set on an excavated, backfilled, engineered foundation enclosed at the perimeter so that the top of the perimeter wall sits no more than twelve (12) inches above finish grade. The foundation shall be similar in appearance and durability to a masonry foundation of a site-built dwelling. The foundation shall provide an anchoring system for the manufactured home that is totally concealed under the structure.
- 4. The exterior siding of the manufactured home must have the same appearance as materials commonly used on residential dwellings. Metal siding must be painted or anodized.
- 5. The manufactured home must have a pitched roof with a pitch of at least a nominal three (3) in twelve (12). The roof must be covered with shingles, shakes or tile. Eaves of the roof must extend at least one (1) foot from the intersection of the roof and the exterior walls.
- 6. The manufactured home must have windows that are wood, vinyl-coated or anodized aluminum.
- 7. The manufactured home must have color-coordinated body and trim. Colors of both the factory components and the site-built components shall be the same.
- 8. The main entrance to the manufactured home must face or be oriented toward an adjacent street.
- 9. The transportation mechanisms, including the wheels, axles and hitch, must be removed.
- 10. No manufactured home shall be occupied for dwelling purposes unless it is properly placed in a manufactured home space and connected to water, sewerage, electric and gas utilities, as appropriate.
- 11. All manufactured homes shall be certified pursuant to the National Manufactured Housing Construction and Safety Standards Act of 1974, 42 U.S.C. § 5401 et seq., or shall be certified by the Colorado Division of Housing pursuant to Section 24-32-701 et seq., C.R.S.

- 12. All manufactured homes shall have an enclosed crawlspace underneath the manufactured home and shall not provide a harborage for rodents or create a fire hazard. No enclosed crawlspace shall be used for storage unless the storage area is surfaced with concrete. Adequate access and ventilation shall be provided in accordance with the Guidelines For Manufactured Housing Installation.
- 13. All manufactured homes shall meet or exceed equivalent engineering standards for other single-family residences.
- 14. Additions to increase the floor area of manufactured home shall not be permitted except for patios, porches, garages, decks or carports. Garages may be detached or attached.
- 15. Prior to occupancy, the Building Inspector shall inspect each manufactured home to determine compliance with this Code. No occupancy shall be permitted or certificate of occupancy issued until said inspection and all connections to public utilities have been made. The owner or home builder shall pay to the Town a building permit fee for each residential structure as may be required by this Code. Installation procedures and the building permit fee shall be in accordance with the then current Guidelines for Manufactured Housing Installation, including appendices, published by the International Conference of Building Officials for manufactured homes and as adopted by the Town.
- 16. All additions shall comply with minimum yard requirements, and a building permit shall be required in advance for any such addition.

#### E. Site design standards.

- 1. All streets in a manufactured home park shall be dedicated to the Town and shall be maintained by the park owner or an owners' association.
- 2. All streets shall be a minimum width of twenty-two (22) feet from back of curb to back of curb, including the width of gutter pans.
- 3. Primary through streets shall be thirty-four (34) feet from back of curb to back of curb with a four-foot detached sidewalk on one (1) side being located six (6) feet from the back of curb.
- 4. The developer shall provide for covenants or other mechanisms, which shall be approved by the Town, ensuring that streets are maintained and replaced as required.
- 5. All streets within the manufactured home park shall be constructed to the Town standards.
- A minimum of eight percent (8%) of the gross site area shall be reserved for and devoted to improved recreation areas and facilities provided in locations convenient to all manufactured home spaces.
- 7. A minimum of three hundred (300) square feet of outdoor living area shall be provided on each space.

- 8. Every manufactured home space shall have two (2) off-street parking spaces adjacent to the manufactured home. There shall be one (1) additional parking space for each manufactured home space within one hundred (100) feet for use by occupants and guests.
- 9. Off-street vehicle parking shall be provided for recreation facilities located within a manufactured home park. At a rate of one (1) space per two hundred fifty (250) square feet of gross floor area, plus one (1) space per employee at the maximum shift, Twenty (20) spaces are to be provided for every diamond or athletic field, or one (1) space for every four (4) spectator seats, whichever is greater. (One [1] seat is equal to two [2] feet of bench seating length.)
- 10. All off-street parking shall meet the provisions of Section 5.05 of this Land Use Code.
- 11. The developer shall provide for a system of pedestrian circulation within the development. The system shall connect with existing sidewalks, if any are adjacent to the property. The system shall be designed to link residential units with recreation facilities, school bus stops and existing sidewalks in the neighborhoods. Attached and detached sidewalks within the manufactured home park shall be a minimum of five (5) feet in width.
- 12. All public utilities shall be installed in accordance with the applicable Town standards.
- 13. A manufactured home park may have multiple master meters for water service.
- 14. Each manufactured home space shall have its own meter for water and electrical service.

#### 3.03 Commercial and Mixed-Use Districts

#### 3.03.1 C-1 – Community Commercial District.

- A. *Intent.* The Community Commercial District is intended for general commercial areas outside of downtown such as activity centers at intersections. These areas are intended to facilitate a variety of businesses that provide employment opportunities and support the retail and service needs of the community. Buildings may be located within a unified campus-like setting integrated with sidewalks, landscaped features, and public spaces that promote access to motorized and non-motorized transportation options.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the C-1 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the C-1 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.03.2 C-2 – Downtown Core Commercial District.

- A. *Intent*. The Downtown Core Commercial District is intended to preserve the character of the original downtown and to provide for a mixture of uses that will strengthen and expand the core community. As the Town's primary activity center, these areas are intended to be highly connected to an efficient network of motorized and non-motorized connections. Its character is based on historic and civic buildings, ample and landscaped sidewalks, groomed and activated alleys, public art, and gathering spaces all design with a pedestrian scale perspective that gives the Downtown a unique sense of place and contributes to community pride. As property owners choose to reinvest in the Downtown, Main Street uses should encourage 'select' infill of vacant residential and commercial areas and slightly increase the height of existing buildings to support upper level residential uses.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the C-2 District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the C-2 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.03.3 C-3 - Mixed-Use Commercial District.

#### A. Intent.

1. The Mixed-Use Commercial District is intended to be a setting for development of a wide range of community and regional retail uses, offices and personal and business services, and it is intended to accommodate a wide range of other uses, including multi-family housing and mixed-use dwelling units. The C-3 District should integrate various commercial and multi-family uses while transitioning from the highway to adjacent lower density neighborhoods. The intent of mixed-use areas is to cluster residential and non-residential uses in a compact, walkable

- setting. These areas provide ease of movement through both motorized and non-motorized transportation options offering convenient access for locals and visitors alike.
- 2. While some Mixed-Use Commercial District areas may continue to meet the need for auto-related and other auto-oriented uses, it is the Town's intent that the C-3 District emphasize safe and convenient personal mobility in many forms, with planning and design that accommodate pedestrians. Further, the C-3 District is intended to function with, rather than compete with, the Downtown District.
- 3. The highway corridor is a visible commercial area of the community. Attention to the architectural standards outlined in *Section 5.09* is required for approval.
- B. Permitted uses. Permitted principal uses in the C-3 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the C-2 District shall be as listed in Section 4.02

  Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.04 Other Non-Residential Zone Districts

#### 3.04.1 LI – Light Industrial District.

A. *Intent.* The Light Industrial District is intended to provide locations for research and development-type offices that create minimal noise, smell, and road traffic., Development in the Light Industrial District should encourage the development of planned office and business parks that promote excellence in the design and construction of buildings, outdoor spaces, transportation facilities and

- streetscapes. Typically, light industrial areas should serve as a separator between heavier industrial and surrounding land uses, such as residential and commercial areas.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the LI District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Limitations. Any use in this District shall conform to the following requirements:
  - 1. Dust, fumes, odors, smoke, vapor and noise shall be confined to the site and be controlled in accordance with the state air pollution laws.
  - 2. Approved outdoor storage areas, equipment and refuse areas shall be concealed from view from abutting rights-of-way and from adjoining residential districts.
  - 3. All off-street parking areas as defined herein shall be surfaced with poured in place concrete or asphaltic concrete. Approved outdoor storage areas as defined herein may be surfaced with minimum three-quarter inch diameter crushed rock or approved alternative material to a depth of at least four (4) inches. If a crushed rock or alternative material surface is used, the subgrade of such areas shall be treated to the specifications of the Town Engineer. Areas surfaced with crushed rock or approved alternative material shall be treated with dust retardants, as needed, and kept free of weeds, trash and other debris. Appropriate fire-lane aisles and, if required, fire hydrants shall be provided.
  - 4. Light fixtures in parking areas shall be hooded and mounted not more than twenty-five (25) feet above the ground level and oriented in such a manner so as not to shine into residential areas. Lighting shall conform to the requirements in *Section 5.02* of this Code.
- D. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the LI District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.04.2 I – Industrial District.

- A. *Intent.* The Industrial District is intended to provide a location for large-format buildings for manufacturing, warehousing and distributing, indoor and outdoor storage. Locations for this zone require good access to major arterial streets and adequate water, sewer and power. Industrial areas should generally be located interior to the large block of industrial/light industrial areas.
- B. *Principal uses*. Permitted principal uses in the I District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Limitations. Any use in this District shall conform to the following requirements:
  - 1. Dust, fumes, odors, smoke, vapor and noise shall be confined to the site and be controlled in accordance with the state air pollution laws.
  - 2. Approved outdoor storage areas, equipment and refuse areas shall be concealed from view from abutting rights-of-way and from adjoining residential districts.

