BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Loaf N Jug #750846 has applied for the annual renewal of their Fermented Malt Beverage and Wine (City) Liquor License. Staff accepted the application as complete on 4/22/2024 and have verified: 1) that the applicant is in good standing with the Colorado Secretary of State's office, and; 2) that the applicant has a current sales tax license. The applicant provided clarification regarding permission for use of the property and other information relevant to their license, including a self-reported violation of service to a minor issued by the Colorado Department of Revenue's Liquor Enforcement Division in July 2023 and the remedial steps taken to address the violation. An inspection of the premises conducted by the Larimer County Sheriff's Office identified no issues.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff have identified the following for Board consideration:

- 1. Approve the Loaf N Jug renewal application.
- 2. Postpone consideration of the Loaf N Jug renewal application to a future date.
- 3. Deny the Loaf N Jug renewal application for good cause.

If the Board finds that the remedial steps taken by the applicant are sufficient to correct the violation issued by the State, staff recommend approval of this license renewal application.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

As promised during the 2024 budget season, the Finance Department has prepared a comprehensive review of 2024 first-quarter financial performance for the Town of Wellington. This update contains several aspects, including initial 2023 end-of-year budget performance analysis, 2024 first-quarter Treasurer's Report, first-quarter sales tax trends, and additional commentary.

To best understand the Town's financial position at the end of the first quarter of 2024, it is important to review how 2023 ended, which became the starting point for the current year. In reviewing Town operations, revenues performed better than was estimated during the 2024 budget process, except for the Street fund due to a known escrow payment made to a developer. The Finance Department is actively collaborating with the Planning Department to better identify and anticipate these payments in the future.

Property Tax revenue payments from the Larimer County Treasurer have been delayed as of November 2023 following notification from the Office of the State Auditor that the Town has not filed an annual audit report for the year ended 12/31/2022. We also received one a similar notice in October 2022 regarding the annual audit report for the year ended 12/31/2021 and we are happy to share that the report has been submitted and the State



Auditor is currently working on a release of funds. The audit for 2022 has begun with a new firm, Hinkle & Company, PC. Finance Department leadership met with Jim Hinkle on May 14th. Required documents are currently being submitted for review and we anticipate a two-to-three-month timeline for the 2022 audit, including several onsite dates for fieldwork with the auditors in the coming weeks. Hinkle & Company has also been contracted to complete the 2023 and 2024 audits.

Finance Department leadership has also been in contact with Larimer County Treasurer, Irene Josey, and is aware of over \$870,000 total funds as of March 2024 currently being delayed. While these funds are not yet available or posted to the financials, the Town is entitled, and payment will be made following the submission of the 2022 audit.

Operating expenditures for 2023 in all funds also performed better than budgeted and estimated during the 2024 budget process. In total, net revenue over expenditures for 2023 is expected to be over \$1.7 million for all Town of Wellington funds.

Net revenues over expenditures in five of the six funds was due in large part to conservative revenue estimates, increased tax revenue and investment earnings, and controlled expenditures. As previously stated during the 2024 budget process, it was anticipated that total Sewer Fund expenditures will exceed revenues; however, the projected ending fund balance for the Sewer Fund is \$390,443 for 2024 and the five-year projection for the fund, as part of the Wastewater Financial Plan, Cost of Service, Rate and Fee Model provided by Raftelis in



November 2023, anticipates a consistently positive fund balance by 2026. Wastewater utility rates for 2024 were determined and previously approved by the Board based on this information.

Overall, as an organization, the Town of Wellington ended last year in the black with a plan for areas of concern.

Looking at the first quarter of 2024, knowing that tax revenues are delayed, past-due audits are priority, and a transition to a new Finance Director and Treasurer is currently occurring, a look back on the financials – while informative – is not indicative of a need to act at this point. Operating revenues are below budget for five of the six funds, which is easily explained by the delayed tax revenue, low water sales during winter months, and timing of tap and raw water fees usually paid later in the year.

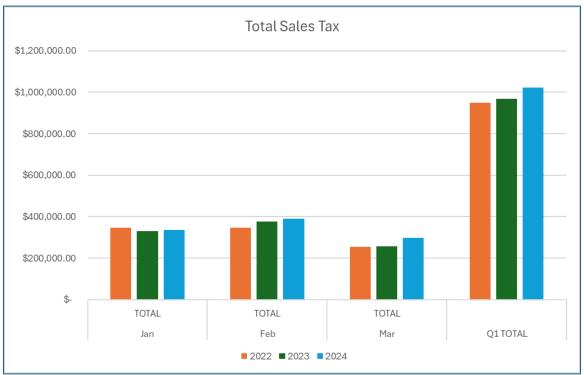

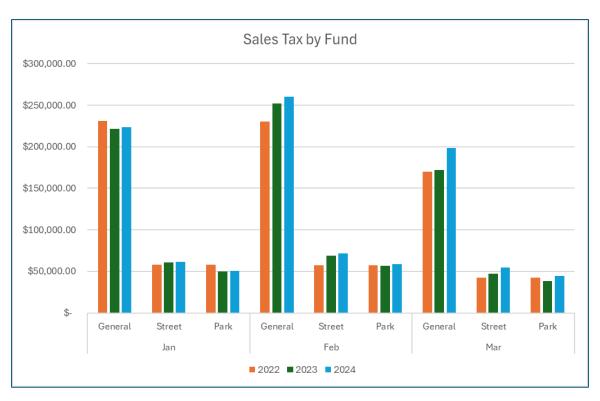

One revenue in particular to call attention to is sales tax. In reviewing data for the past three first-quarters, 2022 to 2024, we have seen an average of 3.9% increase in sales tax revenue year-over-year. The accompanying data and charts show the amounts collected each month and total collected during the first quarter of each year, as well as a breakdown of the allocation of the revenues in General, Street, and Park funds. Sales tax revenue is on pace year-to-date for 2024 through March at 24.6% of budgeted revenues and has already surpassed \$1 million.

Operating expenditures for 2024 look optimistic based on year-to-date data through March, though it should not be taken as a representation of the overall status of budget performance. Again, first-quarter data can provide an initial look but does not contain enough conclusive data points to necessitate action. While all funds are under budget as of March, known annual payments of \$3.4 million will occur in the coming months for the Water and Storm funds (NPIC and Box Elder). Additionally, operating expenditures do not include debt service payments – of which Water and Sewer funds have already paid 50%. Sewer user fees are trending lower, and upon further



research, it appears that utility consumption for the first quarter is lower than anticipated. Consumer behavior appears to have changed as a result of rate increases, resulting in less water used during the winter months which is the driver for a customer's wastewater utility rate.

Although the 2024 first-quarter operating summary shows a deficit of \$710,262, delayed property tax revenue, debt service payments that are not evenly distributed by quarter, and increased utility sales during the summer months will have a significant positive impact that will be reflected later in the year.

The deficit in the General Fund will be made whole, and exceed projections, when property tax revenue is paid by the County Treasurer following the submission of the 2022 audit in the coming months. This will drastically change the Town's financial outlook versus what is currently reflected in this financial analysis. Included in the 2024 budget was additional staff for Public Works, Planning, Parks/Recreation, and Library departments. As these positions are already included in the 2024 budget and this analysis does not advise changes, it is appropriate for Town staff to pursue filling these roles as anticipated.

The 2025 budget process has begun, and a draft calendar is in development. It is the desire of the Finance Department to include in this process a five-year projection for the General Fund based on the 2024 strategic plan, similar to the projections within the enterprise funds. As Wellington continues to grow, it is important to look ahead to ensure the needs of the community continue to be served.

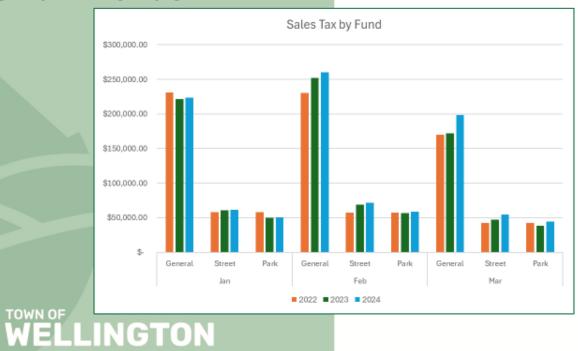

- The 2024 budget as approved includes additional 3.75 FTE employee requests for Public Works, Planning, Parks/Recreation, and Library departments.
- It was estimated that these four requests with an anticipated hiring date after the first quarter of 2024 would account for approximately \$275,000 in "wages & salaries" budgets for all positions combined.
- Following the Board's direction to delay hiring these positions to a later point in 2024 has led to a reduced expenditure not to exceed \$137,500 in paid wages if all positions have a hiring date of July 1, 2024, or later.

Subject: Wellington Source Water and Planning Overview

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town of Wellington's current supply for potable water use includes three groundwater wells (Wilson Wells) and a water supply agreement with North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) for use of surface water from Reservoir #3. Additional sources of raw water in Wellington include several groundwater wells used for irrigation purposes. Approximately half of Wellington Water Utility customers have access to non-potable water for irrigation needs. A majority of Town parks also use non-potable water for irrigation, including Wellington Community Park, Library Park and adjacent ball fields, Viewpointe Park, Wellville Park, Harvest Park, Sunrise Park, and Winick Park.

Source Water Overview

Wilson Wells

The Town owns three groundwater wells which are decreed for municipal use. The wells are physically located on Wilson Avenue and were decreed in March 1971 with a total pumping rate of 2.56 cubic feet per second (cfs). The Wilson Wells are included in the Cache la Poudre Water Users Association augmentation plan (Poudre Plan) and are augmented for use up to 400 acre-feet annually (AF/yr).

The Wilson Wells are utilized by the Town of Wellington for irrigation at Library Park and adjacent ball fields, as well as by Poudre School District for irrigation at Eyestone Elementary School North and South. Approximately 25 AF/yr are used for irrigation purposes. The remaining approximately 375 AF/yr are available to use for potable water production.

The Town installed a nanofiltration membrane treatment unit to utilize with the Wilson Wells for potable water production in 2004. The nanofiltration unit is rated for a maximum potable water production rate of 0.4 million gallons per day (MGD), however, due to water quality discharge requirements at the Water Reclamation Facility, production efficiency limitations of the nanofiltration unit, and distribution system pressure limitations, typical daily production of the unit is closer to 0.25 MGD, or 280 AF/yr. Continual annual use of the nanofiltration unit and including the water production efficiency limitations, results in annual use of Wilson Well water of approximately 365 AF/yr for potable water production.

Water Supply Agreement

The Town of Wellington entered into a Water Supply Agreement (Agreement) with NPIC in August 1983. The Agreement granted Wellington the ability to use a portion of NPIC Reservoir #3, up to 2,000 AF, for municipal water supply, and correspondingly, use of NIPC-owned property to site Wellington's water treatment facilities. It further specified various water transfers from NPIC to Wellington:



- 1. **Stock Water** 275 AF annually from Reservoir #3 based on Wellington's transfer of 53 shares of NPIC stock to NPIC. Wellington annually pays the assessment for the 53 shares plus a 1.5% administrative charge (Assessment Formula).
- 2. **Additional 225** AF up to 225 AF annually from Reservoir #3 in addition to the Stock Water volume. Wellington's payments are based on a market-based formula (Market Formula) that considers the annual transaction value of NPIC stock, applicable interest rate, and NPIC assessment. An additional charge by Northern Water is included on a per AF basis, noted as a differential rate charge.
- 3. **Option Water** up to 1,500 AF annually from Reservoir #3 in addition to Stock Water volume and Additional 225 AF. Wellington's payments are the same as under the Additional 225 AF using the Market Formula plus the Northern Water differential rate charge. The Option Water volume is held for, at an annual cost of \$9,000, and made available out of Reservoir #3 to Wellington every year, whether Wellington uses the water or not.

Payments under the Market Formula are calculated by the following formula:

$$C = \left(\left(\frac{MV}{5.5} * I \right) + \left(\frac{A}{5.5} \right) \right) * 1.015$$

- C = Charge per AF
- MV = Market value of a share of NPIC stock
- I = Farm and Ranch real estate interest rate
- A = Annual NIPC assessment rate per share

The first term in the formula reflects the annual water "purchase" cost per AF. The most recent average annual share price (MV) is divided by the historical share yield as defined in the Agreement (5.5 AF/share), then increased by the current farm and ranch real estate interest rate (I).

