Wellington is proud to announce the successful completion of major expansion projects at the Town's Water Treatment Plant (WTP) and Water Reclamation Facility (WRF).

The projects, which were necessary for the Town to meet capacity needs and regulatory requirements, got underway in Spring 2022. The newly expanded facilities double Wellington's capacity to provide water and wastewater utility services to its ever-growing population while also accommodating commercial growth.

"This is new territory for Wellington,"
Wellington Mayor Calar Chaussee said.
"These expansion projects will allow us to grow responsibly as a Town while ensuring we can provide quality, consistent water and wastewater utility services to our residents and businesses."

The final cost of the WTP expansion came in at \$39,055,590. The final cost of the WRF expansion was \$53,109,734. Both projects were finished on schedule and under budget — and both facilities were designed to allow for further expansion in the future if needed.

Town Highlights

Board Adopts Strategic Plan

After hosting a community Town Hall to gather feedback on the Town's future direction, the newly elected Board adopted a <u>Strategic Plan</u> centered on responsible growth, economic vitality, efficient town operations, and enhanced community spaces.

2024 Regular Election Results

Three Board of Trustee seats were up for election, and a total of 1,989 ballots were received. The next regular election will take place in April 2026, with four Board of Trustee seats on the ballot.

Comcast Franchise Agreement Brings Better Broadband Access

Wellington residents and businesses will have access to faster and more stable broadband internet access — along with a bevy of new cable television options.

Town Launches Water Source Development Plan

The Water Source Development Plan will provide the Town of Wellington with a clear and actionable guide for ensuring a reliable and affordable water supply into the future. By assessing the current water system, future needs, financial factors, and stakeholder input, the plan will define effective solutions for meeting both near and long-term water demands.

Cleveland Avenue Construction

The Town received \$4.4 million in grant funding to improve Cleveland Avenue including drainage, sidewalk, and ADA improvements. Design is underway and construction will kickoff in fall 2025.

Housing Needs Assessment

The Town is conducting a Housing Needs Assessment & Strategy, which will identify and evaluate the current and future housing demands, trends, and challenges.

New Business License Process

Launched new business license process that simplified applications, streamlines reviews and has live updates to business owners.

Community Town Hall Meetings Increase Engagement

Town Staff hosted Town Halls to get feedback from the public. Topics included Strategic Planning, the Cleveland Ave. Construction Project, and Budget BOO-nanza.





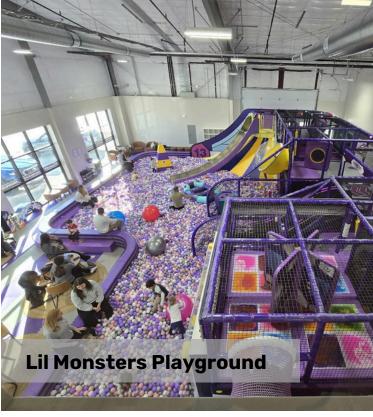

New Fishing Dock Installed

Colorado Parks and Wildlife (CPW) awarded Wellington more than \$40,000 for the purchase and installation of a fishing dock for the West Pond at Wellville Park.