- 3. All off-street parking areas as defined herein shall be surfaced with poured in place concrete or asphaltic concrete. Approved outdoor storage areas as defined herein may be surfaced with minimum three-quarter inch diameter crushed rock or approved alternative material to a depth of at least four (4) inches. If a crushed rock or alternative material surface is used, the subgrade of such areas shall be treated to the specifications of the Town Engineer. Areas surfaced with crushed rock or approved alternative material shall be treated with dust retardants, as needed, and kept free of weeds, trash and other debris. Appropriate fire-lane aisles and, if required, fire hydrants shall be provided.
- 4. Light fixtures in parking areas shall be hooded and mounted not more than twenty-five (25) feet above the ground level and oriented in such a manner so as not to shine into residential areas. Lighting shall conform to the requirements in *Section 5.02* of this Code.
- D. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the I District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

#### 3.04.3 P – Public District.

- A. *Intent*. The Public District is intended to identify and perpetuate the existence of public parks, playgrounds, recreation facilities and public and quasi-public buildings, whether publicly owned or leased. These areas are intended to support the community with accessible walkways, public gathering spaces, and motorized and non-motorized transportation connections and parking that accommodate a large influx of car and pedestrian traffic. Buildings may be small, mixed with other uses in Downtown, or large, providing joint facilities (library, recreation center, etc.) intermixed in residential or mixed-use areas. Civic areas should consider building design, materials, and durability; making developments timeless, and favoring form and function over cost. These areas should also leverage local public art to add beauty and pride to Wellington.
- B. *Principal uses*. Principal permitted uses in the P District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.
- C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the P District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

3.04.4 Table of Dimensional Standards for Light Industrial, Industrial and Public Zone Districts All primary and accessory structures are subject to the dimensional standards set forth in the table below. ## 3.05 PUD - Planned Unit Development District.

#### A. Intent.

- 1. This Planned Unit Development (PUD) Overlay District is enacted pursuant to the Planned Unit Development Act of 1972 as amended (Section 24-67-101 et seq., C.R.S.). A PUD is an area of land, controlled by one (1) or more landowners, to be developed under unified control or unified plan of development for a number of dwelling units, commercial, educational, recreational or industrial uses, or any combination of the foregoing, the plan for which does not correspond in lot size, bulk or type of use, density, lot coverage, open space or other restriction to the existing land use regulations. The PUD is intended to be used as an overlay zone district that supplements the underlying standard zone district.
- 2. The intent and purpose of this District is to permit and encourage innovative design and high quality, master-planned developments on parcels of land forty acres in size or larger. This District is created to allow and encourage compatible uses to be developed in accordance with a unified development plan in harmony with the environment and surrounding neighborhood.
- 3. PUDs are expected to preserve critical environmental resources, provide above-average open space and recreational amenities, including exceptional design and provide greater efficiency in the layout and provision of roads, utilities and other infrastructure.

#### B. Permitted uses.

- Uses permitted in the PUD Overlay District shall be those uses permitted in the underlying standard zone district for the property.
- 2. An applicant for a PUD Overlay District may request modifications to the permitted uses of the underlying zone district to remove those uses that may be deemed incompatible or inappropriate for the overall PUD development. Conditional uses may be permitted if it can be demonstrated that such uses meet the conditional use review criteria for the underlying zone districts.

# Wellington Land Use Code

#### 3.04.3P – Public District.

A. *Intent.* The Public District is intended to identify and perpetuate the existence of public parks, playgrounds, recreation facilities and public and quasi-public buildings, whether publicly owned or leased. These areas are intended to support the community with accessible walkways, public gathering spaces, and motorized and non-motorized transportation connections and parking that accommodate a large influx of car and pedestrian traffic. Buildings may be small, mixed with other uses in Downtown, or large, providing joint facilities (library, recreation center, etc.) intermixed in residential or mixed-use areas. Civic areas should consider building design, materials, and durability; making developments timeless, and favoring form and function over cost. These areas should also leverage local public art to add beauty and pride to Wellington.

B. *Principal uses*. Principal permitted uses in the P District shall be as listed in *Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses*.

C. Conditional uses. Permitted conditional uses in the P District shall be as listed in Section 4.02 Table of Allowable Uses.

#### **Definitions:**

**Park** means an area open to the general public and reserved for recreational, educational or scenic purposes.

**Public areas** means streets, parks, open spaces and other property designated or described as for public use on a map or plat of the Town and fee title is vested in the Town, other public body or a special district as defined in Section 32-1-103, C.R.S.

**Public use** means uses which are owned by and operated for the public by the Town, county, state or federal governments or by school districts.

**Quasi-public** means having the nature or characteristics of being public but owned by a private or not-for-profit entity.

**Public Facilities** Those constructed facilities, including but not limited to transportation systems or facilities, water systems or facilities, wastewater systems or facilities, storm drainage systems or facilities, fire, police and emergency systems or facilities, electric, gas, telecommunication utilities or facilities and publicly owned buildings or facilities.

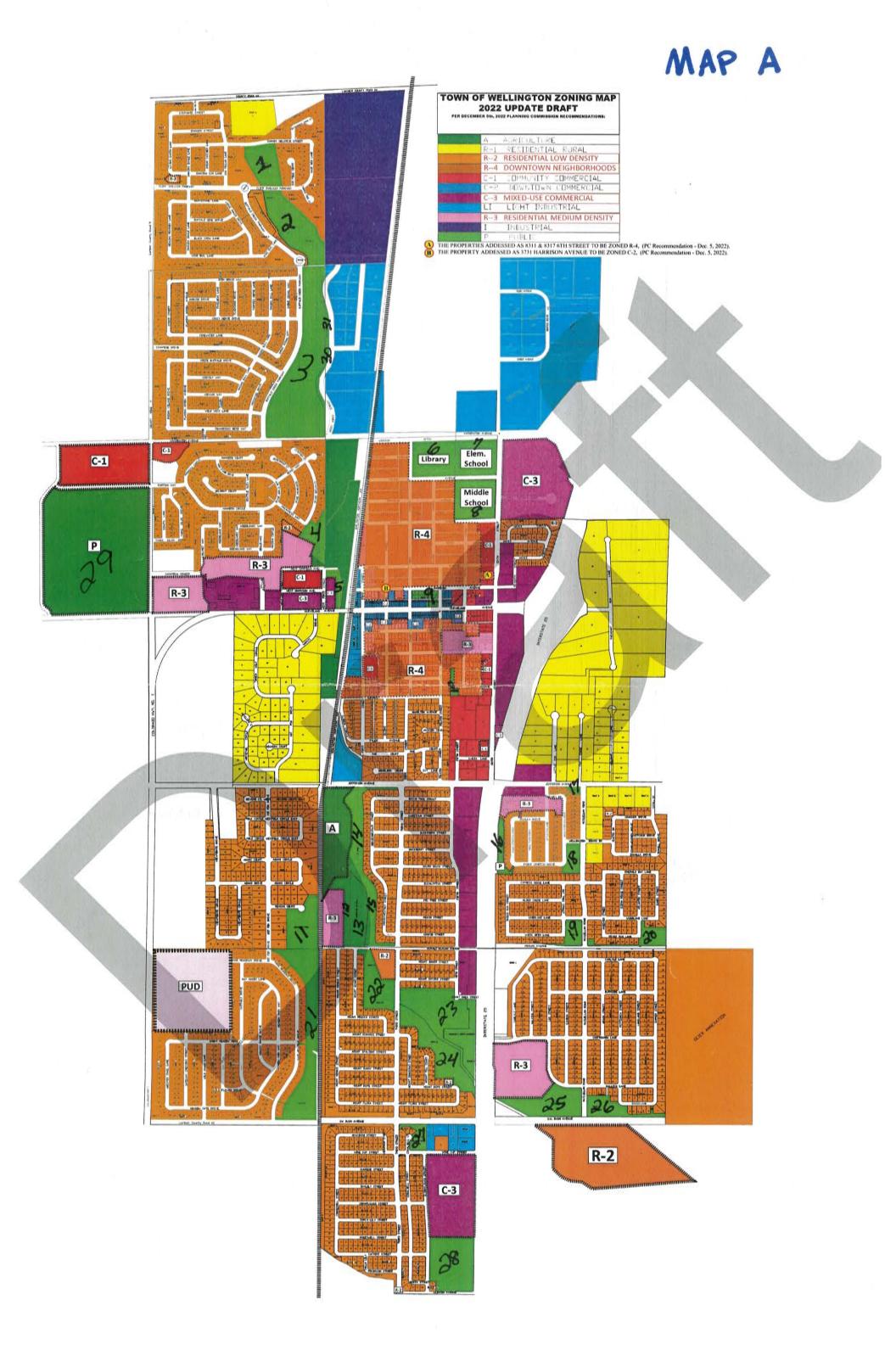
**Open space** means any land or water area with its surface open to the sky, which serves specific uses of providing park and recreation opportunities, conserving natural areas and environmental resources, structuring urban development form and protecting areas of agricultural, archeological or historical significance. Open space shall not be considered synonymous with vacant or unused land but serves important urban functions. Usable open space shall exclude areas used for off-street parking, off-street loading, service driveways and setbacks from oil and gas wells and their appurtenances or other hazards to the public.