The second term in the formula reflects the annual water "delivery" cost per AF. The annual assessment (A) is divided by the historical share yield as defined in the Agreement. In general, this cost represents the administrative and operations burden, including standard operations and maintenance, of delivering water to shareholders.

The third term in the formula reflects an "administrative fee" to provide reimbursement and compensation for administrative expenses, rental of ground, and other contingencies. This fee was reduced from 7.0% to 1.5% with execution of the purchase of 10 acres of land from NPIC in August 2023.

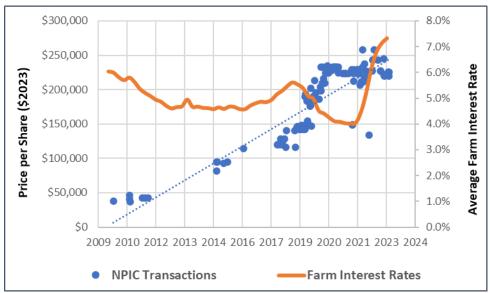


Figure 1. NPIC Share Prices and Farm Interest Rates. Farm interest rates reported by the Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago for farm real estate.

Using this formula, fees paid by Wellington increase substantially if interest rates or the value of NPIC shares increase. Both factors have risen substantially in recent years, as shown in Figure 1. The annual per AF cost for water used beyond the Stock Water volume under the Agreement has seen an increase of 200% since 2018 and nearly 650% since 2013.

In a typical year, Wellington currently uses approximately 900 AF through the Agreement. The cost of water through the Agreement is financially unsustainable for the Town, and the Town is in active negotiations with NPIC to modify the agreement to the benefit of both parties.

Source Water Planning

Securing the 1983 Water Supply Agreement with NPIC worked for the Town of Wellington at the time. It secured a firm supply of up to 2,000 AF at a reasonable price. However, the fixed terms of the agreement are unable to evolve with the changing landscape of water supplies in the Northern Colorado region. As NPIC share prices have increased, the cost for the Town has become unsustainable.

With an eye toward the future, and a desire to diversify the Town's water portfolio, the Town of Wellington contracted in 2016 with Wright Water Engineers, Inc. to perform a Water Supply Alternatives study (Study). Study outcomes in 2017 included a projected water demand analysis as well as a ranked matrix of water supply alternatives.

In subsequent years, Town Staff worked to develop relationships in the region, build more knowledge around the proposed alternatives, and move forward efforts where possible. Including securing additional NPIC shares, typically through development dedication, as well as executing a capital improvement project to increase the pumping rate capacities and reliability at the Wilson Wells to maximize use and increase the reliability of that water source.

In that time, costs associated with the Water Supply Agreement have continued to escalate. The cost per AF at the time of the Study was in the range of \$950/AF. In 2022 the cost per AF reached \$3,700, increasing to \$3,825/AF in 2023. The pressing need to renegotiate the Water Supply Agreement with NPIC has since taken priority over diversifying the Town's water portfolio.

Negotiations with NPIC are ongoing and moving in a positive direction, and Staff is now looking to build upon the 2017 Study with an updated and expanded planning effort, a Water Source Development Plan. Water supply opportunities in the region have changed in scope, participant availability, and cost since the original



Study, with some opportunities no longer available and new opportunities on the horizon. The Water Source Development Plan will develop updated water demand estimates and water supply alternatives and will include an implementation plan and a preliminary financing plan.

Regional Coordination

Water supply planning in the northern Colorado region, and across the West, necessitates a regional approach when possible. Water is a regional resource and does not respect municipal boundaries. The Town of Wellington has increased its participation in regional water activities by becoming a member of the Northern Colorado Water Alliance and by serving on the Technical Advisory Group for the Larimer County Water Master Plan effort.

The Northern Colorado Water Alliance is a collaborative forum for representatives of water providers in the northern Colorado Front Range region. With nearly 20 member organizations, the forum is used to discuss, learn about, and take action on water-focused issues affecting the region's communities and water providers, with an emphasis on protecting the water resources and systems in the Northern Colorado Front Range.

The Larimer County Water Master Plan (Water in Larimer County | Larimer County) kicked off in 2023 and is planned for completion by the end of 2024. Goals of the Master Plan effort include aligning future land use with available water resources and promoting water literacy in our community. The role of the Technical Advisory Group is to provide guidance, advice, and recommendations on technical matters related to water use and conservation, review work produced by the consultant team, and provide knowledge on current operations and resources related to water resources in Larimer County.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Through recent years of changes, the Town's Municipal Code, today, has two articles titled Article 15 of Ch. 2:

- An Ordinance regarding Retail Marijuana Sales Tax was passed by the Town's voters at the November 2, 2021 coordinated, Special Election.
- Ordinance No. 01-2022 regarding Campaign Finance Complaints was passed in early 2022 by the Town Board of Trustees.

Although this issue does not affect the validity of either of the two ordinances, this item, Ordinance No. 06-2024, seeks a new enumeration of the Campaign Finance Complaints Article as Article 17 of Chapter 2 of the Municipal Code. Further, it clarifies that the ordinance passed by the voters at the 2021 election remains Article 15 of Chapter 2.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION

Staff have identified the following options for Board consideration:

- 1. Approve Ordinance No. 06-2024 with the Consent Agenda.
- 2. Remove Ordinance No. 06-2024 from the Consent Agenda and further consider as an Action Item.

Staff recommends the approval of this Ordinance with the Consent Agenda as it effectively corrects a duplication in the current enumeration of Chapter 2 of the Town's Municipal Code.

ORDINANCE NO. 06-2024

AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO CORRECTING THE ENUMERATION OF PORTIONS OF CHAPTER 2 OF THE MUNICIPAL CODE CONCERNING CAMPAIGN FINANCE COMPLAINTS.

WHEREAS, the Town of Wellington (the "Town") has adopted Chapter 2 of the Town Code of the Town of Wellington, Colorado (the "Code"), addressing Administration; and

WHEREAS, at the Special Election held in November of 2021, a referred ordinance concerning the taxation of marijuana sales in Town (the "Marijuana Taxation Measure) was passed by the voters as Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Code; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington, (the "Board") adopted Ordinance 01-2022 to establish Campaign Finance Complaints as Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Code; and

WHEREAS, Ordinance 01-2022 and the Marijuana Taxation Measure contain duplicative enumeration for Article 15 of Chapter 2; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to correct the enumeration of Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Code to reflect the Marijuana Taxation Measure as passed through the Election; and

WHEREAS, the Board desires to amend the enumeration of the Campaign Finance Complaints Article of Chapter 2 of the Code under a new, separate Article 17.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Those portions of Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Wellington Code relating to Campaign Finance Complaints and adopted by Ordinance 01-2022 are moved to a new Article 17 of Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code, which is hereby created and reads as follows:

Article 17 – Campaign Finance Complaints

Sec. 2-17-10. Campaign finance complaints.

(a) Any person who resides in the town limits who believes a violation of Article XXVIII of the Colorado Constitution or the Fair Campaign Practices Act (C.R.S. § 1-45-101 et seq.), as amended, subject to the modifications made by this Code, has occurred related to a municipal election may file a written complaint with the Town Clerk.

- (b) Complaints must be filed no later than one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days after the complainant knew or should have known by the exercise of reasonable diligence of the alleged violation.
- (c) A written complaint filed with the Town Clerk shall include the following information and any other information that the Town Clerk deems necessary to process the complaint:
- (1) The name, address, e-mail address, telephone number and signature of the complainant. If the complainant is represented by counsel, include the counsel's name, address, e-mail address, telephone number and signature;
- (2) The name and, if known, the telephone number, email address, and mailing address of the respondent(s) (or each person alleged to have committed a violation);
- (3) The particulars of the violation, including the specific factual and legal basis for the allegation; and
- (4) Optionally, documentation or other evidence supporting the allegation.
- (d) If an incomplete complaint is received, the date on which the originally filed complaint was received is considered the filed date if a complete copy is received within three (3) business days of notification from the Town Clerk that the complaint was incomplete.

Sec. 2-17-20. Initial review.

- (a) The Town Clerk will review the complaint to determine:
- (1) Whether the complaint was timely filed in accordance with this section;
- (2) Whether the complainant has specifically identified one (1) or more violations of Colorado Constitution Article XXVIII, the Fair Campaign Practices Act, or any rules adopted and promulgated by the Town Clerk concerning campaign and political finance;
- (3) Whether the complainant has alleged sufficient facts and/or provided sufficient information to support a legal and factual basis for the complaint; and
- (4) Whether it is possible through reasonable efforts, to identify the subject of the complaint.
- (b) Within ten (10) business days of receiving the complaint, the Town Clerk must take one (1) or more of the following actions following their initial review:
- (1) If the Town Clerk determines that the complaint fails to satisfy each criteria in section 2-17-10, the Town Clerk will dismiss the complaint and notify the complainant and respondent of the reasons for dismissal. The Town Clerk's determination and dismissal is a final decision.
- (2) If the Town Clerk determines that the complaint satisfies each criteria in section 2-17-10, and alleges one (1) or more curable violations as described in section 2-17-30, the Town Clerk will notify the respondent(s) and provide an opportunity to cure the violation, holding in abeyance any alleged violations that may not be curable.
- (3) If the Town Clerk determines that the complaint satisfies each criteria in section 2-17-10, and that none of the alleged violations may be curable, the Town Clerk will take the actions set forth in section 2-15-40.

Sec. 2-17-30. Curing violations.

- (a) Upon the Town Clerk's determination that a complaint alleges a failure to file or otherwise disclose required information, or other curable violation, the Town Clerk will notify the respondent(s) by email, or by mail if email is unavailable, of the curable deficiencies alleged in the complaint.
- (b) Respondent(s) must provide the Town Clerk with notice of intent to cure on the form provided by the Town Clerk and include a copy of any amendments prior to curing the violation in accordance with this section.
- (c) Respondents shall have ten (10) business days from the date the notice is issued to cure the alleged violation and to notify the Town Clerk, in writing, of actions taken to cure the alleged violation.
- (d) After the period for cure, the Town Clerk will determine, within five (5) business days, whether the respondent(s) cured the violation(s), and if so, whether the respondent(s) substantially complied or acted in good faith. The Town Clerk may ask the respondent to provide additional information and may grant an extension of time to file a notice of intent to cure in order to respond to such a request.
- (1) If the Town Clerk determines that the respondent(s) substantially complied or acted in good faith in curing any alleged violation, the Town Clerk will dismiss the complaint as to such violation. The clerk's determination and dismissal is a final decision.
- (2) If the Town Clerk determines that the respondent neither substantially complied nor acted in good faith in curing any alleged violation, the Town Clerk will take the action as set forth in section 2-17-40 as to such violation.
- (e) In determining whether an entity "substantially complied" the Town Clerk must consider:
- (1) The extent of the noncompliance;
- (2) The purpose of the provision violated and whether that purpose was substantially achieved despite the noncompliance; and
- (3) Whether the noncompliance can properly be viewed as an intentional attempt to mislead the electorate or election officials.

Sec. 2-17-40. Complaint hearing.

- (a) When the Town Clerk is required to take further action as set forth in this section, the Town Clerk shall notify the Town Administrator of the complaint, and the Town Administrator, in consultation with the Town Clerk and the Town Attorney, shall forthwith refer the complaint to a hearing officer appointed by the Board of Trustees to hear and determine such complaint.
- (b) A hearing shall be scheduled and held within thirty (30) calendar days of referral of the complaint to the hearing officer, or the closest business day thereafter if the 30th day falls on a weekend or holiday. Upon written motion, the hearing officer may grant a continuance of up to thirty (30) calendar days upon a showing of good cause. The Town will not be a necessary party to the hearing and will not represent either the complainant or respondent.
- (c) Notice of the hearing, any applicable rules governing the hearing process and the entire complaint received by the Town Clerk shall be sent to the complainant and to the respondent by electronic mail within three (3) business days.

- (d) Upon the request of either party, the hearing officer may issue an administrative subpoena requiring the attendance of a witness or party in relation to an alleged campaign finance violation. It shall be unlawful for a witness or party to fail to comply with such subpoena, and any person convicted of a violation hereof shall be punished in accordance with the procedures of the municipal court.
- (5) The hearing shall be electronically audibly recorded and held for six (6) months past final resolution of the complaint.
- (6) Following the hearing, the hearing officer shall issue a decision in writing within seven (7) business days.
- (7) The hearing officer's decisions as set forth in this section are a final decision subject to review under Rule 106, C.R.C.P.

Sec. 2-17-50. Penalties.

- (a) If the hearing officer determines after a hearing that a violation has occurred, the hearing officer shall impose penalties and sanctions as set forth in C.R.S § 1-45-111.5 and 8 C.C.R. 1505-6, both as amended. Recovery of a party's reasonable attorney fees and costs shall be as set forth therein.
- (b) The town may pursue any legal means for the collection of civil penalties imposed under this section. The Town Administrator may also refer the matter for collection by whatever means are available to the town, including by a private collection agency and the party responsible to pay the penalty may be assessed in the cost of collection.

Section 2. Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code continues to be and solely consists of the Article titled "Retail Marijuana Sales Tax," as referred to the voters by Resolution No. 38-2020 and adopted by the voters in the November 2, 2021 election.

Section 3. If any clause or provision of this ordinance is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of the clause or provisions will not affect the validity of any of the remaining clauses or provisions of this ordinance.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2 OF THE WELLINGTON MUNICIPAL CODE AND ESTABLISHING A HEARING PROCESS TO ADDRESS ALLEGED MUNICIPAL CAMPAIGN FINANCE COMPLAINTS AND VIOLATIONS

WHEREAS, until state legislation was adopted in 2019, the Town was able to rely on election campaign regulations and enforcement by the Colorado Secretary of State through Title 1, Article 45 of the Colorado Revised Statutes the Fair Campaign Practices Act (the "FCPA"); and

WHEREAS, while the Colorado Constitution, Article XXVIII, provides that the Colorado Secretary of State handle third party complaints alleging violations of campaign finance laws, the Secretary of State may no longer accept filings of complaints concerning municipal campaign finance matters; and

WHEREAS, on May 29, 2019, the Governor signed SB 19-232, which amends C.R.S. § 1-45-111.7(9)(b) of the Colorado Fair Campaign Practices Act and provides that any complaint arising out of a municipal campaign finance matter be exclusively filed with the clerk of the applicable municipality; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires to establish a process for review of municipal campaign finance complaints in order to ensure that such matters are addressed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Article 15 of Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code is hereby created and reads as follows:

Article 15 - Campaign Finance Complaints

Sec. 2-15-10 Campaign Finance Complaints.

- a. Any person who resides in the town limits who believes a violation of Article XXVIII of the Colorado Constitution or the Fair Campaign Practices Act (C.R.S. § 1-45-101 et seq.), as amended, subject to the modifications made by this Code, has occurred related to a municipal election may file a written complaint with the Town Clerk.
- b. Complaints must be filed no later than one hundred and eighty (180) calendar days after the complainant knew or should have known by the exercise of reasonable diligence of the alleged violation.
- c. A written complaint filed with the Town Clerk shall include the following information and any other information that the Town Clerk deems necessary to process the complaint:

- 1) The name, address, e-mail address, telephone number and signature of the complainant. If the complainant is represented by counsel, include the counsel's name, address, e-mail address, telephone number and signature;

 - 4) Whether it is possible through reasonable efforts, to identify the subject of the complaint.

a. Upon the Town Clerk's determination that a complaint alleges a failure to file or otherwise disclose required information, or other curable violation, the Town Clerk will notify the respondent(s) by email, or by mail if email is unavailable, of the curable deficiencies alleged in the complaint.

- b. Respondent(s) must provide the Town Clerk with notice of intent to cure on the form provided by the Town Clerk and include a copy of any amendments prior to curing the violation in accordance with this section.
- c. Respondents shall have ten (10) business days from the date the notice is issued to cure the alleged violation and to notify the Town Clerk, in writing, of actions taken to cure the alleged violation.
- d. After the period for cure, the Town Clerk will determine, within five (5) business days, whether the respondent(s) cured the violation(s), and if so, whether the respondent(s) substantially complied or acted in good faith. The Town Administrator may also refer the matter for collection by whatever means are available to the town, including by a private collection agency and the party responsible to pay the penalty may be assessed in the cost of collection.
- Section 2. The Board of Trustees declares that, should any provision, section, paragraph, sentence or word of this Ordinance be rendered or declared invalid by any final court action in a court of competent jurisdiction or by reason of any preemptive legislation, the remaining provisions. sections, paragraphs, sentences, or words of this Ordinance as hereby adopted shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 3. All the provisions of the Wellington Municipal Code as heretofore adopted that conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed as of the effective date of this Ordinance.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO REFERRING TO THE VOTERS THE INITIATED ORDINANCE CONCERNING RETAIL MARIJUANA SALES TAX IN THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO

- WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. § 31-11-104(1) a petition to impose a retail marijuana sales tax in the Town of Wellington was submitted to the Wellington Town Clerk (the "Special Sales Tax Petition"), and
- WHEREAS, on August 20, 2020, the Town Clerk, in accordance with C.R.S. §31-11-109, issued her statement of sufficiency finding that a sufficient number of signatures had been submitted in support of the Special Sales Tax Petition, and
- WHEREAS, on September 8, 2020, two C.R.S. §31-11-110 protests were timely filed protesting the sufficiency of the Special Sales Tax Petition and a companion Ordinance Concerning the Regulation of Retail and Medical Marijuana Stores; and
- WHEREAS, on September 20, 2020 the C.R.S. §31-11-110 hearing officer dismissed one protest and determined that the second protest did not protest the Special Sales Tax Petition, and
- WHEREAS, the Haring Officer found the companion Ordinance Concerning the Regulation of Retail and Medical Marijuana Stores to not be sufficient and that ordinance is therefore not submitted to the voters but the Hearing Officer's determination has been appealed; and
- **WHEREAS**, the time to appeal the Hearing Officer's findings as allowed by Colorado Rule of Civil Procedure 106(b) expired on October 19, 2020; and
- WHEREAS, with the expiration of the C.R.C.P 106(b) appeals period there has been a final determination of petition sufficiency as required by to C.R.S. § 31-11-104(1) as to the Special Sales Tax Petition, and
- WHEREAS, C.R.S. § 31-11-104 requires that the Town Board to publish the proposed ordinance as other ordinances are published and to refer the proposed ordinance, in the form petitioned for, to the registered electors of the Town at a regular or special election; and
- **WHEREAS**, the Town Board may not itself adopt the Special Sales Tax Petition as the Special Sales Tax Petition is required to be adopted by the Town's voters by the Colo. Const. art. $X \S 20 (4)$ ("TABOR") and by C.R.S. $\S 29-2-115$; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to C.R.S. 31-11-104, the ordinance shall not take effect unless a majority of the registered electors voting on the measure at the election vote in favor of the measure.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO, THAT:

The Special Sales Tax Petition is referred captioned as an **Ordinance Concerning Retail Marijuana Sales Tax in the Town of Wellington, Colorado,** adding a new Article 15 Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code entitled "Retail Marijuana Sales Tax," is, as required by C.R.S. §31-11-104(1), referred by Town Board of Trustees of the Town of Wellington Colorado, in the form petitioned for, to the registered electors of the Town to be voted on at a special election to be held on November 2, 2021.

Be it enacted by the Town of Wellington, Colorado

Ordinance Concerning Retail Marijuana Sales Tax in the Town of Wellington, Colorado

WHEREAS, Article X, Section 20 of the Colorado Constitution, also referred to as the Taxpayer's Bill of Rights ("TABOR") requires voter approval for any new tax, any increase in any tax rate, the creation of any debt, extension of an expiring tax, and the spending of certain funds above limits established by TABOR; and

WHEREAS, November 3, 2020, is the coordinated general election for the State of Colorado and is one of the election dates at which ballot issues may be submitted to the eligible electors of the Town pursuant to TABOR; and

WHEREAS, if approved by a majority of the registered electors of the Town voting in the November 3, 2020 coordinated general election, Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code shall be amended to add a new Article 15, "Retail Marijuana Sales Tax," as provided herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE REGISTERED ELECTORS OF THE TOWN OF WELLINGTON, COLORADO THAT:

Section 1. A new Article 15 is hereby added to Chapter 2 of the Wellington Municipal Code entitled "Retail Marijuana Sales Tax," to read as follows:

Article 15 - RETAIL MARIJUANA SALES TAX

Sec. 15-10 Administration and Enforcement.

The Retail Marijuana Sales Tax imposed pursuant to this Article shall be administered and enforced in a manner consistent with the administration and enforcement of other Town sales taxes, including, without limitation, any penalties for failure to make any return or to collect or pay any tax.

Sec. 15-20 Definitions.

When used in this Article, the following words and phrases shall have the following meanings, unless from the context it clearly appears that a different meaning is indicated:

Consumer: A person twenty-one (21) years of age or older who purchases Retail Marijuana or Retail Marijuana Products for personal use by a person twenty-one (21) years of age or older.

Retail Marijuana: All parts of the plant of the genus cannabis whether growing or not, the seeds thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and every compound, manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or its resin, including marijuana concentrate. "Marijuana" does not include industrial hemp, nor does it include fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, or the weight of any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink or other product. Retail Marijuana does not include Medical Marijuana as defined under the Colorado Medical Marijuana Code, C.R.S. §12-43.3-101, et seq., and Chapter 2 of the Code.

Retail Marijuana Products: Concentrated Retail Marijuana Products that are comprised of Retail Marijuana and other ingredients and are intended for use or consumption, such as, but not

limited to, edible products, ointments, and tinctures.

Retail Marijuana Sales Tax: The tax imposed on the sale of Retail Marijuana and Retail Marijuana Products pursuant to this Chapter.

Retail Marijuana Store: An entity licensed by the Colorado Department of Revenue to sell Retail Marijuana and Retail Marijuana Products to Consumers pursuant to Section 16 of Article XVIII of the Colorado Constitution and the "Colorado Retail Marijuana Code," Article 43.4 of Title 12, C.R.S., and licensed by the Local Licensing Authority pursuant to the Code.

Sec. 15-30 Imposition of tax.

- A. In addition to the sales tax imposed by Article 4, Chapter 4 of the Code, there is imposed upon all sales of Retail Marijuana and Retail Marijuana Products to a Consumer by a Retail Marijuana Store a tax at the rate of three and one-half percent (3.5%) of the amount of the sale.
- B. The maximum tax rate that may be imposed pursuant to this Section is five percent (5%). At any time on or after January 1, 2022, the Town may, by ordinance:
 - 1. Establish another tax rate to be imposed pursuant to this Chapter that is equal to or less than the maximum five percent (5%) tax rate provided in this subsection; or
 - 2. After establishing a tax rate that is lower than five percent (5%), increase or decrease the tax rate to be imposed pursuant to this Chapter; except that in no event shall the Town increase the tax rate above five percent (5%) of the amount of the sale of Retail Marijuana or Retail Marijuana Products.
- C. Nothing in this section shall be construed to impose a tax on the sale of marijuana products to any person by a Medical Marijuana Center licensed by the Colorado Department of Revenue to sell Medical Marijuana pursuant to the Colorado Medical Marijuana Code, Article 43.3 of Title 12, C.R.S., and licensed by the Town pursuant to this Chapter. To the extent any Retail Marijuana Establishment exists at the same location and under common ownership with a licensed Medical Marijuana Center, the retailer shall strictly segregate and account for sales of Retail Marijuana distinct from Medical Marijuana in accordance with all applicable state and city laws.

Sec. 15-40 Purpose of tax.

The Board of Trustees hereby declares that the purpose of the levy of the Retail Marijuana Sales Tax imposed by this Article is for raising funds for construction of a new community or recreation center, and/or other general operating expenses as may be designated instead by the Town on an annual basis.

Sec. 15-50 Revenue and spending limitations.

Notwithstanding any limitations on revenue, spending, or appropriations contained in Section 20 of Article X of the Colorado Constitution or any other provision of law, any revenues generated by the Retail Marijuana Sales Tax imposed pursuant to this Article, as approved by the voters at the general election on November 3, 2020, may be collected and spent as a voter-approved revenue change and shall not require further voter approval to modify the tax rate as provided in this Article.