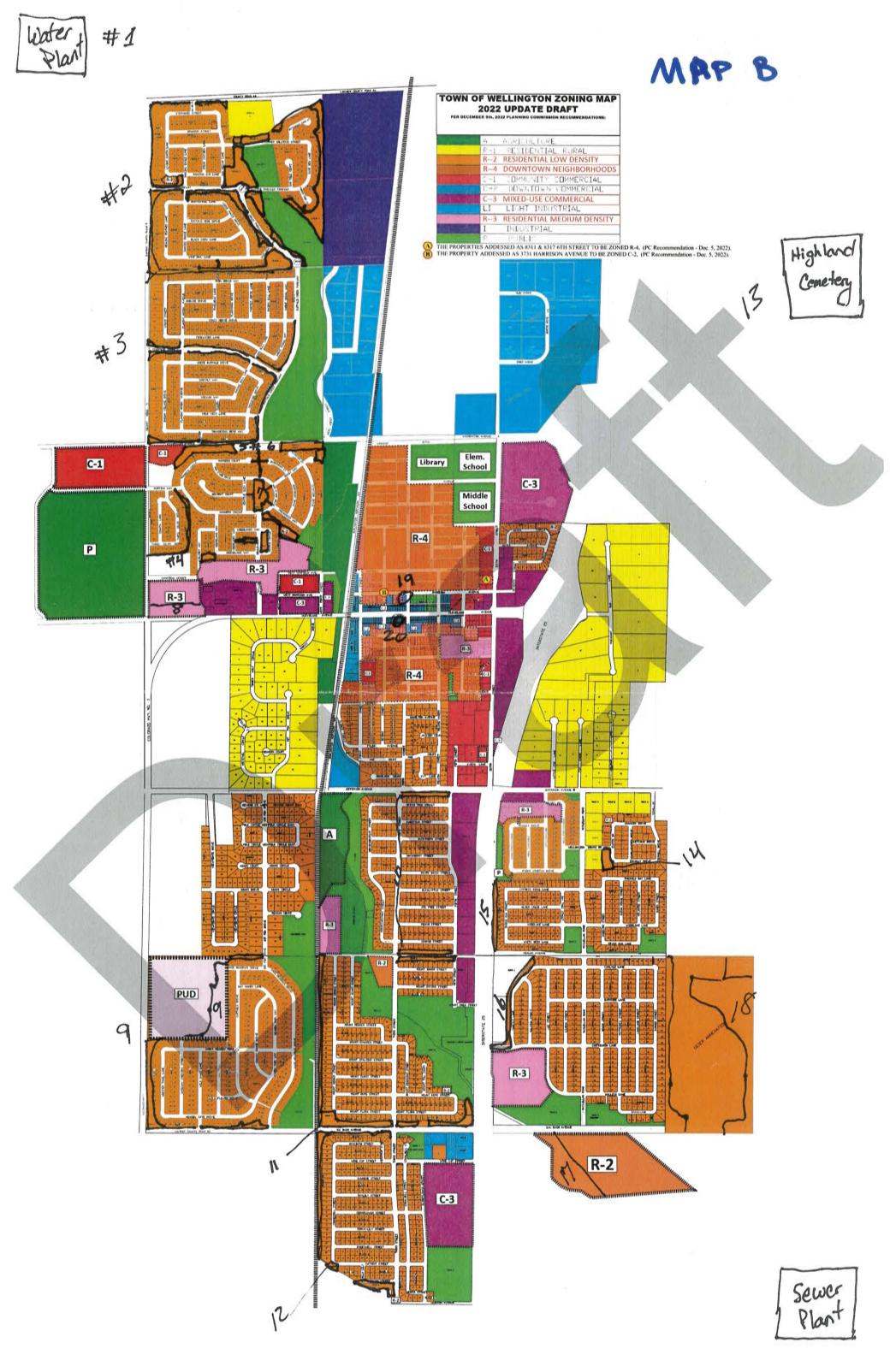
**Public open space** means an open space area conveyed or otherwise dedicated to the Town, State or County or other public body for recreational or conservation uses. Public open spaces are to be unencumbered by oil and gas wells, their appurtenances or other hazards to the public.

**Retention basin** means a pond, pool or basin used for permanent storage of water runoff.

**Civic Space** Public or quasi-public uses in residential or business areas that are accessible to the public and primarily serve as gathering or meeting areas for the immediate community, or reserved as open space that provides a community amenity or promotes environmental or ecological functions. Civic spaces may be public buildings; defined space in residential, commercial, or mixed-use buildings; or outdoor space constructed to accommodate community gatherings. They can be the settings where celebrations are held, where social and economic exchanges take place, where friends run into each other, and where cultures mix. Civic spaces include active or passive recreational uses, nature and recreation trails, nature preserves (such as wildlife sanctuaries, conservation areas, and game preserves), cultural amenities (e.g. fountains, ice rinks, reflecting pools), open spaces, parks, squares, plazas, playgrounds, or memorial parks. This includes any of the following as defined below:

- a) Active recreation: Recreational uses requiring constructed facilities for organized activities, such as playing fields, ball courts, and playgrounds.
- b) Dog park: A park that provides a variety of recreational amenities for dogs and persons that may include benches, parking, restrooms, and water fountains. If dogs are to be unleashed, the area must be fenced.
- c) Community space: Buildings or facilities that provide gathering places, such as community centers, property owner association meeting spaces, or clubhouses.
- d) Open space: Areas of trees, shrubs, lawns, grass, pathways and other natural and man-made amenities not within individual building lots, set aside for the use and enjoyment of residents, visitors and other persons, unoccupied by buildings or facilities unless related to recreational activities. Generally, open space is intended to provide light and air and is designed for either scenic or recreational purposes. For the purpose of this Code, open space includes active recreation space, common open space, and dedicated open space.
- e) Park or plaza: An open space which may be improved and landscaped; usually surrounded by streets and buildings.
- f) Urban deck: A platform for landscaped greens or engineered to accommodate buildings, which spans over major roadways. The intent of an urban deck is to create and enable pedestrian movement across an otherwise, typically impenetrable barrier, and to provide space for activity that can link both sides of the roadway.
- g) Wetlands mitigation bank: A natural resource management technique authorized by Part 404 of the Federal Clean Water Act, or other state or federal law, as applicable, using wetland preservation, restoration, creation and/or enhancement to offset or replace wetland functions that are lost due to development. Wetland mitigation banks are typically large areas of wetlands operated by private or public entities, which may sell credits to other entities to compensate for wetland loss or impact at development sites or enter into other similar arrangements.

#### ORDINANCE NO. 03-2023

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AMENDING THE OFFICIAL ZONING MAP OF THE TOWN.

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees is authorized, pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-23-301 *et seq.*, to adopt zoning districts of such size, shape and area as may be deemed best suited to carry out the purposes of the zoning powers granted by said enabling statutes; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees is authorized to amend, supplement, change, modify or repeal such zoning district boundaries from time to time; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Wellington Planning Commission adopted the Wellington Comprehensive Plan 2021 as the official Master Plan of the Town pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-23-206, *et seq.* with passage of Resolution PC-01-2021; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees by passage of Resolution 26-2021, ratified the decision of the Planning Commission adopting the Wellington Comprehensive Plan as the official Master Plan for the Town of Wellington; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Wellington adopted Ordinance No. 07-2022 amending the Town's Land Use Code, including amendments to zoning districts and zoning regulations; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires to amend the zoning district boundaries established on the Official Zoning Map of the Town for consistency with and to further the implementation of the adopted Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Code; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission and Town staff engaged in a series of work sessions and public meetings between May 2022 and September 2022 to consider and make recommendations for amendments to the Official Zoning Map; and

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission held a duly advertised public hearing for consideration of amendments to the Official Zoning Map on December 5, 2022, and after hearing and consideration of public testimony, the Planning Commission voted to forward a recommendation to the Board of Trustees to adopt amendments to the Official Zoning Map; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees was presented with an update on the zoning map amendments on December 13, 2022 and held a public work session to consider the recommended amendments to the Official Zoning Map on January 24, 2023; and

WHEREAS, subsequent to the Planning Commission's recommendation, the Planning Commission requested to consider additional amendments related to the P – Public Zoning District, and following a work session on February 6, 2023 and considerations and public comments at a regular meeting on March 6, 2023, voted to forward a recommendation to the Board

of Trustees to adopt amendments to the Official Zoning Map including amendments related to the P-Public Zoning Districts; and

WHEREAS, draft versions of the zoning map amendments were maintained continuously on the Town's website and updated regularly with changes being considered; and

WHEREAS, notice of a public hearing by the Board of Trustees has been duly provided by evidence of publication of a notice in the Fort Collins Coloradoan, the Town's official newspaper on March 13, 2023, at least 15 days prior to the date of the public hearing; and

WHEREAS, notice of the public hearing by the Board of Trustees was mailed to owners of record for properties affected by the recommended amendments to the Official Zoning Map; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees held a duly advertised public hearing on March 28, 2023, at which parties in interest and citizens had an opportunity to be heard; and