Section 2. If any clause or provision of this ordinance is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of the clause or provisions will not affect the validity of any of the remaining clauses or provisions of this ordinance.

The Town has been contacted by Jack Patterson who serves as the Colorado Opioid Response Operations Administrator, asking if Wellington would be interested in pooling opioid funds with the Larimer County Region. The goal of pooling funds is to support regional efforts and reduce the administrative burden related to required reporting on the use of the funds. Both Berthoud and Estes Park currently pool their funds with the Region and Loveland and Fort Collins utilize their funds through current city programming.

FISCAL IMPLICATIONS

The estimated revenue of the opioid funds for Wellington over an 18-year period is \$16,492.82 with a requirement to use the funds on specific programming and provide annual reporting. Considering a Contract for Crack Seal and Chip Seal Services Presentation: Bob Gowing, Director of Public Works

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Pavement Preventive Maintenance is an annual capital improvement program consisting of annual projects. The focus of the work is to use standard asphalt paving maintenance techniques, such as crack seal and chip seal, to repair and extend the lifespan of selected streets throughout town. Streets are chosen for this project based on age, condition, and anticipated traffic loading. Maintenance of this sort helps delay the need for more intensive options, such as mill/overlay and reconstruction, which are significantly more expensive processes. The primary focus for this year's project is to apply crack seal and chip seal to the section of Laimer County Road (LCR) 9 between LCR 64 and LCR 66.

Projects of this sort are highly weather dependent and typically need to be spanned over multiple fiscal years. In the past, the lack of a formal "rollover" or budget amendment process has caused occasional instances where approved CIP projects with executed contracts did not have access to previously appropriated funds in the succeeding year. A procedure for this has recently been created and is being used for this project. Specifically, this project is drawing from unexpended funds appropriated in the 2023 budget and current appropriated funds in the 2024 budget. An additional factor in the planning for this 2024 version of the project is the rapid deterioration of LCR 9, which necessitates both crack seal and chip seal. As a result of that deterioration, staff determined the best course of action was to utilize unexpended funds of \$80,400 appropriated in the 2023 budget and the \$108,045 appropriated in the 2024 budget, resulting in a total appropriated amount of \$188,445 being available to address LCR 9.

Bids were solicited directly from the four firms who provide this service in the region, and one bid was received from A-1 Chipseal & Rocky Mountain Pavement, LLC, in the amount of \$175,989.20. The bid was thoroughly evaluated and references were contacted. Staff recommends executing the attached bid for crack seal and chip seal services.

The Owner and the Contractor agree that the Agreement shall be construed and governed by the laws of Colorado and that venue for any dispute or litigation arising out of this Agreement shall be in Adams County, Colorado.
- 5. Any alteration or deviation from the specifications, including those directed by the Owner, construction lender and any public body, that involves extra cost (subcontract, labor, materials) will be executed only upon the parties entering into a written change order, which Contractor may or may not execute at its discretion. Owner hereby authorizes Contractor to make any such repairs and agrees to be responsible for the cost of any such repairs and agrees to be responsible for the cost of any such additional work and materials necessary to complete the Job as described herein.
- 6. Contractor will provide and pay for all labor and materials necessary to complete the Project. Contractor is released from this obligation for expenses incurred when the Owner is in arrears in making progress payments.
- 7. Contractor will maintain worker's disability compensation insurance for his employees and comprehensive coverage liability insurance policies. Owner to carry insurance against fire, tornado, hail, vandalism and other casualty losses.
- 8. Contractor may substitute materials without notice to the owner in order to allow work to proceed, provided that the substituted materials are of no lesser quality than those listed in the specifications.
- 9. Contractor shall not be responsible for underlying materials of the payement.

- 10. The parties agree that in the event of breach of any warranty, either expressed or implied, the liability of the Contractor shall be limited to the labor costs of replacing the defective work. The Contractor shall not be liable for any other damages either direct or consequential. Notwithstanding anything else to the contrary, the Contractor shall have no liability or responsibility for any damage to the structure, its contents, floors, carpets and walkways that is caused by the condition of tracking materials (sealcoat, crack filler, tar, etc.), caused by others besides employees, regardless of whether such damage occurs or is worsened during the performance of the job.
- 11. Any warranty, express or implied, is void if contract is not paid in full
- 12. If any payment under this Agreement is not made when due, the Contractor may suspend work on the job until such time as all payments due have been made. Any failure to make payment is subject to a claim enforced against the property in accordance with applicable lien laws.
- 13. In the event the amount of Contract is not paid within 30 days from completion, the account shall be in default. The acceptor of this Agreement agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Contractor from any costs of expenses incurred in the collection of the defaulted account, or in any part thereof, including attorney's fees, court cost, etc., and further agrees that the defaulted account, or in part thereof, including attorney's fees, court cost, etc., and further agrees that the defaulted account will bear interest at the rate of 1-1/2% per month, not to exceed 18% per year and not to exceed the maximum rate permitted by law, on the unpaid balance.
- 14. Owner agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Contractor and its agents, managers, directors, officers and employees from and against claims, damages, losses and expenses arising out of or resulting from the performance of this Agreement, including claims relating to damages caused by other tradesman and claims related to environmental laws and hazardous materials, except to the extent that such damage, loss or expense is due to the gross negligence or willful misconduct of the party seeking indemnity.
- 15. This contract shall become binding when signed by all parties and the authorized office of the Contractor. Owner agrees that upon cancellation before work is started, or before material is delivered on the job, to be liable for 15% of gross amount of contract for restocking fees. Owner is liable for the full amount of contract in the event they cancel contract after work has started.
- 16. Credit Card payments (Visa and Mastercard) are accepted. A 2.9% processing fee will be applied to the invoice.
- 17. Any notice required or permitted under this Agreement may be given certified or registered mail at the addresses contained in the Agreement.
- 18. Owner further agrees that the equity in this property is security in this Contract. This Contract shall become binding only upon written acceptance hereof by the Contractor or by an authorized Agent of the contractor, or upon commencement of the work.
- 19. This Contract constitutes the entire understanding of the parties, and no other understanding, collateral or otherwise, shall be binding unless in writing signed by both parties.
- 20. The proposal will expire within 90 days from date unless extended in writing by the company. After 90 days, we reserve the right to revise our price in accordance with costs in effect at that time.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

A contract for consultant services is being presented to the Board of Trustees for award to WestWater Research, LLC. This contract will result in a Water Source Development Plan, to include implementation and financing plans to diversify Wellington's source water portfolio.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

The Town of Wellington has two sources of raw water. Three groundwater wells augmented for use up to 400 acre-feet (AF) annually and a Water Supply Agreement with the North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) for use of surface water out of Reservoir #3 up to 2,000 AF annually. The per AF cost of the annual lease with NPIC has increased by more than 600% over the past 10 years. This cost increase, combined with the Town's desire to have more control over its water future, spurred the initiative to develop a Water Source Development Plan, to include implementation and financing plans to diversify Wellington's source water portfolio.

Town staff utilized the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) process to select a consultant for the Water Source Development Plan (Water Plan). The RFQ process differs from the more common Request for Proposals (RFP) process in that the emphasis is on qualifications, such as skills, knowledge, expertise, experience, relationships and other factors not specifically related to cost. Developing a Water Plan with a focus on financial feasibility involves complex and highly specialized work that necessitates expertise not easily quantified in a traditional RFP format. The RFQ process allowed Staff to assess the qualifications and experience of consultants more effectively, ensuring the selected consultant possesses the specific skills and knowledge required for the project's success. An RFQ process also offers greater flexibility in developing the Scope of Work for the project, allowing for an iterative process between Staff and the consultant.

The Town received RFQ responses from two firms. The responses were reviewed and scored by the four-person internal selection committee based on the following evaluation criteria defined in the RFQ (attached):

- 1. Demonstrated experience and expertise in water resources assessment and development, with a comprehensive understanding of regional water source development in northern Colorado (25%).
- 2. Demonstrated experience and expertise in economic feasibility analysis methodologies and tools (25%).
- 3. Qualifications and experience of key personnel, including economists or financial analysts (20%).
- 4. Past performance on similar projects, with emphasis on projects based in the Northern Colorado Front Range (20%).
- 5. Location of Firm and Key Personnel (10%): Preference will be given to firms with location(s) of key personnel that are conducive to proper and efficient management of the project.



Staff worked with the selected consultant, WestWater Research, LLC, to develop an appropriate Scope of Work to achieve the goals of the project, as defined in the RFQ Scope of Services section, while staying within the available budget. The Scope of Work is included as Attachment A to the Consultant Contract for Services. The proposed Scope of Work includes an Optional Task 8 to develop a preliminary financing plan to support the selected water supply alternatives. As the Optional Task 8 is within the appropriated budget amount, the Contract for Consultant Services executes the entire proposed scope of work, including Task 8.

• Infrastructure: Ensure adequate current and future water resources and encourage the wise use of treated drinking water.

CONSULTANT CONTRACT FOR SERVICES, GL# 211-80-5035

Parties: The parties to this Contract are the Town of Wellington, 8225 Third Street, Wellington, Colorado 80549 (Town) and West Water Research LLC, 205 South Meldrum, Fort Collins, CO 80521 (Consultant).

Purpose of Contract: The purpose of this Contract is for the Town of Wellington to retain the services of the Consultant to render certain technical or professional services hereinafter described.

Term of Contract and Required Approvals: This Contract is effective when all parties have executed it (Effective Date). The term of the Contract is from the Effective Date through December 31, 2024. All services shall be completed during this term.

If the Consultant has been delayed and as a result will be unable to complete performance fully and satisfactorily within this Contract period, the Consultant may be granted an extension of time upon submission of evidence of the causes of delay satisfactory to the Town.

Responsibilities of the Consultant:

Scope of Services: The Consultant shall perform the specific services required under this Contract in a satisfactory and proper manner as outlined in Attachment A. The standard of care for the Consultant under this Contract will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the Consultant's profession providing similar services for projects of similar size, location, scope, and complexity to this project.

The scope of services shall be as defined within the Consultant's proposal and any further stipulation of the terms specified in Attachment A.

Personnel: All services required hereunder will be performed by the Consultant or under its supervision, and all personnel engaged in the work shall be fully qualified and shall be authorized, licensed, or permitted under state law to perform such services if state law requires such authorization, license, or permit.

Records Administration: The Consultant shall maintain or supervise the maintenance of all records necessary to properly account for the payments made to the Consultant for costs authorized by this Contract. The Consultant shall be responsible and responsive to the Town in its requests and requirements related to the scope of this Contract. The Consultant shall select and analyze all data in a systematic and meaningful manner to contribute directly in meeting the objectives of the project and shall present this information clearly and concisely in a professional and workmanlike manner.

Reports, Maps, Plans, Models and Documents: A minimum of one (1) copy of maps, plans, worksheets, logs, field notes or other documents prepared under this Contract as relevant to this project shall be submitted to the Town. The Consultant shall also submit any computer program or spreadsheet developed as a part of this project. Digital media shall be labeled to provide sufficient detail to access the information on the media. Any user manuals shall be submitted to the Town with complete documentation of computer programs developed under this Contract. The user manual shall also specify the source code language and the type of computer equipment necessary to operate the program(s).

Subcontracts:

- (i) Approval Required for Subcontracts: Any subcontractors required by the Consultant in connection with the services, work performed or rendered under this Contract will be limited to such individuals or firms as were specifically identified in the proposal and agreed to during negotiations or are specifically authorized by the Town during the performance of this Contract. During the performance of the Contract, substitutions in or additions to such subcontracts will be subject to the prior approval by the Town. The Consultant shall be responsible for the actions of the subcontractors.
- (ii) Billing for Subcontracts: Billings for subcontractor services shall include any mark-up as set forth in Attachment A. Subcontract costs shall be documented by attaching subcontractor billings to the Consultant's billing submittals.

Responsibilities of the Town:

Data to be Furnished: All information, data, drawings, reports, maps, etc. as are available to the Town and necessary for the carrying out of the scope of services shall be furnished to the Consultant without charge, and the Town shall cooperate with the Consultant in the carrying out of the project.

Report Reviews and Criteria: The Town shall examine all studies, reports, sketches, drawings, opinions of costs, and other documents presented by the Consultant and shall promptly render the Town's decisions pertaining thereto. The Town shall provide all criteria and full information regarding its requirements for the project.

General Provisions:

Amendments: Any changes, modifications, revisions, or amendments to this Contract which are mutually agreed upon by the parties to this Contract shall be incorporated by written instrument executed by all parties to this Contract.

Assignment Prohibited and Contract Shall Not Be Used as Collateral: Neither party shall assign or otherwise transfer any of the rights or delegate any of the duties set out in this Contract without the prior written consent of the other party. The Consultant shall not use this Contract, or any portion thereof, for collateral for any financial obligation.

Audit and Access to Records: The Town shall have access to any books, documents, papers, electronic data, and records of the Consultant which are pertinent to this Contract. The Consultant shall immediately, upon receiving written instruction from the Town, provide to any independent auditor or accountant all books, documents, papers, electronic data, and records of the Consultant which are pertinent to this Contract.

Authority: Provisions of this Contract are pursuant to the authority set forth in the Town of Wellington Municipal Code. Mandatory applicable state and federal regulations also apply.

Compliance with Laws: The Consultant shall keep informed of and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations in the performance of this Contract.

Confidentiality: Each party shall retain as confidential all information and data furnished to it by the other party which are designated in writing by such other party as confidential at the time of transmission and are obtained or acquired by the receiving party in connection with this Contract, and said parties shall not reveal such information to any third party. However, nothing herein is meant to preclude either disclosing and/or otherwise using confidential information (i) when the confidential information is actually known to the receiving party before being obtained or derived from the transmitting party; or (ii) when confidential information is generally available to the public without the receiving party's fault at any time before or after it is acquired from the transmitting party; or (iii) where the confidential information is obtained or acquired in good faith at any time by the receiving party from a third party who has the same in good faith and who is not under any obligation to the transmitting party in respect thereof; or (iv) is required by law or court order to be disclosed.

Conflicts of Interest: The Consultant stipulates that none of its officers or employees are officers or employees of the Town unless disclosure has been made in accordance with Town ordinances and policies. Furthermore, the Consultant certifies that it has not offered or given any gift or compensation prohibited by local, state, or federal law, to any officer or employee of the Town to secure favorable treatment with respect to being awarded this Contract. The Consultant shall not engage in providing consultation or representation of clients, agencies or firms which may constitute a conflict of interest which results in a disadvantage to the Town or a disclosure which would adversely affect the interests of the Town. The Consultant shall notify the Town of any potential or actual conflicts of interest arising during this Contract. This Contract may be terminated in the event a conflict of interest arises. Termination of the Contract will be subject to a mutual settlement of accounts. In the event the Contract is terminated under this provision, the Consultant shall take steps to ensure that the file, evidence, evaluation, and data are provided to the Town or its designee. This does not prohibit or affect the Consultant's ability to engage in consultations, evaluations, or representation under agreement with other agencies, firms, facilities, or attorneys so long as no conflict exists. A conflict of interest warranting termination of this Contract may include, but is not necessarily limited to, acting on behalf of a client in an adversarial proceeding against the Town or initiating suits in equity including injunctions, declaratory judgments, writs of prohibition, or quo warranto.

Contract Jurisdiction, Choice of Law, and Venue: The provisions of the Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Colorado. The parties will submit to the jurisdiction of the courts of the State of Colorado. Venue shall be Larimer County, Colorado.

Contract Renegotiation, Modifications and Award of Related Contracts: This Contract may be amended, modified, or supplemented only by written amendment to the Contract, executed by the parties hereto, and attached to the original signed copy of the Contract. The Town may undertake or award supplemental or successor contracts for work related to this Contract or may award contracts to other contractors for work related to this Contract. The Consultant shall cooperate fully with other contractors and the Town in all such cases to the extent such cooperation is within the scope of services described in Attachment A. The Town, at its sole discretion and through duly authorized contract amendments, may request the Consultant to complete additional phases beyond the scope of services included in this Contract.

Disbarment: The Consultant certifies that neither it nor its principals are presently disbarred, suspended, proposed for disbarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction (Contract) by any governmental department or agency. If the Consultant cannot certify this statement, a written explanation for review by the Town shall be provided.

Entirety of Contract: This Contract, including Attachment A, represents the entire and integrated Contract between the parties. In the event of a conflict or inconsistency between the language of this Contract and the language of any attachment or document incorporated by reference, the language of this Contract shall control.

Equal Opportunity Clause: The Consultant agrees to abide by the provisions under Title VI and VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42USC 2000e) which prohibits discrimination against any employee or applicant for employment or any applicant or recipient of services, on a basis of race, religion, color, or national origin. This includes abiding to Executive Order 11246 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of sex, and 45 CFR which prohibits discrimination on the basis of age, Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, or the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 which prohibits discrimination on the basis of a disability.

Force Majeure: Neither party shall be liable for failure to perform under this Contract if such failure to perform arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the nonperforming party. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or the public enemy, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather. This provision shall become effective only if the party failing to perform immediately notifies the other party of the extent and nature of the problem, limits delay in performance to that required by the event and takes all reasonable steps to minimize delays.

Indemnification: The Consultant agrees to indemnify, save harmless, and release the Town and all its officers, agents, volunteers, and employees from and against any and all loss, damage, injury, liability, suits, and proceedings arising out of the performance of this Contract to the extent caused by the negligence of the Consultant's officers, agents, volunteers, or employees, but not for claims from the Town's negligence.

Independent Contractor: The Consultant shall function as an independent contractor for the purposes of this Contract and shall not be considered an employee of the Town for any purpose and as such, have no authorization, express or implied to by the Town, to any agreements, settlements, liability or understanding whatsoever, and agrees not to perform any acts as an agent for the Town except as expressly set forth herein. The Consultant shall be responsible for the payment of all income tax and social security amounts due because of payments received from the Town. Persons employed by the Town and acting under the direction of the Town shall not be deemed to be employees or agents of the Consultant. Nothing in this Contract shall be interpreted as authorizing the Consultant or its agents or employees to act as an agent or representative or to incur any obligation of any kind for or on behalf of the Town. The Consultant agrees that no health or hospitalization benefits, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, or similar benefits available to Town employees will inure to the benefit of the Consultant or the Consultant's agents or employees because of this Contract.

Insurance Coverage: The Consultant shall not commence work under this Contract until it has obtained all the insurance required by the Town. The Consultant shall obtain and maintain the following insurance in accordance with the Insurance Requirements set forth below and shall provide the Town with proofs of these insurance upon request:

- (i) Automobile Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain automobile liability insurance covering any auto (including owned, hired, and non-owned) with minimum limits of \$1,000,000 each accident combined single limit.
- (ii) Commercial, General Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain commercial general liability insurance (CGL) coverage, occurrence form, covering liability claims for bodily injury and property damage arising out of premises, operations, products and completed operations, and personal and advertising injury, with minimum limits as stated below. The CGL policy shall include coverage for Explosion, Collapse and Underground property damage. This coverage may not be excluded by endorsement.
- (a) \$1,000,000 each occurrence;
- (b) \$1,000,000 personal injury and advertising injury;
- (c) \$2,000,000 general aggregate; and
- (d) \$2,000,000 products and completed operations.
- (iii) Professional Liability or Errors and Omissions Liability Insurance: The Consultant shall maintain professional liability insurance or errors and omissions liability insurance protecting against any and all claims arising from the Consultant's alleged or real professional errors, omissions, or mistakes in the performance of professional duties under this Contract, with minimum limits as stated below.
- (a) \$1.000.000 each claim: and

- (b) \$2,000,000 general aggregate.
- (iv) Unemployment Insurance: The Consultant shall be duly registered with the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment and obtain such unemployment insurance coverage as required.
- (v) Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability Insurance: Employees hired in Colorado to perform work under this Contract shall be covered by workers' compensation coverage per the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment's Workers' Compensation program as statutorily required. Employees brought into Colorado from Consultant's home state to perform work under this Contract shall be covered by workers' compensation coverage obtained through the same or other state or private workers' compensation insurance approved by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment as statutorily required.

Insurance Requirements:

- (i) During the term of this Contract, the Consultant shall obtain and maintain, and ensure that each subcontractor obtains and maintains, each type of insurance coverage specified in Insurance Coverage above.
- (ii) All policies (except for Workers' Compensation and Professional Liability) shall be primary over any insurance or self-insurance program carried by the Consultant or the Town. All policies (except for Professional Liability) shall include clauses stating that each insurance carrier shall waive all rights of recovery under subrogation or otherwise against Consultant or the Town, its agencies, institutions, organizations, officers, agents, employees, and volunteers.
- (iii) The Consultant shall provide Certificates of Insurance to the Town, verifying each type of coverage required herein.
- (iv) All policies shall be endorsed to provide at least thirty (30) days advance written notice of cancellation to the Town. A copy of the policy endorsement shall be provided with the Certificate of Insurance.
- (v) In case of a breach of any provision relating to Insurance Requirements or Insurance Coverage, the Town may, at the Town's option, obtain and maintain, at the expense of the Consultant, such insurance in the name of the Consultant, or subcontractor, as the Town may deem proper and may deduct the cost of obtaining and maintaining such insurance from any sums which may be due or become due to the Consultant under this Contract.
- **(vi)** All policies required by this Contract shall be issued by an insurance company with an A.M. Best rating of A- VIII or better.
- (vii) The Town reserves the right to reject any policy issued by an insurance company that does not meet these requirements.

Limitation of Liability: Excluding the Consultant's liability for bodily injury or damage to the property of third parties, the total aggregate liability of the Consultant arising out of the performance or breach of this Contract shall not exceed the compensation paid to the Consultant under this Contract. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Contract, the Consultant shall have no liability to the Town for contingent,

consequential, or other indirect damages including, without limitation, damages for loss of use, revenue or profit; operating costs and facility downtime, however the same may be caused. The limitations and exclusions of liability set forth in this Article shall apply regardless of the fault, breach of contract, tort (including negligence), strict liability or otherwise of the Consultant, its employees, or subconsultants.

Notice of Sale or Transfer: The Consultant shall provide the Town with notice of any sale, transfer, merger, or consolidation of the assets of the Consultant. Such notice shall be provided in accordance with the notices provision of this Contract and, when possible and lawful, in advance of the transaction. If the Town determines that the sale, transfer, merger, or consolidation is not consistent with the continued satisfactory performance of the Consultant's obligations under this Contract, then the Town may, at its discretion, terminate or renegotiate the Contract.

Ownership of Documents and Information: The Town owns all documents, data compilations, reports, computer programs, photographs, drawings, data, and other work provided to or produced by the Consultant in the performance of this Contract. Upon termination of services for any reason and payment to Consultant, the Consultant agrees to return all such original and derivative information and documents to the Town in a useable format. Any use or reuse other than for the purposes set forth herein shall be at the Town's sole risk and liability. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary in this Contract, Town shall not have direct access to (or any rights of assignment or ownership in) Contractor's Waterlitix database nor will Contractor be obligated to provide raw data extracted from Waterlitix to Town.

Patent or Copyright Protection: The Consultant recognizes that certain proprietary matters or techniques may be subject to patent, trademark, copyright, license or other similar restrictions, and warrants that no work performed by the Consultant or its subcontractors will violate any such restriction. The Consultant shall defend and indemnify the Town for any infringement or alleged infringement of such patent, trademark, copyright, license, or other restrictions.

Severability: A declaration by any court or any other binding legal source that any provision of this contract is illegal and void shall not affect the legality and enforceability of any provision of this Contract unless the provisions are mutually dependent.

Taxes: The Consultant shall pay all taxes and other such amounts required by federal, state and local law, including, but not limited to, federal and social security taxes, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, and sales taxes.

Termination of Contract: This Contract may be terminated with cause by either party in advance of the specified termination date upon written notice being provided by the other party. Unless the Town determines in good faith a default is not remediable, there have been prior violations with notice, or a default is determined to be detrimental to public safety, the party in violation will be given thirty (30) working days after notification to correct and cease the violations after which, if the violations have not been substantially corrected or ceased, the Contract may be terminated for cause. This Contract may be terminated without cause in advance of a specified expiration date by either party upon thirty (30) days prior written notice being given by the other party.