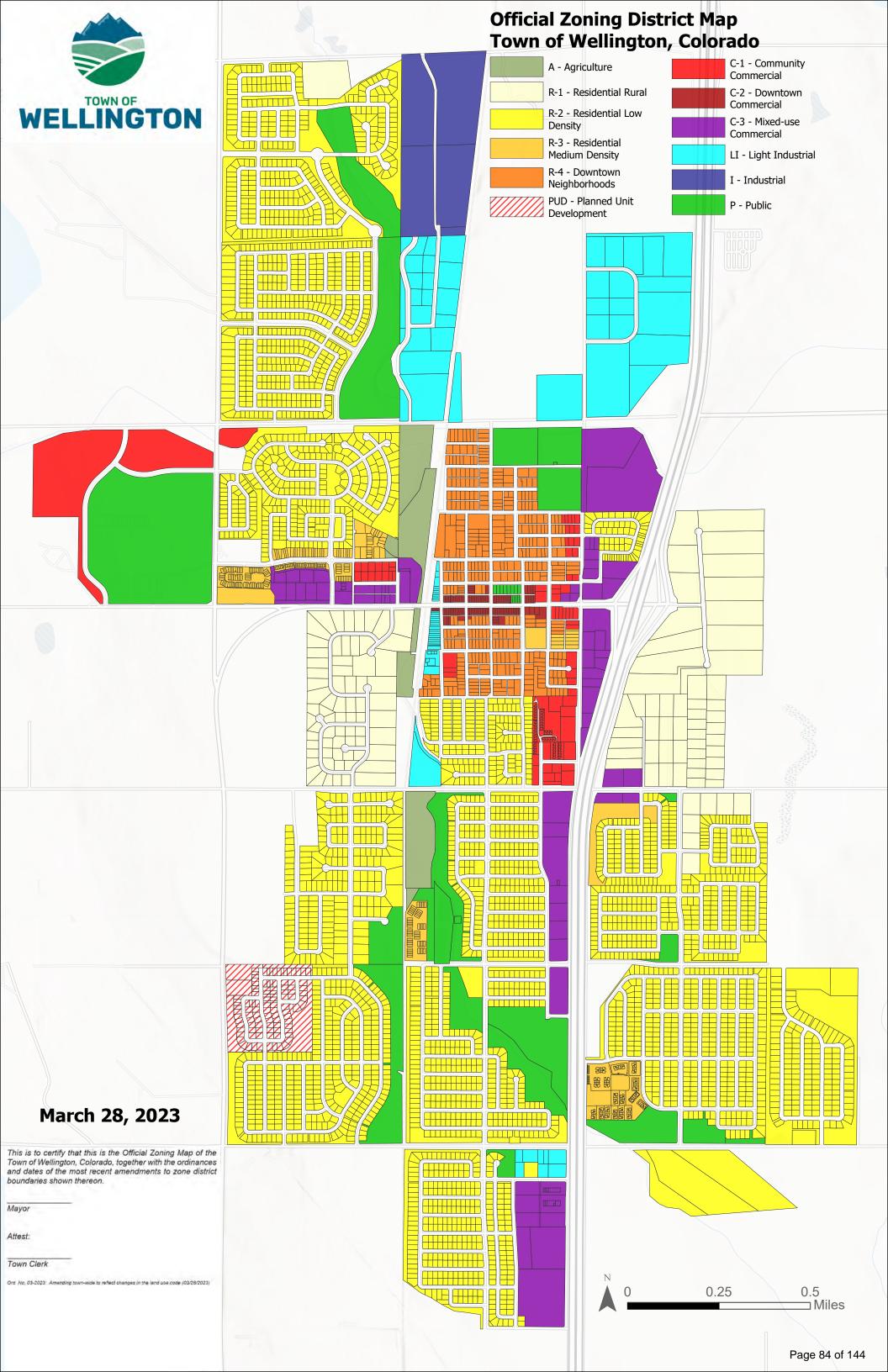
WHEREAS, it has been determined by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, following the public hearing, that the Official Zoning Map of the Town should be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

- 1. Adoption. Having received the recommendation of the Town Planning Commission and the Town Board of Trustees having acted, following notice and hearing thereon as provided by law and pursuant to the Municipal Code of the Town of Wellington, Colorado, the Official Zoning Map of the Town is hereby amended and all previous versions of the zoning map are hereby superseded and replaced.
- 2. Validity. The Board of Trustees hereby declares that should any section, paragraph, sentence, word or other portion of this ordinance or the rules and regulations adopted herein be declared invalid for any reason, such invalidity shall not affect any other portion of this ordinance or said rules and regulations, and the Board of Trustees hereby declares that it would have passed all other portions of this ordinance and adopted all other portions of said rules and regulations, independent of the elimination here from of any such portion which may be declared invalid.
- 3. Necessity. In the opinion of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, this ordinance is necessary for the preservation and protection of the health, safety, welfare and property of the inhabitants and owners of property in the Town of Wellington.
- 4. Certification. The Town Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and make not less than three copies of the adopted ordinance available for inspection by the public during regular business hours and shall record at least one certified copy of the ordinance with the Clerk and Recorder of Larimer County.

#### **BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION**

KLC2, LLC dba Wellington Manor has submitted an application for a modification of their liquor licensed premises. Wellington Manor has a Lodging and Entertainment Liquor License that has an expiration date of August 9, 2023; the business has purchased the vacant lot that adjoins the current property. The modification of premises would expand the current area of the liquor license to include the purchased lot as noted on the diagram included in the packet. The required application and documentation has been submitted and appropriate fees have been received. In making its decision with respect to any proposed changes, the licensing authority must consider whether the premises as modified will meet the requirements of the Colorado Liquor Code. Factors to be taken into account by the licensing authority when considering the modification of premises include:

- 1. The reasonable requirements of the neighborhood and the desires of the adult inhabitants.
- 2. The possession, by the licensee, of the changed premises by ownership, lease, rental or other arrangement.
- 3. Compliance with the applicable zoning laws of the municipality.
- 4. Compliance with the distance prohibition in regard to any public or parochial school or the principal campus of any college, university or seminary.

## STAFF RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Move to approve the Modification of Premises for KLC2, LLC dba Wellington Manor.
- 2. Move to postpone consideration of the Modification of Premises for KLC2 LLC dba Wellington Manor to a specific date and time and provide direction regarding additional information or amendments the Trustees would like to request for further consideration.
- 3. Move to deny the application. If the modification of premises is denied, the licensing authority shall give notice in writing and shall state the grounds on which the application was denied. The licensee shall be entitled to a hearing on the denial if a request in writing is made to the licensing authority within fifteen days after the date of the notice.

## LEASE AGREEMENT 8217 Fifth Street

THIS LEASE AGREEMENT is made and entered into this \_21st day of \_\_\_\_March\_\_\_\_, 2023 by and between <u>KLC2 MANAGEMENT, LLC</u> (hereinafter "Lessor") and <u>KLC2, LLC</u> (hereinafter "Lessee," whether more than one) and is effective and binding for the entirety of the term described herein.

#### 1. LEASED PREMISES

Lessor agrees to lease to Lessee, for and in consideration of the payment of rent and the performance by Lessee of the covenants and agreements set forth herein, the following described property (*hereinafter* "Premises"):

Town of Wellington, County of Larimer, State of Colorado.

Address to be known as 8217 Fifth Street., Wellington, CO 80549

#### 2. TERM

The term of this lease shall be twenty-five (25) years, commencing on April 1, 2023 and ending on April 30, 2048. Upon the end of the initial term and at the end of each renewal term thereafter, this lease shall renew automatically for an additional five (5) year term until such time as the Lessor and Lessee mutually agree to terminate the same.

#### 3. RENT

- 3.01 Base Rent: Lessee agrees to pay Lessor base rent monthly in an amount equivalent to the Lessor's monthly mortgage payment and operating expenses. Parties shall negotiate and set the base rent amount every year by April 1.
- 3.02 Inclusions: In addition to space, base rent shall include the following:
  - a. Real estate taxes
  - b. Building insurance
- 3.03 Exclusions: Base rent shall not include the following:
  - a. Utilities
  - b. High speed internet access
  - c. Computer networking capabilities
  - d. Access to a server for data storage or transmission
  - e. Copies
  - f. Phone-answering services
  - g. Secretarial services.
- 3.04 Additional Rent: Lessee will owe Lessor amounts for Additional Rent as stated in various sections of this Agreement.

3.05 Taxes & Operating Expenses: Beginning on the date of possession, Lessee shall pay and be solely responsible for any and all personal property taxes assessed against the leased Premises or the contents therein.

Unless otherwise stated herein, Lessee shall be responsible for paying its own operating expenses.

## 3.06 Payment Terms:

- a. All rent payments shall be payable in advance of the month and are due on the first (1st) day of every month.
- b. Payments shall be in the form of a check made out to Lessor: KLC2 Management, LLC.
- c. Said payment amounts shall be mailed or delivered to Lessor at the address stated in the Signature section of this lease agreement.

#### 4. SECURITY DEPOSIT

Upon Lessor's written request, Lessee shall pay Lessor a security deposit in an amount not greater than one month's base rent.

#### 5. WARRANTY OF TITLE

- 5.01 Lessor Entitled to Lease: Lessor warrants that it is well-seized of the Premises herein demised and that this lease does not breach any prior made agreements that Lessor has with other parties, including mortgagees or other creditors.
- <u>5.02 Subordination</u>: Notwithstanding the warranty made in Paragraph 5.01 herein, this lease is and shall be subordinate to the deed of trust and any security agreements that the Lessor has granted or will grant to: **Verus Bank of Commerce and B:Side Capital/U.S. Small Business Administration** as security for a loan.

#### 6. LESSOR NOT A PARTNER

Nothing herein contained shall be deemed, held or construed as creating Lessor as a partner, agent, or associate of or in a joint venture with Lessee in the conduct of business or operations, or as rendering Lessor liable for any debts, liabilities or obligations incurred by Lessee in the conduct of said business or operations, it being expressly understood and agreed that that relationship between the parties hereto is and shall remain at all times that of Lessor and Lessee.

#### 7. PERSONAL PROPERTY

7.01 Lessor's Personal Property: Lessor shall remove all personal property, identified in advance to be such property, before Lessee takes possession of the Premises. Should said removal cause any damage to the Premises, Lessor agrees to restore the same at its expense. Any property not identified in advance to be Lessor's personal property shall become part of the leased Premises.

<u>8.01 Use</u>: Lessee agrees that it will use and occupy the Premises as and for an event center, office, and other reasonably related activities, including all reasonably related activities for its employees, contractors and customers. No additional or different use of the Premises shall be allowed without the prior written consent of the Lessor.