Prohibition Against Employing Illegal Aliens: This paragraph shall apply to all Consultants whose performance of work under this Contract does not involve the delivery of a specific end product other than reports that are merely incidental to the performance of said work. Pursuant to Section 8-17.5-101, C.R.S., et. seq., Consultant represents and agrees that:

- (i) As of the date of this Contract:
 - (a) Consultant does not knowingly employ or contract with an illegal alien; and
 - (b) Consultant has participated or attempted to participate in the basic pilot employment verification program created in Public Law 208, 104th Congress, as amended, and expanded in Public Law 156, 108th Congress, as amended, administered by the United States Department of Homeland Security (the "Basic Pilot Program") in order to confirm the employment eligibility of all newly hired employees.
- (ii) Consultant shall not knowingly employ or contract with an illegal alien to perform work under this Contract or knowingly enter into a contract with a subcontractor that knowingly employs or contracts with an illegal alien to perform work under this Contract.
- (iii) Consultant shall continue to apply to participate in the Basic Pilot Program and shall in writing verify same every three (3) calendar months thereafter, until Consultant is accepted or the public contract for services has been completed, whichever is earlier. The requirements of this section shall not be required or effective if the Basic Pilot Program is discontinued.
- **(iv)** Consultant is prohibited from using Basic Pilot Program procedures to undertake pre-employment screening of job applicants while this Contract is being performed.
- (v) If Consultant obtains actual knowledge that a subcontractor performing work under this Contract knowingly employs or contracts with an illegal alien, Consultant shall:
 - (a) Notify such subcontractor and the Town within three days that Consultant has actual knowledge that the subcontractor is employing or contracting with an illegal alien; and
 - (b) Terminate the subcontract with the subcontractor if within three days of receiving the notice required pursuant to this section the subcontractor does not cease employing or contracting with the illegal alien; except that Consultant shall not terminate the contract with the subcontractor if during such three days the subcontractor provides information to establish that the subcontractor has not knowingly employed or contracted with an illegal alien.
- (vi) Consultant shall comply with any reasonable request by the Colorado Department of Labor and Employment (the "Department") made in the course of an investigation that the Department undertakes or is undertaking pursuant to

the authority established in Subsection 8-17.5¬102 (5), C.R.S.

(vii) If Consultant violates a provision of this Contract pertaining to the duties imposed by Subsection 8-17.5-102, C.R.S. the Town may terminate this Contract. If this Contract is so terminated, Consultant shall be liable for actual and consequential damages to the Town arising out of Consultant's violation of Subsection 8-17.5-102, C.R.S.

(viii) The Town will notify the Office of the Secretary of State if Consultant violates this provision of this Contract and the Town terminates the Contract for such breach.

Project Requirements:

Final Deliverables and Stamping: The Consultant shall use the Contract Scope of Services as the outline for draft and final reports or technical memoranda so that Consultant

compliance with Contract provisions can be verified. If the final report or technical memoranda contain information of an engineering nature, the cover of the final report, memoranda, all plates, and any executive summary must be stamped and signed by a Professional Engineer licensed in the State of Colorado.

In addition to the paper submittal, the Consultant shall provide the final documents and related materials in a digital format. This digital report shall be contained on CD(s), USB drive(s), or other media as approved by the Town and shall be in Adobe Acrobat (PDF) format.

Project Access: The Consultant shall be responsible for obtaining access as required for project tasks.

Stand-By Time: The Town will not reimburse the Consultant for stand-by time charges for the Consultant's supervisory personnel.

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Payment and Billing:

Reimbursement of Expenses: Subject to annual appropriation by the Town Board, the Town agrees to pay the Consultant an amount based on the approved hourly rates schedule shown in Attachment A for the services described in Attachment A and incorporated by reference as part of this Contract. Payment shall be made directly to the Consultant. The Consultant shall maintain hourly records of time worked by its personnel. Total payment under this Contract shall not exceed one hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$150,000).

Project Budget: The anticipated project budget for the task(s) included in Attachment A is as stated below. The Total Project Cost shall not to be exceeded unless authorized by the Town in advance.

Payment Procedures: The Town shall pay the Consultant upon receipt of billing reports as the services are performed for the task(s) outlined in Attachment A. The Town will initiate the payment process upon the receipt of each billing statement, and payment shall be made within thirty (30) days following receipt of billing.

Money Withheld: If the Town has reasonable grounds to believe that the Consultant will be unable to perform this Contract fully and satisfactorily within the time fixed for performance, then the Town may withhold payment of such portion of any amount otherwise due and payable to the Consultant reasonably deemed appropriate. These amounts may be withheld until the cause for the withholding is cured to the Town's reasonable satisfaction or this Contract is terminated per the General Provisions above. No interest shall be payable by the Town on any amounts withheld under this provision.

Withholding of Payment: If a work element has not been received by the Town by the dates established in Attachment A, the Town may withhold all payments beginning with the month following that date until such deficiency has been corrected.

Final Payment: The final payment shall be made upon acceptance of the final work product and receipt of the final billing.

Background

The Town of Wellington (Wellington or the Town) solicited a Request for Qualifications (RFQ) for qualified firms to develop a Water Source Development Plan (Plan). WestWater Research, LLC (WestWater) submitted a Statement of Qualifications ("SOQ") and was selected to develop the Plan. As part of its SOQ, WestWater provided an approach for Plan development. This Scope of Work builds upon that approach and defines the specific tasks and budget to accomplish the Town's water supply planning objectives.

The Town faces multiple challenges in meeting the water needs of its growing population. Geographically isolated from surface supplies, Wellington's options for new water sources are limited. Most water to the Town comes from the North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC), but terms of its current water supply agreement with NPIC have financially stressed the Town and limited its reserves to build alternative sources. The Town also uses wells augmented through the Cache La Poudre Water User Association (CLPWUA) plan, and a small number of lots have historically been served by the Northern Colorado Water Association (NCWA). Wellington is experiencing land development and population growth pressures and is looking to develop additional water supplies to meet the needs of its growing service population.

The Plan will provide an opportunity to strategically identify, evaluate, and plan future water supply opportunities. As described in the SOQ and more fully developed herein, WestWater employs a proven approach to water supply planning that prioritizes robust financial analysis and risk assessment along with water resource fundamentals. This approach has been used to formulate water acquisition strategies for dozens of municipalities, industries, and investors throughout Colorado and the Western U.S.

Scope of Work

Task 1: Stakeholder Engagement

Stakeholder outreach and engagement is a critical element of any successful water supply planning. The Water Source Development Plan will be consequential in setting the future direction of the Town's water supply, tap fees, and growth and community input to the plan is essential. WestWater recommends commencing the Plan by developing a Stakeholder Engagement Plan with Town staff and leadership. It is assumed that the Town's communications staff will lead the engagement plan's development and drafting.

The Stakeholder Engagement Plan will prescribe the frequency, timing, method, and audience for outreach, but at a minimum, WestWater recommends holding an initial stakeholder workshop for residents, Town staff, elected officials, developers, and community leaders. The exact makeup of the workshop will be determined following Town consultation. The workshop will be used to outline the Plan's process and timeline and set clear expectations and boundaries for Plan development through stakeholder input and buy in. WestWater also recommends periodic

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stakeholder meetings to report progress on Plan development and seek community input at important decision points. It is recommended that the Town develop an dvisory group with regular, standing meetings to provide such feedback. The advisory group's makeup can include elected officials, appointed community members, leadership staff, developers, etc., and will be determined early in the project with staff consultation.

Task 1 anticipates several in-person meetings:

- 1. An initial 2-hour meeting with Town staff to develop a Stakeholder Engagement Plan, with said meeting coupled with the overall project kickoff meeting.¹
- 2. Initial and final Stakeholder Workshop, each budgeted for 2-hours
- 3. Four 1.5-hour meetings with the advisory group: an initial kickoff meeting; one meeting each after Tasks 5 and 6; and one final meeting after Task 7 or optional Task 8.
- 4. Two 2-hour Board of Trustees meetings.

Task 2: Demand Analysis. Effective water supply planning requires thoughtful projections of future demand. Water demand studies can be complex and costly. For the Plan, the Town has requested WestWater employ a simplified process for estimating demands, one that leverages existing rate studies, planning documents, and published regional demand studies. WestWater will evaluate any existing demand projections to determine their suitability and applicability for the Plan development.

For this simplified approach, WestWater will:

- Collect and refine historic water demands for the Town. These data will be used to determine the historic total Town water demand per Town resident or per residential tap, segregated by indoor and outdoor component. WestWater will not segregate demand by customer class. One one-hour virtual meeting will be held to collect and review data.
- 2. Perform a rapid assessment of statistically significant determinants of demand, which will include at a minimum analysis of elasticity of demand to water rates (price), climate, lot and home footprint. Other demand determinants will be evaluated as budget allows and in consultation with Town staff.
- 3. Develop two (high and low) scenarios of future development, fee, and climate conditions (and other factors to be determined) that will represent a range of potential futures. One one-hour virtual meeting will be held to establish scenarios.
- 4. Prepare a simple multi-variant regression model inputting the statistically significant determinants from above on a monthly timestep. The model will be calibrated to historic demand data and results compared to published ranges from regional studies. The model will be used to forecast future demands under various future scenarios. One one-hour virtual meeting will be held to review results and adjust the model, as necessary.

WestWater assumes the Town will provide demand, population, and development data in a form that can be readily input to the model. Such information can be taken from Wellington's existing rate studies, planning documents, including its Comprehensive Plan, community growth forecasts, community development mapping, and past Public Works infrastructure plans. WestWater will employ climate projections for the region from published studies, such as from the City of Fort Collins' Water Supply Vulnerability Study (2019) or the City of Greeley's Integrated Water Supply Plan (2023).

The demand model will be used to forecast demands at 10-year intervals for at the two scenarios considering growth, price, and climate. If budget allows, WestWater will provide a sensitivity study to assess vulnerabilities of demand to various external factors.

¹ Meetings identified for each task will be combined with other tasks to the extent possible.



Task 3: Financial Assessment

WestWater recommends frontloading financial planning to prescreen potential water supply alternatives that are economically unviable. The focus of this task will be to determine Wellington's ability to afford various water supply alternatives. WestWater will first collect information on the Town's current financial condition (reserves, bond schedules, revenue forecasts, debt coverage ratios) and review existing rate and fee models. If existing models do not provide for it, we will prepare a template cashflow model to estimate the Town's maximum ability to pay over various payment terms. This model will be used to rapidly screen water supply alternatives in later tasks. Two one-hour virtual meetings are proposed for this task – one to collect data from the Town, and one check in.

Task 4: Water Supply Alternatives Inventory

WestWater will develop a comprehensive suite of options for raw water supply development by the Town of Wellington. An important aim of this task is to ensure all practical and reasonable alternatives are documented, which is important for future planning efforts and for public outreach. This long list of alternatives will be later refined and filtered. Based on our preliminary understanding of Wellington's water needs, the following water asset classes will provide the basis for the inventory.

- Local Wells & Augmentation. Wellinton currently operates tributary (alluvial) wells that are augmented by the CLPWUA's augmentation plan. Expanding use of alluvial wells may be an option but will require developing additional sources of augmentation. Well depletions likely accrue to Box Elder Creek, and several options exist to augment this source, including:
 - o Ditch company shares such as Box Elder Ditch Company and other smaller Poudre River ditches.
 - Municipal effluent leases sourced from Wellington, Fort Collins, or Boxelder Sanitation.
 - Non-tributary groundwater from various sources
 - Augmentation credits provided by augmentation companies, such as the CLPWUA.

WestWater understands alluvial wells may have impaired water quality and could require additional treatment. Treatment requirements will be considered.