<u>8.02 Equipment</u>: All equipment shall be placed and maintained by the Lessee at Lessee's expense and the Lessee will remove those items at Lessee's expense prior to the termination of the lease.

<u>8.03 Plumbing</u>, Water Usage: The water and restrooms and other plumbing fixtures shall not be used for any purpose other than those for which they are designed or constructed and no sweepings, rubbish, rags, acids or other substances shall be deposited therein.

#### 9. CONDITION OF PREMISES

9.01 Acceptance: Except as otherwise provided in this lease, Lessee hereby accepts the Premises in the condition existing as of the lease commencement date or the date the Lessee takes possession of the Premises, whichever is earlier, subject to all applicable zoning, municipal, county and state laws, ordinances and regulations governing and regulating the use of the Premises, and any covenants or restrictions of record, and accepts this lease subject thereto and to all matters disclosed thereby and by any exhibits attached hereto.

9.02 Prior Agreements: Notwithstanding the foregoing paragraph, to the extent that any condition and repair or other accommodation related thereto has been negotiated between Lessor and Lessee prior to the lease commencement or possession date, whichever is earlier, and is not yet complete by the earlier of the aforementioned dates, said repair shall commence as soon as reasonably possible and at the expense of the agreed to party.

# 10. REPAIRS & REPLACEMENTS

10.01 Lessee Obligations: Lessee will be responsible for repairing damage to the Premises and replacing damaged items to the extent such damages are caused by the Lessee, its employees, agents or invitees. Said repairs and replacements shall be made at the sole cost and expense of the Lessee. Repairs and replacements shall be in quality and class equal to the original work or installation.

Lessee shall replace all glass damaged or broken from any fault of the Lessee or Lessee's agents, employees, or clients.

10.02 Lessor Obligations: Lessor shall make all repairs and replacements to the sidewalks and curbs adjacent thereto, if any, except that Lessor will not make repairs and replacements to extent such repairs and replacements are necessary because of an act or omission of the Lessee.

# 11. CLEANING & MAINTENANCE

#### 11.01 Lessee Obligations

- a. Lessee assumes all maintenance obligations for the leased premises during the term of this lease.
- b. Lessee shall keep the leased Premises clean and in orderly at its own expense.
- c. The Lessee will be responsible for the cleaning of all interior windows, if any, of its Premises.
- d. To the extent applicable, sidewalks, entrance ways, corridors, stairways, etc., shall not be obstructed or encumbered by the Lessee or used for any purpose other than ingress and egress from the Premises. Nothing shall be stored outside the confines of the leased Premises.

#### 12. ALTERATIONS, ADDITIONS & IMPROVEMENTS

12.01 Building Exterior: Lessee may not make any alterations, additions, or improvements to the exterior of the building without the prior written consent of the Lessor.

12.02 Interior of Premises: Lessee may not make any alterations, additions, or improvements to the interior of the leased Premises without the prior written consent of the Lessor; said consent shall not be unreasonably withheld.

12.04 Signs: Signage shall be allowed only with the prior written consent of the Lessor and if in conformity with the Town of Wellington Municipal Code or any applicable sign code. Lessee shall submit a proposal to Lessor for any signage for approval prior to installation. All requests for signage shall be subject to the sole subjective discretion of the Lessor. All sign related expenses, including permits, shall be incurred by the Lessee. It shall be Lessee's responsibility to remove signage upon termination of this lease.

#### 12.05 General Provisions

- a. Any alterations, additions and improvements shall be made at the sole expense of the Lessee.
- b. The Lessee shall be responsible, at the discretion of the Lessor, for removing any alterations and returning the building to the original condition.
- c. No change or alterations shall be undertaken until Lessee shall have procured and paid for all required municipal and other governmental permits and authorizations of the various governmental entities having jurisdiction. All work done in connection with any change or alteration shall be done in a good and workmanlike manner and in compliance with all building and zoning laws, and with other laws, ordinances, orders, rules, regulations and requirements of all federal, state, and local governments having jurisdiction.

#### 13. DAMAGE OR DESTRUCTION

13.01 Partial Damage or Destruction: In the event the Premises shall be damaged by fire or other casualty not caused by Lessee, and is rendered untenantable in part only, Lessor shall cause the damage to be repaired, and the rent, meanwhile, shall be abated proportionally as to the portion of the Premises rendered untenantable to the extent repairs are not paid with insurance proceeds.

13.02 Premises Rendered Untenantable: Except as provided hereinafter, if the Premises shall be rendered wholly untenantable by reason of fire or other casualty, to the extent insurance proceeds do not pay for any necessary repairs, Lessor may cause such damage to be repaired, and the rent meanwhile shall be abated in whole; provided, however, that there shall be no extension of the terms of this lease by reason of such abatement, unless specifically agreed to by the parties. If the Premises shall be rendered wholly untenantable, and if the damage shall be so great that is cannot be fit for occupancy within ninety (90) days from the happening thereof, then either the Lessor or Lessee shall have the option to terminate this lease from the date of the occurrence of such damage, and Lessee shall thereupon surrender to Lessor the Premises and all interests hereunder. Lessee shall pay rent, duly apportioned, up to the time of such termination of the lease.

13.03 Damage or Destruction Caused by Lessee: In case of fire or other casualty caused by the fault, neglect or willful act of Lessee or the presence of toxic and hazardous materials stored on the Premises by Lessee, it's employees, agents or invitees, Lessee shall promptly make all necessary repairs to restore the Premises and the building or any portion thereof to their condition prior to such occurrence at Lessee's sole cost and expense and the rent provided for in this lease shall not be abated. Any such repairs will be subject to the review, oversight and approval of the Lessor.

13.04 Lessor Not Liable to Lessee: The Lessor or its agents shall not be liable for any damage to property of the Lessee for any reason. The Lessees are notified that they must obtain their own liability, casualty and all loss coverage insurance for the leased Premises and their personal property therein as stated in Section 14 of this agreement.

#### 14. INSURANCE

<u>14.01 Lessor's Insurance</u>: Lessor shall maintain a comprehensive public policy insurance policy of no less than \$1,000,000 of coverage. Such policy will be obtained and paid by the Lessor and will cover the Lessor's losses.

#### 14.02 Lessee's Insurance

- a. Liability Insurance Lessee shall obtain and keep in force during the term of this lease a policy of comprehensive general liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 combined single limit for bodily insurance and property damage. Lessee shall procure such insurance and pay premiums thereon. Such liability insurance shall include full liability coverage, insuring Lessor and Lessee against liability arising out of the use, occupancy or maintenance of the leased Premises and all areas appurtenant thereto. Property insurance to be provided by Lessee shall cover all loss or damage to the leased Premises in the amount of the full replacement value thereof, providing protection against all perils, including, but not limited to the following: fire, extended coverage, vandalism, malicious mischief, special extended perils (all risk) and sprinkler or other leakage. No such policy shall be cancelable or modified except after ten (10) days written notice to Lessor. If Lessee fails to procure such insurance, Lessor shall have the right to procure such insurance and charge to Lessee the amount of the policy and premiums as Additional Rent.
- b. *Personal Property Insurance* Lessee is advised by Lessor to obtain and maintain, at the Lessee's option and expense, additional insurance on Lessee's personal property within the Premises.
- c. *Proof of Insurance* Proof of insurance coverage shall be provided to Lessor within thirty (30) days of execution of this lease.

#### 15. ACCESS TO PREMISES

The Lessor shall have reasonable access to the leased premises during business hours or for emergency repairs. The Lessor will attempt to make arrangements with the Lessee and notify the Lessee prior to entering the premises.

#### 16. INDEMNIFICATION

To the extent lawfully allowed, Lessee hereby releases, discharges and agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Lessor from any and all claims, demands and liability for any loss, damage or injury, including death, to third persons and their property arising out of or occurring in connection with Lessee's use and occupancy of the Premises due to negligent or willful acts or a failure to act by the Lessee, its agents or invitees. This indemnity shall include all costs and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees) incurred by Lessor in enforcing the terms and conditions of this indemnification.

#### 17. CONDEMNATION

17.01 No Right to Participation: Should any part of this premises be taken by condemnation proceedings, Lessee shall not be entitled to negotiate or enter into legal proceedings concerning the said condemnation, nor shall Lessee be entitled to any portion of the consideration paid by the condemning authority to Lessor as a result thereof; nor shall Lessor be considered in default under the terms of this lease.

17.02 Termination: As a result of any condemnation proceeding, should the leased Premises or any portion thereof, become untenantable by Lessee for the use and purposes for which the premises was initially leased (or for a different or additional use if the same was subsequently agreed to by the Lessor), at the election of either party, this lease may be terminated at such time said Premises is actually so taken by such condemnation proceeding, upon ten (10) days advanced written notice to the other party. Nothing herein contained shall be construed so as to prevent Lessee from pursuing the condemning authority, if Lessee so elects, for economic loss separate from and in addition to the award to Lessor. Notwithstanding the proceeding sentence, Lessor shall not be obligated or liable to Lessee for economic or consequential loss, if any, experienced by Lessee either as the result of said condemnation taking or as a result of the termination of this lease under the term if this Section.

#### 18. ASSIGNMENT AND SUBLETTING

18.01 Subletting: Lessee shall not have the right to sublet the Premises unless the prior written consent of the Lessor is obtained. Any sublease must comply with all applicable rules, laws and ordinances of the Town of Wellington, Larimer County and the State of Colorado and must be for no greater than forty-nine percent 49% of Premises by area.

18.02 Assignments: Lessee shall not have the right to assign this without the consent of the Lessor. Lessor shall have the right to assign this lease to a duly created business organization owned and operated by said Lessor. Lessor also reserves the right sell the Building at any time. Should such a sale take place, the new owners of the building shall be bound to this lease agreement per Section 24 of this instrument.

#### 19. DEFAULT & REMEDIES

19.01 Default: The occurrence of any one of the following events shall constitute default and thus breach of the lease:

- a. The vacating or abandoning of the Premises by the Lessee
- b. The failure by the Lessee to make any payment of rent, Additional Rent due or any other payment required to be made by Lessee hereunder, as and when due, where such failure shall continue for a period of fifteen (15) days after written notice thereof by Lessor to Lessee; Lessee's right to cure expires five (5) days after written notice is postmarked.
- c. The failure by Lessee to observe or perform any of the covenants, conditions or provisions of this lease to be observed and performed by Lessee
- d. The making by Lessee of any general assignment, not otherwise permitted, or a general arrangement for the benefit of creditors; the filing by or against the Lessee to be adjudged insolvent or a petition by the same for reorganization or arrangement under any law relating to bankruptcy (unless, in the case of a petition filed against Lessee, and the same is dismissed within sixty (60) days); the attachment of seizure of substantially all of Lessee's assets located at the Premises where such seizure is not discharged within thirty (30) days; the filing of any lien for unpaid utility charges, Federal, State, FICA, withholding, sales, income or property taxes that is not dismissed or vacated within thirty (30) days
- e. The failure of the Lessor to adhere to any obligations of this lease
- f. The failure of the Lessor to timely pay any and all debts and/or abide by any outstanding obligations related to the Premises that were made prior to or by this agreement
- g. Any illegal activity of the Lessee on the Premises.

19.02 Remedies: In case of any default or breach by either party, as set forth herein, the non-defaulting party may at any time thereafter terminate defaulting party's rights hereunder by any lawful means. Any such termination shall take place only after presenting a written notice and demand and a lapse of the defaulting party's time to cure the default, and shall take place without limiting the Lessor's rights or remedies that Lessor may have if Lessee is in default.

Upon termination, the Lessor may re-enter the premises and if Lessor does that, it shall not be deemed an acceptance of a surrender of the lease, satisfaction or termination of the lease, including but not limited to the lease, nor will it release the Lessee from liability to pay rent and additional monies due as provided herein.

## 19.03 If Lessee Defaults:

- a. Upon default by Lessee, the Lessor at Lessor's discretion may:
  - i. Terminate the lease, OR
  - ii. Resume possession of the premises if abandoned by the Lessee. In such case, the Lessor, may in its own name, but as agent for the Lessee if the rental agreement is not terminated, take possession of the premises in whole or in part for any period of time equal to or less than the remainder of the term; and the Lessor may sublease the premises to another Lessee. The Lessor may so sublease the premises making any changes to the premises that he deems fit or proper. The Lessor is not obligated to re-let the premises and if the Lessor relets the premises the Lessor shall not be required to pay the Lessee any surplus rent, nor will a Lessee be relieved from payment of the difference between the original Lessee's rental price and the subleasing price

22.03 Holdovers: In the event Lessee remains in possession of the Premises after the expiration of this lease agreement, but after giving proper notice of Lessee's intent not to renew the lease, the Lessee shall be considered a holdover Lessee. In such circumstance, the Lessor will have the option to evict the Lessee pursuant to state law *or* to treat the Lessee as a month-to-month Lessee. Should Lessor elect to treat the Lessee as a month-to-month Lessee, Lessee agrees to pay rent on the first of every month in the amount applicable to the lease agreement immediately prior to the holdover tenancy and to adhere to all terms and covenants stated in said lease agreement. Said month-to-month tenancy may be ended by either party so long as the terminating party provides at least thirty (30) days written notice to the other party.

<u>22.04 Severability</u>: Invalidation of any portion of this lease by a Court of competent jurisdiction shall in no way affect any of the other provisions herein contained which shall remain in full force and effect.

<u>22.05 Choice of Law and Forum</u>: Any dispute arising under or related to this lease shall be adjudicated according to the laws of the State of Colorado. Any legal proceeding shall take place in the appropriate Court located in Larimer County, State of Colorado.

#### 23. NOTICE

Wherever under this lease a provision is made for any demand or notice or where it is necessary for either party to give or serve notice or a demand to the other party, said demand or notice shall be in writing and delivered by hand or U.S. Mail, addressed to the parties and addresses set forth in the Signature section of this lease agreement.

#### 24. BINDER

This lease and all of its provisions shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their heirs, devisees, successors and beneficiaries.

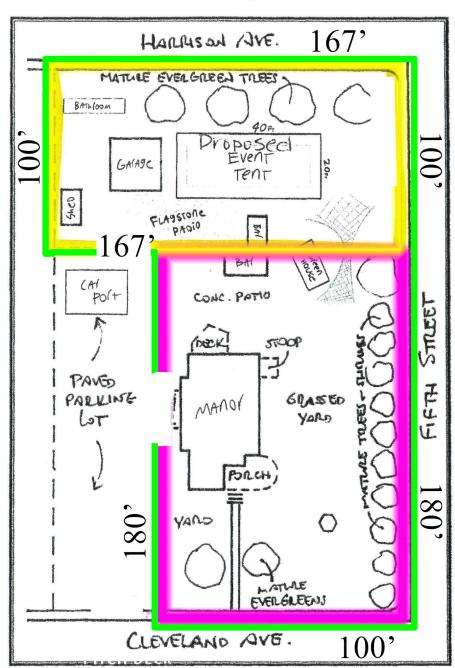

#### **BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION**

Kum & Go LC dba Kum & Go #934 has submitted an application for a modification of their liquor licensed premises. Their current license has an expiration date of 12 December, 2023. They have requested the addition of an approximately 3 sq. ft. space to sell wine immediately adjacent to the location where they currently sell beer. The modification would expand the current area of the liquor license to include the purchased lot as noted on the diagram included in the packet. The required application and documentation has been submitted and appropriate fees have been received. In making its decision with respect to any proposed changes, the licensing authority must consider whether the premises as modified will meet the requirements of the Colorado Liquor Code. Factors to be taken into account by the licensing authority when considering the modification of premises include:

- 1. The reasonable requirements of the neighborhood and the desires of the adult inhabitants.
- 2. The possession, by the licensee, of the changed premises by ownership, lease, rental or other arrangement.
- 3. Compliance with the applicable zoning laws of the municipality.
- 4. Compliance with the distance prohibition in regard to any public or parochial school or the principal campus of any college, university or seminary.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Move to approve the Modification of Premises for KUM & GO LC dba KUM & GO.
- 2. Move to postpone consideration of the Modification of Premises for KUM & GO LC dba KUM & GO to a specific date and time and provide direction regarding additional information or amendments the Trustees would like to request for further consideration.
- 3. Move to deny the application. If the modification of premises is denied, the licensing authority shall give notice in writing and shall state the grounds on which the application was denied. The licensee shall be entitled to a hearing on the denial if a request in writing is made to the licensing authority within fifteen days after the date of the notice.