- NPIC Water Supplies. Wellington currently sources a large portion of their water through agreements with NPIC and has acquired NPIC shares for potential future use. Wellington could continue or expand their use of NPIC supplies by
 - Continued acquisition of NPIC shares with the intent to file a water court change case to use the agricultural portion of the NPIC water rights, while continuing to use the Colorado-Big Thompson (CBT) portion of the NPIC shares.
 - Modify and expand the contract agreement with NPIC to further utilize company water rights without entering into a water court change case.
 - Participate in NPIC system improvement project, such as the enlargement of Park Creek Reservoir
 or similar reservoir enlargements or water efficiency projects that can be used to leverage additional
 NPIC supplies or more favorable terms in contract agreements.
- <u>Platte River Power Authority (PRPA) Water Supplies</u>. PRPA has announced it will be retiring their Rawhide #1 coal fired generation unit before 2030. Rawhide #1 uses a large amount of water for cooling purposes, primarily sourced from Windy Gap units. Wellington could seek to:
 - Acquire Windy Gap units from PRPA through sale or lease.
 - Enter into a long-term contract to utilize excess capacity and supply in the existing PRPA water pipelines and Lake Hamilton near the Rawhide Plant.



- <u>Contract Wholesale Water</u>. Wellington could seek an inclusion into neighboring water districts or water associations for delivery of raw or treated supplies. Alternatively, the Town could seek operational partnerships with districts and associations, and even proposed independent water providers, that provide enhanced base or firm supply. These include:
 - Fort Collins-Loveland Water District (FCLWD), which is proposing a new treatment plant near Cobb Lake
 - North Weld County Water District (North Weld)
 - East Larimer County Water District (ELCO)
 - o NCWA
 - Montava's proposed independent water system.
- <u>Participation in Regional Water Project.</u> Wellinton could acquire a participating interest in proposed regional projects, for example in:
 - The Northern Integrated Supply Project (NISP). Several NISP participants have recently signaled interest in selling or reducing their stake in the project. Wellington could purchase participating interest from such entities. NISP participation may need to be coupled with infrastructure (existing and/or new) to convey water from Glade Reservoir to the Town.
 - The Water Horse Project is proposed to deliver water from the Green River in Utah to the Front Range of Colorado. Although the project is preliminary and will face numerous challenges, the proposed pipeline would pass very near Wellington and could be considered.
- Non-Tributary Groundwater and/or Aquifer Storage and Recovery. Several water court applications have been filed over recent years for claims to non-tributary groundwater in Northern Colorado, four of which have been to the Upper Laramie Formation. The Terry Ranch Project, developed by the City of Greeley, is an example. Wellington could potentially develop non-tributary groundwater by:
 - o Purchasing interest in an existing or soon-to-be approved non-tributary decree
 - Developing its own non-tributary decree
 - Partnering with the others

Non-tributary groundwater could serve the Town directly or be used to augment Box Elder Creek alluvial pumping. Infrastructure needs will require evaluation for each non-tributary option.

- Agricultural Water Rights. The Town may be able to purchase and change irrigation water rights other than
 NPIC for use in its water supply system. Frequently traded rights in the Poudre Basin include the Water
 Supply and Storage Company, the Larimer & Weld companies, and the Jackson Ditch Company. Use of these
 rights will require an exchange to a point of diversion that allows conveyance to the Town through excess
 NPIC capacity and/or a new dedicated raw water supply pipeline.
- <u>Non-Potable System Expansion</u>. Wellington could consider expanding their already robust non-potable irrigation system to customers currently served only with potable water. By doing so, the Town could dedicate some of their existing water rights to future potable water demands.
- New Dedicated Town Water Supply Project. Wellington could develop their own, new storage capacity to firm their existing water rights.

Additional options may be discussed and defined during this task and in communication with the Town. Two 1-hour virtual meetings are budgeted for staff consultation in this Task.



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Task 5: Alternatives Screening

WestWater will conduct research and analysis on each alternative identified by the Water Supply Alternatives Inventory. This investigation will be used to identify any fatal flaws that would remove an alternative from further consideration. The following factors, among others, will be investigated:

- The volume, timing, and firm yield of available supply
- Curtailment and yield reduction risk
- Water quality and water treatment requirements
- For water rights, the available supply pool and likelihood of finding a willing seller.
- Regulatory risks of pursuing an entitlement transfer and/or water rights change case.
- Permitting requirements and risk for alternatives that require construction of new infrastructure.
- Political risks
- Ability to partner on regional projects or with neighboring water districts and associations.
- Development timelines
- Cost ranges

For those alternatives immediately screened out due to a fatal flaw(s), WestWater will document the rationale. For retained alternatives, WestWater will prepare a database that compiles the above data for further analysis.

Alternative screening processes can be time intensive. For the Town, WestWater will focus efforts on proven, readily available sources that are geographically compatible with Wellington's existing treatment and distribution system. To aid this distinction, WestWater will engage, at the direction of the Town, a variety of water agencies operating in the Poudre Basin. Such entities include NPIC, ELCO, FCLWD, Northern Water, NCWA, Fort Collins, Boxelder Sanitation, Montava, PRPA, and ditch company boards. WestWater has strong relationships with all these entities and a firm understanding of their operations.

Task 5 will require multiple in-person and virtual meetings with Town staff and third parties. For budgeting purposes, WestWater estimates five 1-hour virtual meetings and four 1-hour in-person.

Task 6: Alternatives Evaluation and Prioritization

The screening process in Task 5 will yield a list of potentially feasible alternatives that are then subjected to a heightened level of analysis. For retained alternatives, WestWater will develop:

- Conceptual engineering and AACE Class V capital cost estimates
- Operational costs (Class V)
- Detailed yield estimates
- Development timelines; and
- Regulatory requirements.

Information developed during this task will further screen and possibly combine multiple alternatives. Yield screening will consider the ability of the alternatives to meet the demands forecasted in Task 2. Cost screening will incorporate WestWater's Waterlitix database and the financial models developed in Task 3. All information developed in this task will be incorporated in the inventory database.

This task does not include detailed engineering and cost estimating. The Town may seek additional engineering for short-listed alternatives under separate contract.



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WestWater will then prioritize and rank remaining alternatives (or groupings thereof) in consultation with Town staff and the advisory group. WestWater will develop a simplified evaluation framework focusing on cost and ability to finance, risk, timeline, yield, and other factors to be determined collectively. The framework will be applied to assign a relative score to each alternative. From these scores, as well as stakeholder input and strategic considerations, a final water supply alternative or suite of alternatives will be determined.

Task 7: Implementation Plan

WestWater will develop a concise plan to implement the selected water supply alternative(s). The implementation plan will recommend a strategic plan for pursuing and developing the selected water supply alternative(s), either independently or in concert with other water providers. The final alternative(s) will be presented according to the Stakeholder Engagement Plan, but care should be taken not to publicly disclose any implementation strategy that may influence negotiation positions. Depending on the selected alternative(s), the Town may explore innovative and unique deal structures with private investors, real estate developers, or regional utility partners. One 1-hour virtual meeting is budgeted for this task.

Optional Task 8: Preliminary Financing Plan

The financial models developed in Task 3 will be applied to evaluate the financing needs to support the selected alternative. Specifically, future water rates and/or tap fees will be estimated to support the alternative costs. WestWater will leverage the Town's existing rate and fee models to the extent possible, and will assist Town staff in evaluating the raw water requirements and tap fees to support the financing plan. It is assumed the Town's existing fee and rate models will be sufficient to evaluate fee changes by the selected alternative. WestWater will also provide recommendations on acceptance of water rights, cash, or both to support the alternative.

The financing plan scoped in this optional task is at a preliminary level. A full financial plan is beyond the scope of the available budget but can be addressed in future phases.

Deliverables

WestWater will prepare concise technical memoranda for select tasks or group of tasks that will serve as the basis of a final Water Supply Development Plan report. Technical memoranda will be developed for:

- 1. The demand analysis in Task 2.
- 2. The alternatives inventory and screening in Tasks 4 and 5
- 3. The alternatives evaluation prioritization and implementation recommendations in Tasks 6 and 7.

Results of the financial assessment from Task 3 will be incorporated into the alternatives screening and prioritization memoranda. The technical memoranda will be provided for review and comment by the Town upon completion of task(s). WestWater will address comments on Technical memorandum within one week of receipt of comments. If the Town elects to proceed with Optional Task 8, a technical memorandum will be developed for the financing plan as well. The Stakeholder Engagement Plan is anticipated to be developed separately, with lead authorship by the Town.

It is assumed that there will be minor additional content beyond the technical memoranda developed for the Plan report. A draft report will be delivered for review and comment by the Town, with comment addressed with one week in a final report.

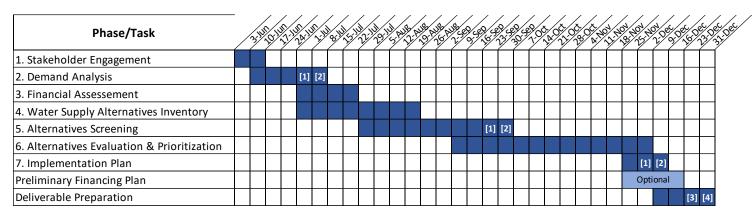
Schedule

A draft of the Water Supply Development Plan will be delivered on or before December 31, 2024. Project tasks will occur according to the timeline in Figure 1 below. The project timeline assumes notice to proceed will be given by June 3, 2024. The timeline will be subject to negotiations with external partners (regional partners, sellers, etc.). If



there are Town deadlines that influence the schedule for this project, WestWater can consider adjusting the proposed schedule.

Budget

Introduction

The Town of Wellington (Town) is located approximately 12 miles north of the City of Fort Collins, at the intersection of Interstate 25 and Highway 1. The Town has approximately 4,200 water service connections serving an estimated population of 12,000. More than 40% of residential customers are connected to privately owned non-potable systems for irrigation. The Town's current water resources portfolio consists of two water supply sources: an agreement with the North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) for up to 2,000 acre-feet per year of water out of NPIC Reservoir #3 and three municipal wells augmented up to a total of 400 AF annually under the Cache la Poudre Water User Association plan.

The Town is seeking qualifications from experienced firms to develop a comprehensive Water Source Development Plan, incorporating an economic feasibility analysis. The selected consultant or team will be responsible for providing expertise in engineering, financial analysis, and Colorado water rights, including groundwater, to deliver a sustainable and economically viable water supply solution for the Town through 2075.

- 4. Past performance on similar projects, with emphasis on projects based in the Northern Colorado Front Range (20%).



5. Location of Firm and Key Personnel (10%): Preferences will be given to firms with location(s) of key personnel that are conducive to proper and efficient management of this project.

Selection of Successful Consultants

The Town's selection committee will review the Statements of Qualifications submitted and rank the qualified firms using the above criteria. Shortlisted firms may be invited to participate in interviews or provide additional information as part of the selection process. The Town will consider concepts and compare methods for furnishing services. Contract negotiations are then expected to occur with the most highly qualified firm to determine the final scope of services and fees that are fair and reasonable based on a clear understanding of the project and the estimated value of services to be rendered.

Both the successful firms and the unsuccessful firms will be notified by email approximately two to four weeks after the RFQ closing date and time.

All selections at this time shall be qualification based. No rates, fees, or any cost information should be identified as part of your SOQ submission.

The Town reserves the right to evaluate the SOQ in the manner deemed to be in the best interest of the Town, and to negotiate terms and conditions with the selected consultant or team based on the submitted qualifications.

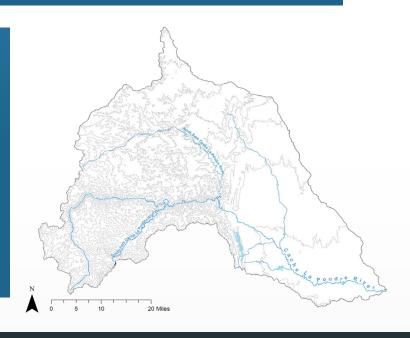

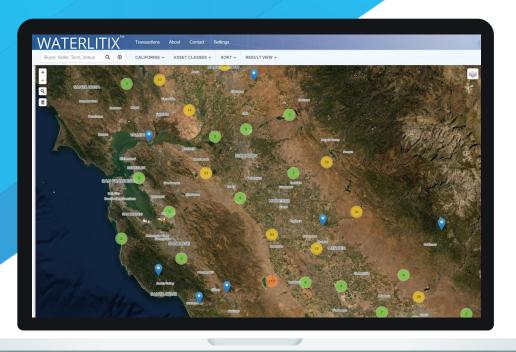

WestWater employs a proven approach to water supply planning that prioritizes robust financial analysis and risk assessment along with water resource fundamentals. This approach has been used to formulate water acquisition strategies for dozens of municipalities, industries, and investors throughout Colorado and the Western U.S.

1. Demand Analysis. Effective water supply planning requires a thorough understanding of current water usage and robust projections of future demand. Historic water demands are used to develop models relating demand to population, water rates (price), customer classes, losses, climate, indoor/outdoor use ratios, and other statistically significant factors. Such models can be used to forecast future demands under various scenarios of growth, price, and climate uncertainty. A risk assessment can be employed to determine which demand scenario(s) are carried forward for supply development.

Demand studies can be complex and costly. For the Town's Plan, WestWater proposes to use, to the extent possible, existing water demand studies and climate projections for the region, such as from the City of Fort Collins' Water Supply Vulnerability Study (2019) or the City of Greeley's Integrated Water Supply Plan (2023).

2. Financial Condition Assessment. We prioritize frontloading financial planning to prescreen potential water supply alternatives that are economically unviable. We evaluate each client's existing bond schedule for capital improvements, water rates, and debt coverage to estimate the ability to pay and credit profile. Existing rate and fee models and reviewed and customized for evaluating the cost implications of water supply alternatives.

3. Water Supply Alternatives Inventory. An important aim during water supply planning is to ensure all practical and reasonable alternatives are documented, which is important for future planning efforts and for public outreach. A long list of water supply alternatives is first developed before being refined and ranked in subsequent tasks. WestWater will leverage its extensive market intelligence to identify potential alternatives for the Town.

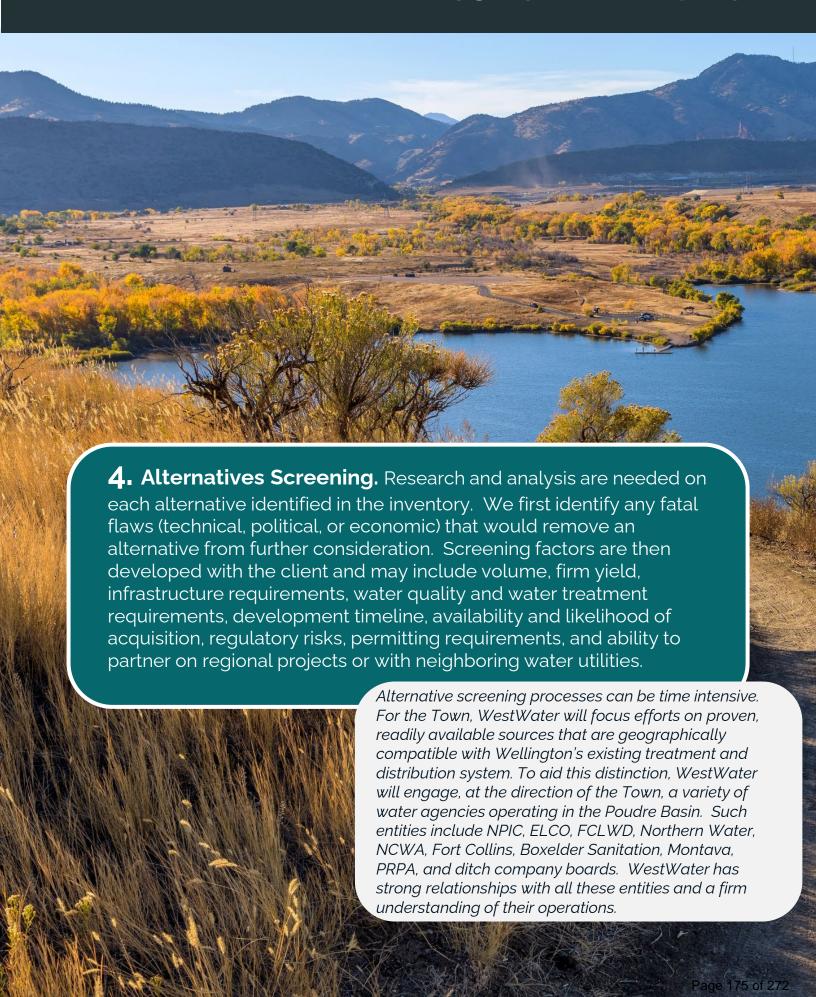

6. Financing Plan. Models developed in the Financial Condition Assessment task are used to evaluate the financing needs to support selected alternatives and the impacts to clients' credit position. Specifically, future water rates and/or tap fees are estimated to support water supply alternatives. The risk register is used to model bonding risks and rate sensitivity. Depending on the selected alternative, the Town may explore innovative and unique deal structures with private investors, real estate developers, or regional utility partners.

7. Stakeholder Engagement. Community engagement and support are critical for successful implementation of water supply plans. WestWater will advise and support the Town's outreach efforts during this process. At a minimum, it is recommended that engagement concentrates at plan formation and presentation of draft results and that the Town's Board of Trustees be provided with regular updates and opportunities for input.

Subject: Report Concerning an Emergency Purchase for the Treated Water Storage Tanks Coating and

Improvements Project

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

In the interest of transparency, the Public Works Department is providing an update on an emergency purchase that was executed by Town staff in May 2024 as part of the Treated Water Storage Tanks Coating and Improvements project. The purchase was executed to maintain critical project schedules and ensure the Town's water storage tanks are back in service quickly to meet operational and public safety needs.

BACKGROUND / DISCUSSION

Wellington's Water Treatment Plant (WTP) operates with two welded steel treated water storage tanks, each standing about 48 feet above the ground. The 2-million-gallon (MG) tank is 82 feet in diameter and has been in service since the early 2000s. The 1 MG tank is 60 feet in diameter and has been in service since the mid-1980s. Both tanks were constructed by Advanced Tank of Wellington, Colorado.

On August 22, 2023, the Board approved a contract with Hensel Phelps (HP) for interior and exterior paint coatings and other improvements to these tanks. HP is also the general contractor for the WTP's expansion project are are fully mobilized on-site. The Town also contracted with Ditesco, of Fort Collins, for engineering support and inspection services. Work commenced on the interior of the 2 MG tank in November 2023, which was successfully completed in February 2024. In mid-March 2024, work began on the 1 MG tank interior. Shortly after access was gained to the tank's interior, the Ditesco structural inspector observed deformation of several of the tank's roof rafters. The bending and twisting of these rafters most likely occurred over time and are now compromising the tank's structural integrity. Advanced Tank then conducted an independent inspection and provided repair options with cost estimates that were evaluated by the project team. Given the project's critical schedule, cost factors, and contractor availability, the team agreed that the installation of steel ties welded between each rafter would be the most cost and time-effective solution to improve the tank's longevity. Ditesco subsequently issued HP a Work Change Directive to proceed with these repairs. Soon after, HP presented the Town with Change Order No. 2 (\$41,848) inclusive of the rafter ties installation by Advance Tank, additional rental time for the lifts, and HP supervision and materials fees. (Change Order No. 1 (\$28,746) was issued on April 30, 2024, for the acquisition and installation of a new 16-inch buried gate valve on the effluent side of the 1 MG tank to replace the existing valve (original equipment) that was found to be inoperable.)

This Change Order needed to be executed promptly to keep the project on schedule and meet the project's revised Substantial Complete date of June 14, defined as having the interiors of both tanks coated with repairs completed, and both tanks fully disinfected and in service. Furthermore, given the approaching period of high water demands and severe consequences of inadequate emergency and fire storage, this repair work needed to be quickly completed. Therefore, the Town's Public Works Director, with the Town Administrator's verbal approval, executed this Change Order, invoking Section IV of the Town's Purchasing Policy, which reads as follows:

Notwithstanding any other provision of this policy, the Town Administrator or designee may make or authorize others to make emergency procurement when there exists a threat to public health, welfare, or



safety under emergency conditions. A written determination of the basis for emergency and for the purchase or selection of the vendor or contractor shall be included with the purchase documentation (invoice, Purchase Order, check request).

The fully executed Change Order is attached. The exterior recoating of both tanks is expected to start mid-June with the entire project completed by the established Final Completion date of August 5, 2024.

CONNECTION WITH ADOPTED MASTER PLANS

Infrastructure: Complete the Water Treatment Plant and Water Reclamation Facility expansion projects under budget and on time.

Monthly Production Summary

- Water
 - o Total April monthly volumetric production to meet demand was 21 million gallons (MG), which is about average for April production
 - The Conventional Plant produced 14 MG
 - The Nanofiltration Plant came online on April 3rd and had a total monthly production of 7 MG.

- Wastewater
 - April Summary
 - The total influent volume for April was approximately 20 MG, which is the highest production for the last 5 years

Monthly Operational Summary

 - The 1MG Tank remained offline the entire month for recoating.

The project team is in close coordination with Advanced Tank to come up with a solution for repairs and a path forward with the coating project. The structural investigation and repairs will delay the completion of the coating project and the return to service of the tank.
 - Nanofiltration Plant
 - On April 3rd the Nanofiltration plant was turned on.

The Law Enforcement Services Agreement for the Town of Wellington obligates the Larimer County Sheriff's Office to provide monthly reporting.

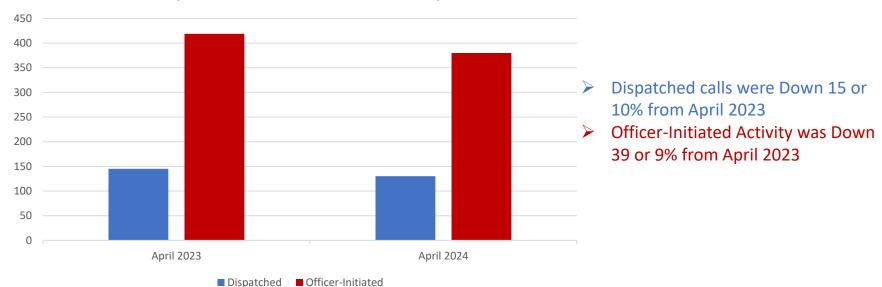

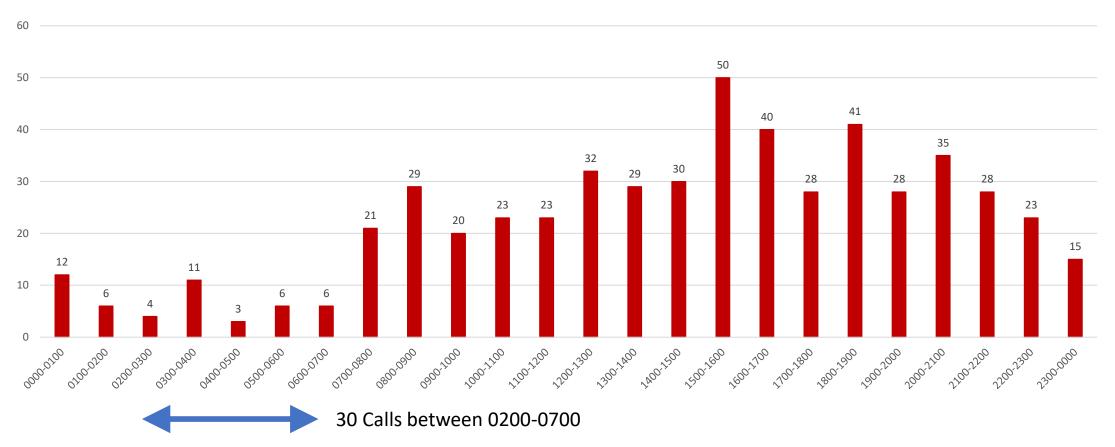

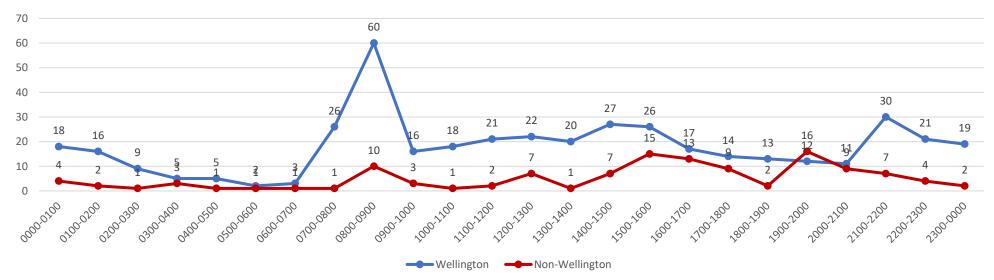