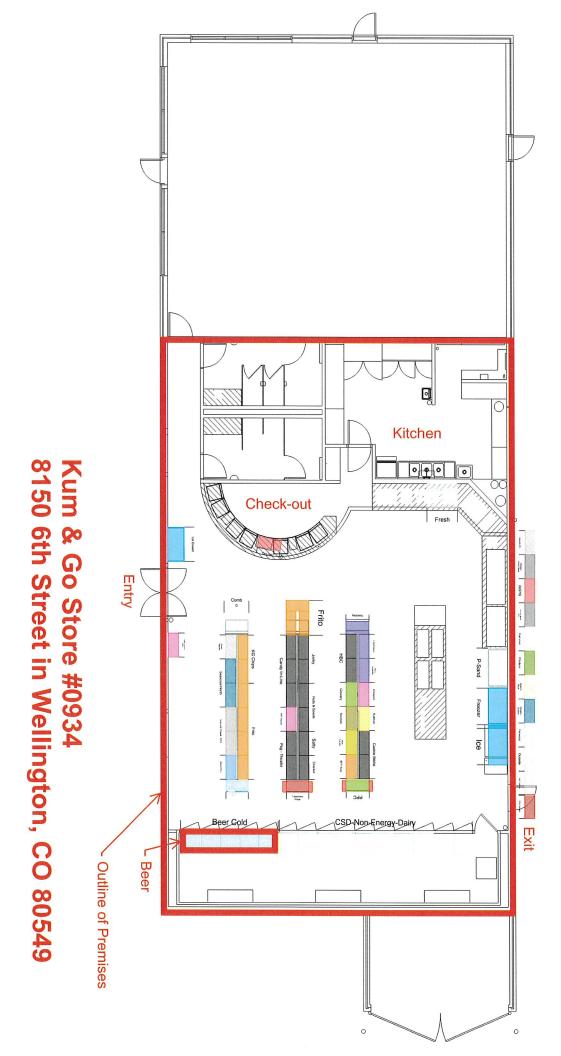

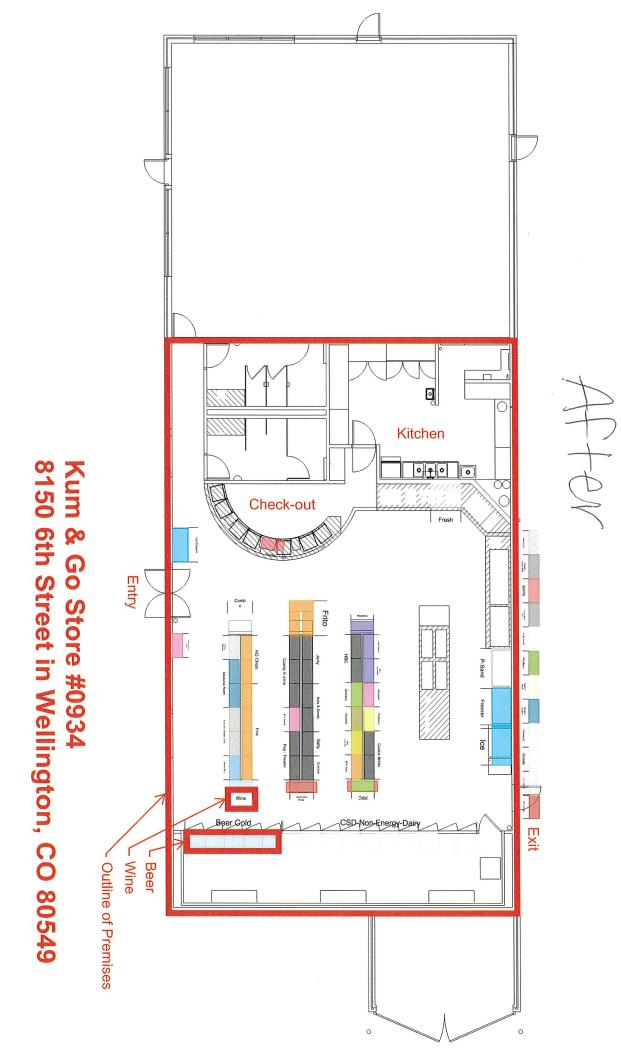

The Law Enforcement Services Agreement for the Town of Wellington obligates the Larimer County Sheriff's Office to provide monthly reporting.

In meeting the contract, for the month of **February 2023**, the Larimer County Sheriff's Office maintained six deputies, one corporal, and one sergeant providing full-time law enforcement for the Town. In addition, one half-time investigator, one full-time desk deputy, and one full-time School Resource Officer assisted the town with law enforcement activities.

During the month of **February 2023**, non-assigned deputies spent a total of **88.93** hours in Wellington responding to calls, patrolling, and making contacts in the town.

During the month of **February 2023** there were **51.0** hours worked by Northern Colorado Drug Task Force.

#### Of Note:

- Deputies continue to conduct drug interdiction traffic stops of vehicles leaving the areas of known drug activity. Deputies are closely working with the Northern Colorado Drug Task Force to share information and conduct joint surveillance of suspected drug houses.
   Multiple suspects have already been arrested for felony drug charges and valuable intelligence has been gathered.
- Municipal Code Violations saw a dramatic increase (4400%) in February due to a change in how we are addressing parking issues in town. Anytime a deputy would contact an improperly parked vehicle in town, it was incorrectly being entered by dispatch as a traffic contact. Because those contacts are now being entered as an ordinance violation, the statistics are obviously showing a dramatic change over previous months.
- Wellington deputies have stepped up their foot patrols along Cleveland Avenue, interacting
  with citizens and conducting more bar checks. As a result, bar checks will continue to see a
  dramatic increase over last year.

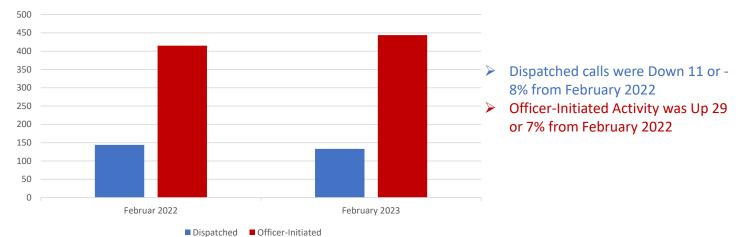

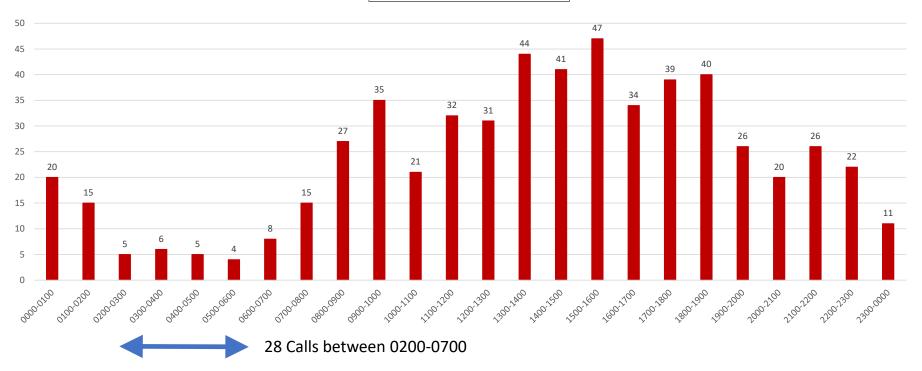

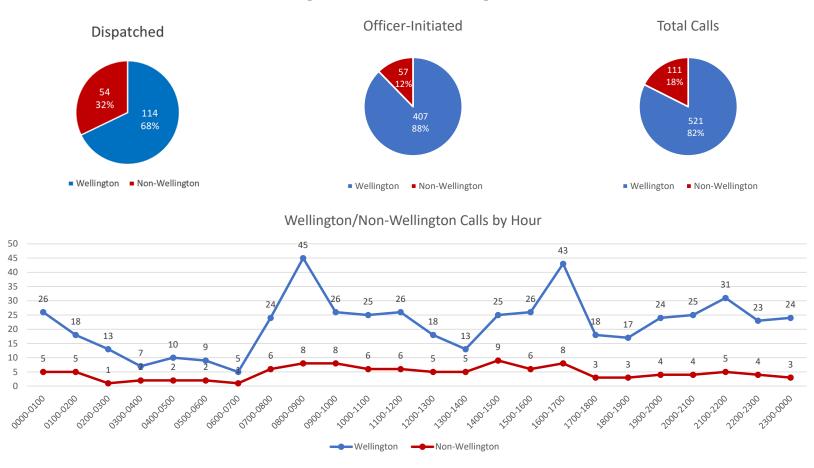

# A Message From Public Works Deputy Director Meagan Smith

We are pleased to present the 2022 Drinking Water Quality Report results to you. Producing safe water that meets the needs of our community today while preparing for changing regulations and future demand is the priority of our team.

In 2022 over 6,400 rigorous water quality tests were completed by an independent lab that meets state and federal approvals to ensure the quality and safety of the water treated in Wellington. We are proud to report that all water quality testing meets or exceeds Safe Water Drinking Act regulations and requirements, continuing the safe drinking water standard in the Town of Wellington.

As a utility, 2022 brought changes in staffing, operation, and facilities as we continue the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plant Expansion projects. Water quality is essential to the well-being and health of our community and therefore is highly regulated by both state and federal agencies.

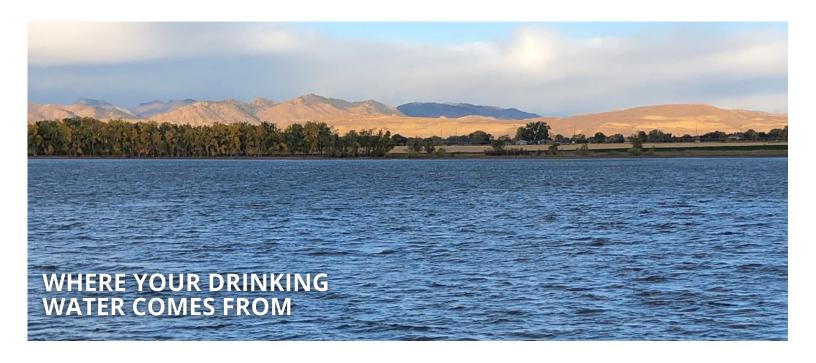
As a utility, we failed to meet necessary reporting requirements related to our backflow prevention program. Backflow testing was completed; however, documentation of work completed was unavailable during the Sanitary Survey. The lack of available data prevented us from proving and reporting backflow prevention testing had been completed. Additionally, we failed to send the required notification to the State that homeowners were notified of all lead and copper testing results. Finally, one of three chlorine monitors at the water treatment facility malfunctioned resulting in missed testing. The issue was quickly identified, repaired and reported to the State. These violations are noted in the Water Quality Report. We are grateful for our regulatory partners who we have worked with to remedy reporting mistakes and increase staff knowledge around proper reporting to ensure future success.

Regulations require water providers to make the annual drinking water report available to all customers. Utility bill inserts are included in bills sent to all customers or attached to electronic bills to announce the report's availability. Please take the time to read about your water. Transparency will remain a critical pillar of our utility; if you have questions or would like to know more, I encourage you to contact the Town.

The Town of Wellington has two primary water sources including surface water and groundwater.

#### **Surface Water**

Wellington's largest water supply begins its journey as snow in the Rocky Mountains and flows to the main and north fork of the Poudre River where it is diverted and delivered through more than 23 miles of pipes and canals to reach Reservoir #3.



It takes 10 to 12 inches of Colorado snow to produce 1 acre foot of water.

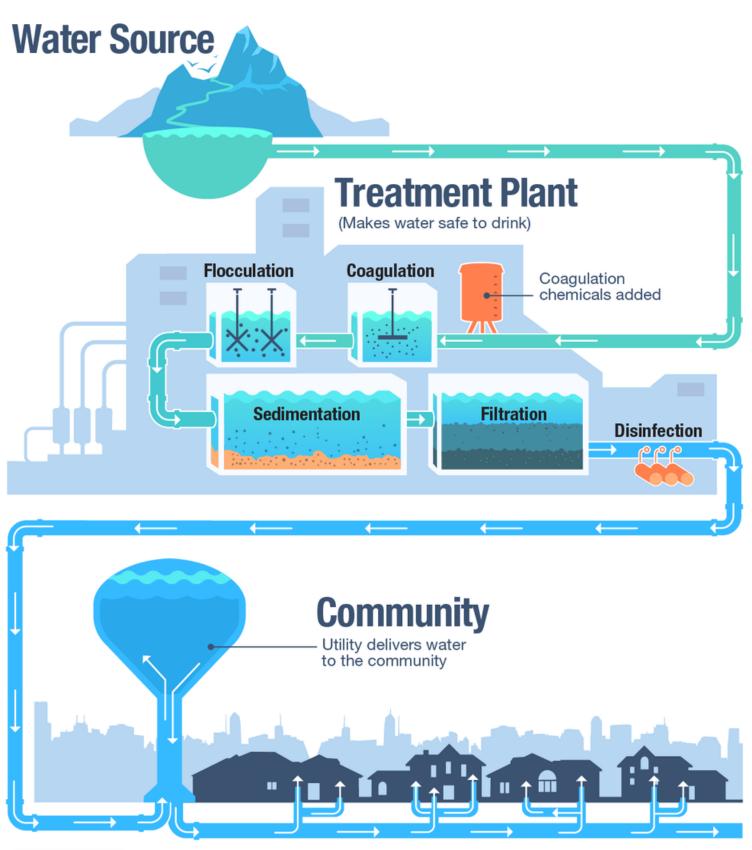
#### Groundwater

A portion of the well system currently used as the source of roughly a quarter of our drinking water is the original well system used to supply water to the Town of Wellington in its founding. These wells also provide non potable irrigation water for Town parks and local schools.

Wellington is unique with roughly 50% of our community able to access non-potable water (water not treated for consumption) for irrigation. Even with a robust non-potable system, summer months bring more than a 50% increase in potable water demand (treated drinking water) for irrigation.

#### How the EPA sets limits

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) studies pollutants and their impacts to the environment and people to determine the Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL). Every water utility, including Wellington, is required by law to not exceed the MCL.

The Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG) is the level at which there are no known effects on a person's health with an additional margin for safety. The MCL is set as close as possible to the goal. Sometimes the MCL is higher than the MCLG. This is because of one of three possible reasons:

- (1) The technology needed to measure such small quantities of the MCLG is not available;
- (2) The technology needed to remove the pollutant or reduce it to the MCLG is not available yet; or
- (3) The cost of treating the pollutant to the MCLG outweighs the potential benefit of a lowered standard.

#### Substances that could be in source water

In order to ensure that drinking water is safe, Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment prescribes regulations that limit the amounts of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water that must provide the same level of protection for public health.

The water source for tap and bottled water include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or underground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals including potentially radioactive material, and it can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity. Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

Microbiological contaminants: Viruses and bacteria that may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations and wildlife.

Inorganic contaminants: Salts and metals, which can be naturally occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining or farming.

Pesticides and herbicides: May come from a variety of sources, such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff and residential uses.

Radioactive contaminants: Can be naturally occurring or a result of petroleum production and mining activities.

Organic chemical contaminants: Synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are byproducts of industrial processes and petroleum production, and also may come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems.

#### **DID YOU KNOW?**

All drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk.

#### 2022 WATER SAMPLE TEST RESULTS

Wellington's drinking water is monitored for over one hundred different substances on a strict sampling schedule, with more than 6,400 water samples are taken annually across the treatment and distribution system. The water we provide to residents and businesses must meet specific state and federal health standards.

The included tables show all detections found in the period of January 1 to December 31, 2022 unless otherwise noted. The State of Colorado requires us to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants are not expected to vary significantly from year to year, or the system is not considered vulnerable to this type of contamination. Therefore, some of our data, though representative, may be more than one-year-old. Violations and Formal Enforcement Actions, if any, are reported in the next section of this report.

#### Terms & Abbreviations

### Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL)

The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

### Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG)

The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

#### Treatment Technique (TT)

A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

#### Health-Based

A violation of either an MCL or TT.

#### Non-Health-Based

A violation that is not related to an MCL or TT.

#### Action Level (AL)

The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment and other regulatory requirements.

#### Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level (MRDL)

The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

#### Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal (MRDLG)

The level of a drinking water disinfectant, below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

#### **Violation**

Failure to meet a Colorado Primary Drinking Water Regulation.

#### Picocuries per liter (pCi/L)

Measure of the radioactivity in water.

### Nephelometric Turbidity Unit (NTU)

Measure of the clarity or cloudiness of water. Turbidity in excess of 5 NTU is just noticeable to the typical person.

#### Highest Level Allowed

Single or calculated value used to determine if regulatory contaminant level (e.g. MCL) is met. Examples of calculated values are the 90th Percentile, Running Annual Average (RAA) and Locational Running Annual Average (LRAA).

#### Parts per million = Milligrams per liter (ppm = mg/L)

One part per million corresponds to one minute in two years or a single penny in \$10,000.

### Parts per billion = Micrograms per liter (ppb = ug/L)

Copper and lead were measured at residential taps throughout the town in 2022. The Action Level (AL) for lead and copper applies to the 90th percentile of all samples collected (i.e. 90% of all sample results must be below the AL for each contaminant). One sample exceeded the AL for lead, the homeowner was notified. The AL was not exceeded for copper at any location.

#### Health-Based Violation

Documentation of completed backflow reports and surveys were inaccessible at the time the Sanitary Survey was conducted. The lack of available data prevented us from proving and reporting backflow prevention testing had been completed. Residents were notified of the violation in September 2022 and March 2023 in utility bills. All required documentation requested by the state to satisfy the violation will be submitted for review and approval by the Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment (CDPHE) by May 1, 2023.



#### Regulatory Notification Message

The Town has an inadequate backflow prevention and cross-connection control program and violated Cross Connection Rule M611, M614 and M615. Uncontrolled cross connections can lead to inadvertent contamination of the drinking water. This is due to one or more of the following: We have permitted an uncontrolled cross connection, AND/OR we have installed or permitted an uncontrolled cross connection, AND/OR we failed to comply with the requirements for surveying our system for cross connections, AND/OR we failed to complete the testing requirements for backflow prevention devices or methods, AND/OR we failed to notify the State Health Dept. of a backflow contamination event.

#### Non-Health-Based Violation

These violations do not usually mean there was a water quality problem. If there had been, you would have notified you immediately. We missed collecting a sample (water quality is unknown), reported the sample result after the due date, and did not complete a report/notice by the required date. These actions resulted in a drinking water monitoring violation, which requires this public notification as directed by CDPHE.

The Town of Wellington Water Treatment Facility is required to collect chlorine residual samples from the drinking water being pumped from the plant into the distribution system. The system tests chlorine at three different points to ensure redundancy and, ultimately, safety within the system.

On February 7, 2022, one of the three monitors experienced a malfunction requiring repair that was quickly noticed and rectified. The equipment failure resulted in a lack of tests from one of the three collection points. Though samples were collected and analyzed each day; due to instrument failure, the number of

required samples were not collected and analyzed. CDPHE was notified by staff and the violation was closed on February 28, 2022.

As a utility, we failed to meet necessary reporting requirements related to our backflow prevention program Cross Connection Rule m613 and M612. Backflow testing was completed; however, improperly documented due to file mismanagement during staff turnover. All documentation related to this violation requested by CDPHE will be filed with the State and for review and approval by May 1, 2023. Water users were notified via utility bill in September 2022 and March 2023.

The Town of Wellington provides biannual lead and copper sampling to help occupants and homeowners address water quality at 61 locations that have been identified by the State as possibly having interior plumbing systems that may contain lead or copper. Homeowners were notified of results in accordance with CDPHE requirements . The Town failed to send a copy of the notification received by residents to the State by the required reporting deadline. The violation was received October, 1, 2022 and closed on October 28.

#### What does this mean? What should I do?

These monitoring errors are a violation, but did not impact public health so customers do not need to seek alternative water supplies or take further actions. If a situation arises where the water is no longer safe to drink, you will be notified within 24 hours. You may contact the Town Utilities Water Treatment staff at 8225 Third Street, Wellington CO or (970) 568-3381 for additional information regarding this public notice.

Please share this information with all the other people who drink this water, especially those who may not have received this notice directly (for example, people in apartments, nursing homes, schools, and businesses). You can do this by posting this notice in public places or by distributing copies.



#### Look out for our most vulnerable neighbors

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immunocompromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV-AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk of infections. #### WHAT YOU NEED TO **KNOW ABOUT LEAD**

If present, lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We are responsible for providing high quality drinking water and removing lead pipes, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components in your home. You share the responsibility for protecting yourself and your family from the lead in your home plumbing.

You can take responsibility by identifying and removing lead materials within your home plumbing and taking steps to reduce your family's risk. Before drinking tap water, flush your pipes for several minutes by running your tap, taking a shower, doing laundry or a load of dishes. You can also use a filter certified by an American National Standards Institute accredited certifier to reduce lead in drinking water. If you are concerned about lead in your water and wish to have your water tested, contact the Town of Wellington. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available at epa.gov/safewater/lead.

#### Please Help Us Keep Our Water Clean

The Town has separate wastewater and stormwater systems. Separate systems have two separate pipes. One pipe carries stormwater (rain) from storm drains to local streams, rivers and lakes, such as Coal Creek and Boxelder Creek with little or no treatment. A different pipe carries wastewater to the water reclamation facility. Therefore, it's critical to not dispose of anything into the storm sewer.









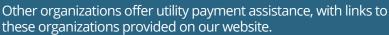
